

will be put down by force. The following salutary Rules have been put forth by the Civil Authorities:

**Public Caution.**—To prevent as much as possible any fatal results under the present circumstances, the Boroughreeve and Constables of Manchester feel it their duty to issue the following friendly caution:—

“When stones are thrown from a crowd, (a practice by which the lives of the Peace Officers and military, on duty, are continually endangered) the persons offending must be immediately seized, and given up by those about them, or such as did not actually throw a stone may suffer from the firing of the military.”

“In the event of stones being thrown, the persons concerned, who are flying from the pursuit of the civil or military authorities, should be refused admittance into houses or cellars, which may otherwise be fired into. The occupiers of houses, from the windows or roofs of which stones are thrown, must consider themselves responsible for all the consequences.”

“It is earnestly requested that individuals will avoid collecting in groups or parties in the streets.”

Every engine is at work, which falsehood can invent and baseness employ, to enterpose the shield of public opinion between the disaffected and their just punishment. We have no fears, however, as to the final result. When the alarm and irritation of the moment have subsided, misguided minds will admit the influence of candour and honesty; and then too, the wilful propagators of delusion will find it their interest to desist.

The present political situation of England is a very serious one; and unless the constituted authorities are vigilant and efficient in the discharge of their duty, nothing can save the country from the horrors of an insurrection, which, if not producing a complete revolution, must be attended with incalculable loss of blood and treasure to the country.

We rejoice in being able to state, from good authority, that a material and flattering re-action has occurred in our commercial system—and particularly at the great port of Liverpool. Cotton Wool has risen 2d. per lb. and is in demand; Sugars are much higher, and Coffees and almost all other Colonial produce are considerably advancing. Combining this intelligence, with the prospect of a most favourable and abundant Harvest, we may hope, that the present temporary distress, will speedily give way to the genial influence of revived trade and national prosperity.

#### LONDON, AUGUST 16.

The Paris Papers of Friday last were received this morning.

The *attouchement* of the Duchess of Berry is expected to take place about the end of the present, or beginning of the next, month. Her Royal Highness enjoys the best health.

The Duke of Wellington dined on the 8th inst. with the King of the Netherlands at the palace of Laeken, on the 9th, he set off by way of Spa and Cologne to Carlsbad.

A private letter from the latter place says, the conferences which Prince Metternich had lately with the King of Prussia, lasted three days. It is thought the Prince Hardenberg's health will not suffer him to attend the conferences at Carlsbad. M. de Geutz, the author of several political works, has been called to that place by Prince Metternich; and it is supposed he will be employed to draw up the declaration of the Sovereigns to the German People.

Dr. Maux, who had been a Jew, but had embraced the Christian religion, is in custody at Vienna, on a charge of belonging to the Secret Association in Germany called the *Deutsche Burschenschaft*.

The town of Wurzburg has been the scene of some very unfortunate troubles. By some cause or another, the populace was incited to insult a Professor on the 2d of August, who wrote in favour of the Jews. The attacks shortly were turned against the Jews themselves. An Officer of the Police in attempting to disperse the rioters, shot one man. The Citizens demanded of the Magistrate to drive away the Jews, which was refused, and the Citizens became more irritated. One soldier was killed. Order has been at length restored. However, almost all the Jews have quitted the town. The Students have behaved remarkably well,

and have preserved from all insult their companions of the Jewish persuasion. In consequence of this disgraceful tumult, the King of Bavaria has issued a proclamation, calling on the inhabitants to conduct themselves with order and decency, and on the Magistrates, to suppress every tendency, to riot and breach of the peace.

The new Queen of Spain is to be received on the banks of the Bidassoa; and according to the expression in this article will be met with “all due solemnity” in the different towns through which she passes on her way to Madrid. The Spaniards were never a “rejoicing” nation—less so at present; and so for the poor young Queen herself, if she knows the universal opinion of mankind respecting him to whose society state policy or idle ambition has consigned her for life, she has, perhaps, the greatest cause of all to be “solemn.”
