On Friday the 20th Inst. we had the most tremendous Thunder storm here we ever remember, fortunately no damage was sustained in this Town, but at St. Stephen the house of Mr. STEPHEN HILL was struck with lightning. Mrs. Hill, who was in the cellar at the time, was knocked down and so severely wounded that her recovery is hopeless—eight bands were struck from her neck—she ran down her body & scorched her most severely, it tore off one of her stockings and one of her shoes though without injuring the leg or foot.—She was thought to be dead for more than one hour after the accident befel her, the house is damaged to the amount of more than one hundred pound—All the crockery and glass ware was shivered to pieces and many of the widows. It is a remarkable circumstance that tho' a daughter of Mrs. Hill was close by her mother when she was struck by the lightning, yet she was not in the least injured.

From the Free Press, 31st August.

In the Free Press of the 20th ult. we intimated to our readers that His Majesty's Ministers intended to reduce the Naval Establishments at Halifax; and made such observations upon the subject as at that time presented themselves. Orders have subsequently been received by the packet, stating explicitly how far the reduction is to extend, and that the Builder, one Clerk, six Shipwrights, a Painter, the Gate Porter and three other persons alone are to remain.

The London dates by the English mail which arrived yesterday, are only to the 10th of July. The Halifax papers contain dates to the 19th—from them we have copied the following:—

LONDON, JULY 19.

Lord Sidmouth has addressed circular letters to the Lords Lieutenants of the manufacturing Counties, calling their attention to the numerous Meetings held in those Counties and directed them to give orders to the yeomanry cavalry to hold themselves in readiness in case of need to assist the Magistrates in preservation of the public peace.

There are already six thousand Special Constables sworn-in before the Alderman of the City of London to preserve the peace of the Metropolis on Wednesday next. The arrangements made at the Office of the Secretary of State for the Home Department, for the same purpose, are on a most extensive scale.

The Firemen belonging to many of the Insurance-offices have been sworn in as special Constables, to act in case of emergency; and the members of the Hon Artillery Company have received Circular Letters, commanding their attendance at ten o'clock, on the morning of the 21st.

LEEDS, July 15.—We are so completely beset and hemmed in here, with Union and Reform Societies, and the Members of them are known to be so numerous, that the best informed persons—men who are by no means Alarmists, are apprehensive that some dire commotion will ere long take place. Mischief is certainly brewing, and the most nefarious means are taking to work upon and inflame the minds of the working classes.

From the Chester Chronicle. In the neighborhood of some towns eight or ten miles from Manchester, we are told the Members of the Union Societies assemble in the evenings and go through certain evolutions with all the regularity of military parade.
