

BOSTON, SEPT. 23.

FROM SPAIN.

Our latest accounts from Cadiz, are to the 7th of August, at which time, the Treaty Cession had not been ratified. The time, limited for its completion is the 26th Aug. The Grand Expedition for South America, notwithstanding the reports of its complete annihilation, was confidently reported to be in a state of uninterrupted progress; that five sail of the line, five frigates, and 150 transports, were engaged to take on board 20,000 troops; that Gen. O'Donnel, continued the command; and that the whole force would probably sail by the 20th of September.

FROM HAMBURG, JULY 27.

The accounts from Prussia continue to wear a gloomy aspect. The unfortunate division between the king and his subjects threatens some serious consequences. It is said that Field Marshal Blucher is watched closely. Guesenau, next to Blucher in rank and Governor of Berlin, is under actual arrest. The Prince, Army and People, from one party, while the King with his Ministry and the nobility form the other. Time only can tell what the consequence will be.

BONAPARTE.

The London Courier, of the 9th of August, states that the purser of the company's ship Phoenix, had landed at South Hampton on the preceding Thursday, with despatches from Bengal and St. Helena. Bonaparte's new mansion was in a state of great forwardness; he takes no notice of it, but continues inflexible in his determination not to admit visitors, and it is a long time since he has been seen by the inhabitants. The Phoenix left St. Helena the 7th of June.

The Grand Duke of Darmstadt, has directed that lawyers in his dominions shall, for a time, be incorporated with the regiments of his army. They may teach the soldiers law, and may in return be taught the art of war.

HAVANA.---713 vessels entered the port of Havana in the first seven months of the present year---of which 302 were American---191 Spanish---91 English---35 French---10 Dutch---3 Hamburg---5 Bremen---4 Danish---4 Swedes---1 Russian---2 Portuguese---5 Sardinian. It would make no small difference in our trade, if Cuba shall be ceded to England, as is so much talked of, and which the British editors claim as an indemnity to them for the cession of Florida to us!

In consequence of the extension of the trade, negro-flesh has fallen considerably in Cuba---from 450 to 500 dollars is the highest price paid for prime slaves.---1728 arrived there in the last month!

The Western Rivers appear to have been surprisingly emptied of their waters the present season; the Ohio was represented, a few weeks since, as being fordable in many places; and the last Philadelphia papers state, that the Alleghany river, which is usually from 25 to 30 feet deep, had been recently passed by waggons and other teams, the water, in the channel, being only three feet.

In New-York, we must needs think, there has been much more alarm than danger; that several cases of malignant fever have occurred in that city, must be acknowledged; but not to an extent or of such malignant aspect, as, in our opinion, to warrant the fears which are entertained of its being an epidemic.

FEVER IN THE UNITED STATES.

In Baltimore, for the forty-eight hours ending on Sunday night last, sixty eight new cases were reported. The fever had assumed an unusual degree of malignancy, and there were no indications of its progress being speedily arrested. The clergymen of the different denominations in Baltimore had assembled in the vestry-room of St. Paul's Church and come to a resolution of the expediency of setting apart a day to be observed as a day of fasting and prayer, in consequence of the calamity. A committee of their body was appointed to wait on the Mayor of the city and request his co-operation. The Mayor had in consequence issued his proclamation, setting apart THURSDAY, the

23d inst. to be observed as a day of fasting, humiliation and prayer; "and that the several worshipping assemblies meet on that day for the purpose of imploring ALMIGHTY GOD, that he would be pleased to arrest the progress of the malady now prevailing at Fell's Point, and restore our city to its wonted health."

In Philadelphia, during the week ending on Friday last, only two deaths had occurred by malignant fever.

In New-York, on the 21st, two new cases were reported. A very high tide had filled the cellars in the lower part of the town with water. The Board of Health, however, were taking active measures to prevent any injurious consequences.

A letter from New-Orleans, of the 22d August, mentions that the reports of the yellow fever raging in that city, are greatly exaggerated, and that the general health, at the above date, had not been better for many years; that violent bilious fevers had prevailed, which had been cured by seasonable aid, "I have heard four physicians, all men of note, say that they had fewer patients at this moment than they have had all the summer.

Boston is almost entirely free from the contagion, and the alarm has long since subsided. Not a single death by malignant fever, has occurred during the past week. No person need be under the slightest apprehension as to visiting the town, either for business or amusement.
