7. FRONT-RW—from the head of Queen-Street, upwards.
8. WELLINGTON-STREET—from the upper end of King Street towards Government-House.
9. WATERLOO-RW—from M'Leod's corner downwards.
- II. *The Cross Streets.*
1. SUNBURY-STREET—at the lower end of the Town-Plat.
2. CHURCH-STREET—passing the Chief Justices.
3. ST JOHN-STREET—passing the Province-Hall.
4. REGENT-STREET—leading towards the New-Maryland Settlement.
5. CARLETON-STREET—the center Street.
6. YORK-STREET—the next to Carleton-Street.
7. WESTMORLAND-STREET—next to York-Street.
8. NORTHUMBERLAND-STREET—next to Westmorland-Street. And
9. SMYTH-STREET—at the upper end of the Town-Plat, between it and the Government-Farm.

On Sunday evening, a robust young woman, habituated as a servant, was found in the Methodist Chapel, before closing the doors, in a state of somnolency, and, as was afterwards found, lock jawed—in that situation she was conveyed to the Alms-House, where medical aid and every effort was tried to bring her to, but without effect, until last evening about six o'clock, when she awoke in a crying fit. On being asked if she would have a drink of water, she nodded assent, and shortly afterwards made signs for a pen and ink, which being given her, she wrote the following sentences in a very fair hand:—

"I belong to Belfast, in Ireland,—I am only 9 days from Windsor,—I am going 15 miles off, where sister lives, but cold and frost hinder me to travel,—I went to Meeting last night, and got a drink of water in a house, and I found a sickness on myself, but I have lost my speech.—I want to go out of this house,—I was cast away at Cape Negro,—my name is Mary-Ann Mussenden, my father and mother live in New-York,—they wrote for me, I could not get to them,—my sister lives here and married a farmer,—I want to see them,—I am single,—22 years of age."

We saw her this morning, when she added her age as above,—the delicacy of her hands indicate that she has not been used to hard labour,—she continues in a shivering state, and up to the time our paper was put to press, her power of speech had not returned.—*Star.*

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 20.

The conviction of the notorious publisher of the Age of Reason, and other infidel and blasphemous publications, is an event on which we may congratulate the country. A check will thus be given to the circulation of those wretched writings, which strike at once at all individual hope and happiness and the peace of society, and by which so many illiterate and unthinking persons have been bewildered and perverted. It is quite in character, to see this low and scurrilous profanity in connexion with the jacobinism which, under the name of reform, has of late made so many efforts against the public peace. The object has been, as in France, to bring about a revolution, and the means thought essential to it are the same. Civil war, plunder, and murder are with difficulty reconciled to men's consciences, and, therefore, conscience itself (an inconvenient barrier) was to be taken away. The bad characters and morals of the leading reformers needed some apology; and their followers, many of whom had their old notions of the propriety of virtue in a public man, were told that such notions were antiquated prejudices, not to be tolerated in an "age of reason." In a word, the worst purposes have been formed, and attempts have been made, most zealously and extensively made, to deprave the populace into meet instruments to accomplish them by disseminating among them, through the medium of newspapers, pamphlets, and the works uttered by thousands by the wretched man who is about so justly to suffer the infliction of the violated laws of his country. As the nation owes much to the Juries on the two trials of Carlile, for the firm and faithful manner in which they have done their duty, notwithstanding the clamour, and even menace, of the reforming faction, who, one and all, knew too well the importance of bad principles to their cause, not to be most anxious that their dissemination should not be checked; so is it equally indebted to the dignified firmness of the Lord Chief Justice for interfering to prevent the success of the plot laid down by the junta of infidels, whose organ and agent Carlile is to get the whole of their collected blasphemies on the records of the proceedings of the Court, in order to their safe publication. Too much of this is done already; the leniency of our excellent laws to the accused being thus abused by this set of wicked men, through Carlile, their agent. To republish the Age of Reason in the report of the trial, was Carlile's object in reading it through. For the same object he wished to read the works of other blasphemers; but in this he was prevented by the Court, and the object of his abettors frustrated. The whole of these proceedings, illustrating as they do the character of the reforming faction, is full of admonition to the country. Those who would change her laws would also destroy her religion. Against every thing sacred in our constitution, whether civil or religious, we discover the most malignant enmity and the bitter hostility. This poison they would introduce, through the medium of turbulent politics and lying pretensions, into the cottages of the poor, and among the industrious ranks of our citizens, breaking down every barrier against immorality, giving the sanction of Heaven itself to every species of license and violence, and pouring as in France, the inundation of vice of every kind over every part of the country, unchecked by laws in this life, or the fears of a world to come.
