

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

27TH APRIL, 1819.

Papers to the 20th inst. have been received from St. John. — There was no arrivals at that port from Europe at the above date.

The following late intelligence is copied from the Halifax Journal, brought by the Louisa which arrived there in 30 days from Aberdeen.

LONDON, MARCH 10.

Mr. Grant gave notice, last night, in the House of Commons, that he would, on the 22d April, bring the Catholic Question under the consideration of the House.

Yesterday, about half past one o'clock, a Gentleman arrived at the Foreign Office, with Dispatches from Florence.

Lt. Col. Wright, R. E. sailed from Cork, in the Dick, naval storeship, on Wednesday last for Ceylon.

The Lord Bishop of Quebec and Family, and Capt. Robert Barrie, C. B. Commissioner of the Naval Yard at Quebec, and Family, will take their passage thither in the Active frigate—now fitting at Portsmouth.

We have received Paris Papers of Saturday last. The Moniteur contains an Ordinance of the King, constituting sixty new Peers, including those who have been deprived of their Seats by the Ordinance of the 24th July, 1815. In this new list we find the names of Soult, Suchet, Davoust, Rapp, Kellerman, Jourdan, Reille, Latour-Maubourg, Mortier, and others of the Revolutionary Generals, who, however, are now for the greater part, designated in this Ordinance, with the affectionate Title of Our Cousins.

The Transports with the 5th and 9th Regiments, for Barbados, and the 11th and 12th Regts. of Dragoons for the East Indies, have sailed from Portsmouth.

The Hon. Mr. Lamb, the new Member for Westminster, took his seat on Thursday in the House of Commons.

FELLOW SUBJECTS,

In what manner has the constitution put in your power immediately to express your freedom and your rights but in choosing from amongst yourselves, once in seven years, those who are to study your interests and welfare by devising the wisest regulations for the Society which they are chosen to represent, these are rights, which you inherit as a birthright from that parent state, whose happiness is yours.

Let us for a moment consider the object of this Election and what are the duties, which devolve upon those of your neighbours whom you Elect; in the first place they pledge themselves as Gentlemen, and honest men, that they will take upon them the Burthen of your Public concerns, and exercise their utmost ability and fidelity to manage them to your greatest advantage, they are to make it their study as well in the recess of their General Assembly, as when they are in Session, to know your particular situations, the most important of your interests, whether they relate to trade, Fisheries, or Agriculture, they are diligently to inquire whether rules or laws promoting these cannot be adopted consistent with the spirit and tenor of our Excellent Government, they are as far as in their power to provide supplies of money to defray all necessary expenses of Government, and for all Public improvements, in such manner as not to injure the laboring and landed interests which are the vital parts of every Society. To this end their views should be directed to those articles consumed in the country which are most expensive, and which none but the rich can afford, by this means none but the rich, and those who derive the most benefits from the Government are taxed, or if they are, are taxed according to their own free will and consent, these things the Candidates for your choice solemnly promise on condition you will exercise your dearest, and greatest privilege in their favour.

As you are soon to be called upon to elect representatives for those purposes for the next seven years, it cannot be improper, to diligently compare the conduct of those who have last been in, with the duties of their office, and the promises they made on entering thereon, if we find upon review that they have discharged their trusts in the most disinterested and faithful manner, if we find our prospects brightening, our credit increasing, our treasury enriched, our repu-

tion abroad on the rising hand, public improvements rapidly making, and all done by the prudent savings, and wise provisions of our Representatives, let us unite like grateful Brothers, and confer on them the applause, and the honor which they have purchased, but should we unfortunately find the reverse to be the truth, that they have caused incessant divisions and disputes between the different branches of the Legislature, by encroaching on the prerogatives of the best of sovereigns, by violating the constitution, which is the pride and boast of every true Briton; and if their conduct, by endeavouring and actually enriching themselves, at the risk of the public good, has made us ridiculous in the eyes of our neighbours, ought we not seriously to fix our thoughts on some, whose known characters as honest and public spirited men, will justify us in reposing this necessary confidence.

Let facts and reason speak, and let smooth tongued flattery be hooted to her Mole-hill, to eat the sweetmeats of two years growth.

PROROGATION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

At half-past one o'clock on Saturday last, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, attended as usual, went to the Council Chamber, and, being seated, sent a message to the House of Assembly, commanding the attendance of the Representative Body in the Council Chamber.—Mr. Speaker and the Members attended accordingly, when His Excellency was pleased to give his assent to several Acts; and afterwards to close the Session with the following Speech.

Mr. PRESIDENT, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council:

Mr. SPEAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I have observed, with great satisfaction, the zeal and continued attention which you have given to the Public service during this unusually long Session of Assembly.

Your loyal Address to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, on the death of Her late Majesty the QUEEN, has been transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary of State.

It is now my duty to express my sentiments on the measures which have come under your discussion, and particularly those which appeared to me to deserve your serious consideration.

The means you have provided for the founding a College in Halifax, and for the forming a Provincial Agricultural Society, are, I trust, sufficient to enable me to accomplish the first object; and to meet with effect in the other, the desire of the Country

to promote its Agriculture: I do entertain a confident hope that both of these Institutions will prove, in time, to be sources of great and permanent advantage to the Province.

I regret that the alterations I suggested for your consideration, in the system of Militia, and for the improvement of the Public Roads, have not been adopted: I regret this the more that I had been led to entertain better hopes in the commencement of the Session, and because I have seen that my intentions have been entirely misunderstood on both subjects.

I thank you for the supplies granted for the Public Services of the year, and particularly for the means you have placed at my disposal upon the new line of road from Annapolis.

I observe, with regret, that the appropriation Act contains a Vote which I could not approve under any circumstances, much less under the difficulties which are felt in a Revenue inadequate to the wants of the public Service. I mean the addition of Pay to Members of the House of Assembly; upon that point however, I have yielded my own opinion in deference to that of the other two Branches of the Legislature.

I have nothing now to recommend to you more earnestly, than that, in returning to your homes, you would animate in your respective Counties, the same loyal spirit which has distinguished your proceedings in Assembly; and that you would encourage that spirit of industry and improvement in Agriculture, which appears to be general at this time in the Province.

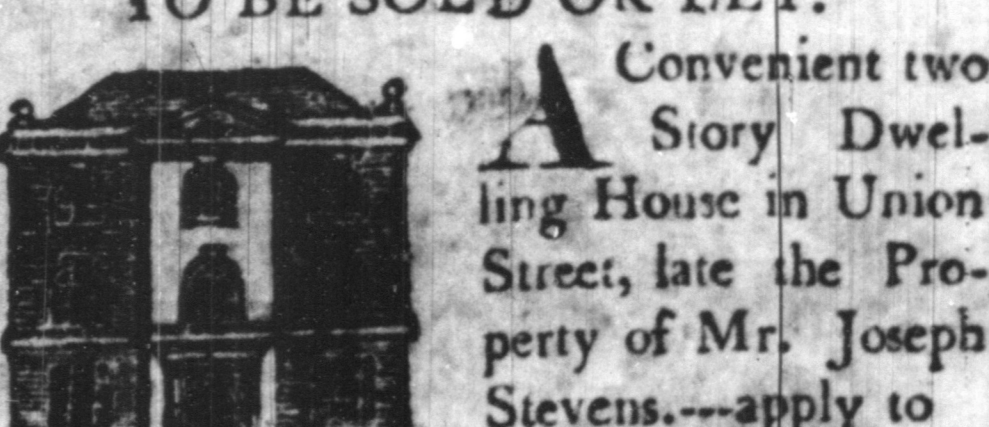
