AGRICULTURAL.

To Farmers.—The practice of sowing wheat on a clover sod, with one ploughing, has been much recommended both in England and the United States, as being attended with complete success in raising good crops, and also in improving the lands; but some farmers in trying the experiment, have failed, altogether by ploughing too shallow, by which the grass and weeds ahead choke up the wheat—Let not this be a discouragement; but rather try it again in a proper manner. Turn down the sod, whether it be clover, timothy or herds-grass, with a good plough and a strong team, so deep as completely to prevent their growing to the injury of the crop. The field may be broken up in eighth months, the manure spread on immediately, and well harrowed in—and then in proper season cross ploughed lightly, and sown about a bushel to the acre.

By this management the wheat grows well in the fall and generally produces a crop of clean grain at harvest.—Note, the more grass is turned down, the better, provided it be well covered.

Harrowing small Grain in the Spring.

—We have not room now, for an essay, if the subject required, but we cannot permit another week to pass, without recommending the Farmer to pass the harrow over his field of small grain. We are confident that it must have a fine effect, in giving it an early start, and enabling it to out grow most of its enemies.—The reasoning is plain and obvious.—It acts like a fresh ploughing of corn, or tobacco, just before a good rain—the surface of the ground is softened about the stalk, gives it room to expand, and numerous bugs and insects, are routed, covered over, and destroyed.

At all events, it is easy to make the trial. Let a few breadths be harrowed, the same way the grain was ploughed in—numerous plants will be torn up, and the operation will apparently, menace total destruction; but it will be found, that what remains, will spread and thrive much better and more than make up for the little destroyed.

Perhaps, for this operation, the common old wooden tooth harrow, with blunt teeth, would answer as well, if not better, than any other—and it is well if it can be made to answer any purpose well. At all events this harrowing is strenuously recommended by some of the best Pennsylvania farmers—therefore, we repeat, make the trial on a small scale, and then you will know another year.—American Farmer.
