The " Farmer" of S: Mary's has, I believe, taken leave of you altogether. Whether he has taken another trip to see his Timber at the Wapskahagan, or gone on a visit to the Pizgahagan, to speculate in saw logs, or is engaged in canvassing for the approaching Election, in his own Parish, is rather immaterial to your readers, if he is not to return to give them some account QUESTERED Village of Frederecton. Despairing of hearing from him again, I am not disposed to let the subject drop where he has deserted it, at the moment when all the Villagers felt peculiar interest. I will, therefore, beg permission to say a few words about the Village. I have been old that our Patriotic Governor Carleton, shortly after the Province was constituted, and he had attended to its general organitation) resolved to establish a Town at St. Ann's Point, (the former name of Fredelicton) as the seat of the Provincial Goernment---as the Metropolis of the Proince. The country was then in a wilder-

His Excellency possessed a strong mind, great foresight, and a truly patriotic spirit. He was willing to sacrifice his own ease and comfort, in the new City of His creation, for the purpose of promoting the true interest of the Province over which he was appointed to govern. I admit that he was, in the choice he made, induced by the great desire he had to rear up and bring to maturity his favorite and eldest child---the Patriotic City. He knew full well that unless the City had something to support it, his intentions would be frustrated. But I give him further credit for the measure which he adopted: He must have known, by consulting the Map, that he was placing the Seat of Government in a spot the most suitable of any other place in the Province. The City of St. John, at that time, was out of the question---it was then a small Fishing Town; its Magistracy and Common Council were not to be compared with those at present in office, or perhaps the City might have been sufficiently Patriotic to have endeavored, at least, to have convinced the Governor and Council of the absurdity of leaving so charming a spot, and a place so well adapted to the accommodation of the Province at large. However, as every thing else in the Province seems to be advancing in improvement, I know no reason why we should not suppose that the City, in this respect, has gone hand in hand with the rest. But is Fredericton really so situated as now to do credit to the election made of it for the Metropolis of the Province, by its first Governor and Council, all of whom are now mouldering in the dust? I think it is; and I think Governor CARLETON will be found deserving of the title given to him upon some other occasion -- "THE FATHER OF THE PROVINCE."

FREDERICTON is on a Point, formerly called St. Ann's, on the right bank of the Great River Saint John, at the distance of 80 miles from its mouth in the Bay of Fundy. The Town Plat is a mile in length, and has perhaps not far from 200 houses in it. The Public Buildings within the Town Plat are, the Province Hall, an Episcopal Church, and two neat Meeting-Houses for the Baptist and Methodist Societies, a College, a Public Market-House and County Court-House, and a Gael; add to these, Barracks for the accommodation of a full Regiment, with an Artillery Park and the necessary Store-Houses for the Military. The Government House and Farm, lately purchased by the Province for the use of the Governor, at an expence of about £4000, are adjoining to the Town on the upper end, and generally much admired by strangers, as a comfortable, convenient, beautiful establishment. The River is navigable for vessels of about 60 or 70 tons burthen, to Fredericton, and for boats thence to the Great Falls, at the distance of 428 miles, and much further by conveying the boats by land over a short Portage above the Fails. The Great Roads of communication centre at Fredericton, from St. John, St. Andrews. Westmortand, Miramichi, and the upper part of the County of York: from all which places Couriers arrive at Frederiction regularly at stated periods. The distance to St. John, by the land route, is 88 miles --- to \$t. Andrews, (by the present route, which may be shortened) is 87 miles--to Miramichi Court-House, is 110 miles --to Westmorland Court-House, about 150 miles --- and to the upper part of the County of York, is 100 miles.

Fredericton will be preserred as the Seat of Government, without doubt, by the Counties of York, Northumberland, and Sunbury: Queen's County may be doubtful. Northumberland and York are the two largest Counties in the Province -- the former is the largest of the two, and is nearly equal in extent to all the rest of the Province. The three Counties of York, Northumberland, and Sunbury, constitute threefifths, if not two-thirds of the Province in population as well as extent of territory.

FATAL DUEL

On Wednesday morning between the hours of 4 and 5 o'clock, a meeting took place near the North Farm, about two miles from town, between Richard John Uniacke, Esq. the younger, and Mr. William Bowie, both of this place; after exchanging the second shot the latter fell mortally wounded. Assistance was immediately procured when Mr. Bowle was conveyed to the Farm House, and a messenger dispatched for a Surgeon, who, upon his

arrival found Mr. Bowie's friend by his side. - On examining the wound, it. was ascertained the ball-which had entered a little above the right hip, had passed through to the left side, which was immediately extracted-but alas! human skill was in vain; the approaching hour of dissolution became visible, and at 10 minutes before 6 o'clock, on the evening of the same day, we lament to state, Mr. BOWIE breathed his last, in the 35th year of his

The dispute to which this unhappy event is to be attributed, arose from some observations made by Mr. Uniacke, when conducting a suit in the Supreme Court on Monday last, and which were considered by Mr. Bowie, as an unjustified attack upon his integrity and reputation. On the following day a correspondence passed between the parties, which unfortunately terminated in a Challenge.
