### A Proclamation.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient that a General Assembly of this Province should be called and summoned to meet at Fredericton on the third Tuesday in November next: I do, therefore, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby calling and summoning the said General Assembly to meet at the time and place above-mentioned; whereof all persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal, the ninth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, and in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty's Reign.

### BY AUTHORITY.

SECRETARY'S OFFICE, 26th April, 1819.

WHEREAS divers Persons have at different Periods, had allotments of Land, and have neglected to take out their GRANTS for the same, as required by the ROYAL INSTRUCTIONS, notwithstanding repeated cautions given on this subject: Such Persons are again hereby notified that the LANDS which may have been so allotted to them, are, by the ROYAL INSTRUCTIONS, forfeited, and are open to any new application, although they may have been cultivated or transferred to other Persons.

## THE QUEBEC GAZETTE. PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY.

On Monday evening, the 30th August, Major Bowles, Military Secretary to His Grace the Duke of Richmond, K. G. Governor in Chief and Commander of the Forces in and over the British Possessions in North America, arrived at Montreal, bringing the melancholy intelligence of the Duke's decease, on the morning of Saturday the 28th Aug. at the new Military Settlement of Richmond, after a short but severe illness, during which he was attended by a Medical Officer of that place and that His Grace's remains, attended by Lieut.-Col. Cockburn and himself had arrived at La Chine. Arrangements were immediately made for the removal of His Grace's remains to the Government House at Montreal, where they accordingly arrived, escorted by a Captain's Guard of the 37th Regt. (and having been met some miles from town, by the Officers of His Grace's Personal and of the General Staff) at day break on Tuesday morning the 31st. Having lain in state (privately) during part of this day, and having been placed in a strong Leadon Coffin, with an outer one of Mahogany, and all necessary arrangements being completed for its removal to Quebec, the Corpse was conveyed from the Government House to the Malsham Steam-Boat, passing through a considerable part of the City of Montreal, attended by the Officers of His Grace's Personal and General Staff, and by the Clergy and principal Inhabitants of Montreal, in procession, as well as by an immense concourse of people.

A Guard of Grenadiers of the 37th Regt. was embarked with the Corpse, and the following Officers attended His Grace's remains to Quebec; Lieut.-Col. Ready, Private Secretary, Major Bowles, Military Secretary, Major M'Leod, First Adde-Camp, Lieut. Col. Harvey, Dep.-Adjt.-Gen. of the Forces, Lieut. Col. Cockburn, Dep.-Qr.-Mr.-Gen. do. Commissary Gen. Wood, Capt. Montresor, Royal Navy.

At ten o'clock on Thursday morning the 2d September, His Grace's remains were removed from the Steam-boat, and placed upon a hearse upon the King's Wharf at Quebec, from whence they were conveyed to the Chateau of St. Louis, attended by the Honourable the Members of the Legislative & Executive Councils; the Chief Justice, the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Quebec, and the Clergy, and by the whole of the Officers of the Staff and Departments, in procession, escorted by six Field Pieces; a Guard of honour of the 60th Rifle Bn. with the Band of that Corps playing a Dead March, the Flags of the Garrison, and of all the Ships in the Harbour, being hoisted half-Mast, and minute guns being fired during the procession.

The Corpse was received at the Chateau by a Guard of Grenadiers of the 76th Regt. with Regimental Colours, and the Band of that Regt. playing a Dead March.

His Grace's Remains were placed in a lower room in the Chateau, where they lay in state until 4 o'clock of Saturday the 4th of Sept. when they were removed to the place of Interment in the Cathedral Church at Quebec, in the following order:—

The whole of the Troops composing the Garrison of Quebec, consisting of a large Detachment of Royal Artillery with 15 Field Pieces, with lighted Matches, the whole of the Rifle Battalion 60th, and 76th Regiments, composed the Funeral and firing party, and formed a Lane extending from the door of the Chateau, passing the French Church, through the Market-place, up Garden Street, to the great west, entrance of the Cathedral.

On the Corpse being brought out, (the Collar and Insigra of the Order of the Garter, with His Grace's Military Appointments, being placed on his Coffin,) the whole

of the Troops Presented Arms. On its being placed on the Hearse, the Troops rested on their Arms Reversed.

The Procession then moved on in the following order:—

Persons of the Public Military Departments under the rank of Deputy Assistants. Officers of the Staff and Departments, Militia and unattached Officers, according to their respective ranks, and that of their Departments, the juniors of each rank preceding—this part of the Procession was closed by the Heads of the several Departments, (and the Adjutant General of Militia,) the whole walking two and two.

Then followed the Civil Procession, consisting of the Law and other principal Officers of the Crown, Courts and Public Offices.

A Military Band playing a Dead March. THE BODY, On a Hearse drawn by Four Horses, (The Horses covered with Crape.)

AND FOLLOWED BY Major M'Leod, (His Grace's relative,) Sir Charles Saxton, Baronet, Lieutenant Colonel Ready, Private Secretary, Major Bowles, Military Secretary, AS MOURNERS.

The Officers of the Private and Military Secretary's Offices and of His Grace's Household, followed by His Grace's led Horses, Grooms, and Servants, and by a Company of Grenadiers of the 76th Regiment, with their Arms reversed, and Pikes trailed, closed the procession.

The Drums of the different Corps covered with crape, rolled as the Corpse passed. The Military band filed off at the door of the Cathedral, and ceased playing as the Body entered the Church.

The Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Quebec, preceded by the Clergy, met the Corpse at the gate of the Cathedral Church-yard, and conducted it up the Centre Aisle, where it was placed on a platform, the Mourners and Pall-Bearers remaining near the Body.

After the Anthem, and the part of the Service before the interment, had been performed, the Body was deposited in a Vault opened for the purpose, betwixt the Pulpit and the Communion Table, and the service was concluded by the Lord Bishop.

A Signal was then given, when one round from 15 Field Pieces was fired, slowly and distinctly, followed by a volley of Musketry from the whole of the Infantry; then a second and a third round in like manner.

After which, the troops moved off in slow time and in perfect silence, no Band playing or drum beating.

Thus were interred the Remains of the Most Noble and Puiasant Prince CHARLES, Duke of RICHMOND, LENNOX & AUBIGNY, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Governor in Chief and Commander of the Forces in and over the British Possessions in North America.

At a special meeting of the Magistrates held in the Court House, in the city of Montreal on the 2d day of September, 1819,

Resolved that in consequence of the death of His Grace the DUKE OF RICHMOND, they will wear MOURNING from this day forth, for the space of 30 days.
