LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

[EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS]
6th March.

County of Westmorland.

The sum of £35 from Sackville to Beaujogin.

The sum of £40 from Stephen Ward's to the half way house on Bay Verte Road.

The sum of £50 for building a bridge over Gaspereau River, near Otter Creek.

The sum of £25 from Bay Verte to the bridge on Gaspereau River.

The sum of £25 from Gaspereau bridge to Shamogue.

The sum of £16 from where the Road turns from the Shamogue Road to the Little Shamogue.

The sum of £10 from Bay Verte to Tignish River.

The sum of £20 from Shamogue to Beaujogin.

The sum of £35 from Westcock to Cape Maranguin.

The sum of £15 from Sinton's to Babcock's, on the Paulet River.

The sum of £60 from Sinton's to Stoncy Creek bridge.

The sum of £25 from Dutch Village to Hopewell.

The sum of £25 from New-Horton to Cape Enrage.

The sum of £15 for completing the bridge over Crooked Creek, in Hopewell.

The sum of £20 from Memramcook Island to the main.

The sum of £30 for the Great Road, in Sackville, to the Settlement back of the Mill-Pond.

The sum of £25 from Sherman's to the North branch of Petticodiac River.

The sum of £24 from Jacob Wortman's to the Baternut Ridge.

The sum of £65 for building a bridge over Stony Creek, in Hillsborough.

The sum of £20 from Turtle Creek bridge to the Settlement on said Creek.

County of Northumberland.

The sum of £175 to explore, lay out

and open a Road from the River Nepisigwit to the River Restigouche.

The sum of £75 to open and improve a Road from the new Settlement near the head of the tide on Napan River, to the River Miramichi, near the Church in Chatham.

The sum of £35 to explore, lay out, and open a Road from the South-West branch of Miramichi River, nearly opposite Barnaby's Island, to the North-West branch of said River.

The sum of £50 towards opening and improving the Road, through the Indian land, from Caul's Cove to its termination near Oxford Brook.

The sum of £50 towards completing a bridge at Caul's Cove.

The sum of £40 towards erecting a bridge over Blake's brook.

The sum of £10 towards exploring and laying out a Road from the new Settlement on the River Napan, near the head of the tide, to Black River---the former Road, near the mouth of said River, leading through almost impassable bogs.

The sum of £25 towards improving the Road from Black River to Bay Du Vin River.

The sum of £25 towards improving the road from Bay Du Vin River to Dennis' Creek.

The sum of £25 towards completing the bridge at Dennis' Creek.

And further Resolved, that the monies appropriated for the further improvement of the Bye Roads and Bridges in the above resolutions, be not made payable at the Public Treasury, until the 1st day of December next.

Monday, Feb. 18th.

On motion of Mr. Campbell, Resolved, that an humble address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, stating, that the House of Assembly have learnt, with surprise and regret, that bonds are taken at the office of the Deputy-Surveyor of Woods, for one shilling per ton on all Licences to cut and manufacture Pine Timber, in this Province---which measure must prove highly injurious, and, if persisted in, ruinous to the Timber Trade of the Province---And praying, that His Excellency will be pleased to inform the House, if any recent instructions have been received from His Majesty's Ministers, requiring such bonds to be taken; and that He will also be pleased to inform the House, to what purposes the large sums arising therefrom, are to be appropriated.

A Bill "further in addition to the Act now in force, for the encouragement of Schools in this Province." and

A Bill, "to enable the Province Treasurer to borrow the sum of Nine Thousand Pounds for paying off bounties and other debts, payable by the Laws of this Province." was read as engrossed and sent to the Council for their concurrence.

Mr. Pagan, pursuant to leave brought in a Bill, "to regulate the Herring Fisheries in the Parish of West-Isles, Campo Bello, Pennfield, and Saint George, in the County of Charlotte."--- which was read a first time.

A Bill, "to explain and amend an Act, intitled "an Act for regulating Marriage and Divorce, and for preventing and punishing Incest, Adultery, and Fornication." was ordered to be engrossed.

A Bill, "to explain and amend an Act, intitled an Act "to impose a duty upon certain articles imported into this Province." was concurred in by the Council.

Mr. Allen, pursuant to leave brought in a Bill, "to prevent Desertion from His Majesty's Forces, and to punish unlawful dealings with Soldiers or Deserters." which was read the first time.

Mr. Pagan, from the standing Committee to examine and liquidate private and public accounts, further reported, that

R, is James Brittain's report, with account, vouchers, and affidavit, as Supervisor on the road between Gage-Town and the Devil's Back.

He charges the sum of £34 : 7 : 8, being the balance due to him per his report in 1817; also £256 : 15 : 10, expended in 1817 and 1818---In which sum is included £8 for his services, in attending to the alterations of the road near the Ocnabog, and to the statute labour in opening the same, and to some contracts of 1817 which had not been completed---The whole making £291 : 3 : 6.

He credits the sum of £283 : 6 : 8, received in 1818 out of the Treasury, in Treasury notes---leaving a balance in his favour of £7 : 16 : 10.

He states, that in consequence of his being obliged to take Treasury notes, which he could not get labour for in payment without a great discount, he has been prevented from completing the frame part of the bridge over Richard's Creek; and that the Contractors for the other work, to the amount of £92 : 2 : 6, decline taking notes in payment---which, therefore, remain in his hands. He has received no warrant for the grant of 1818.

S, is report of Caleb Wetmore, one of the Supervisors for the road from Saint John to the Finger-Board, accompanied with account, vouchers, and affidavit.

He states, that the previous sickness and death of his colleague, occasioned the care of a large district to fall under his charge, that the principle work was done in 1818, a great deal of it by day's work, which required his personal attendance.

He has removed the great difficulty connected by the Inhabitants of Sussex Valley, in getting the road through very rocky ground, between the Ferry and Finger-Board, by the sum of £348 : 10 : 6---and the sums expended on the same road, in 1817, is £153 : 4 : ---In which sums is included £45---charged for his services---These amount to £501 : 14 : 6---two specific grants were made for £525---leaving the sum of £23 : 5 : 6 unexpended.

He states, that owing to the Treasury notes not passing a par, and his not receiving a warrant for any part of the grant for 1818, he has been put to great inconvenience and difficulty to comply with his engagements; and it being indispensibly necessary that he should give his personal attendance to the work, he trusts that his charge of £45 will be allowed.

He represents, that the sum of £125 will probably be wanted to complete the road above the Ferry---the sum of £25 to repair the road between the Settlement near the Kennebeckacis and Stewart's corner---and a further sum will be wanted between the Ferry at Golding's and the City.

He states, that an alteration of about 50 rods appears absolutely necessary in the road near Humphry Bull's, to avoid a hill and streighten the road---which will cost about £15.

T, is Benjamin Wilson's report, with account, vouchers, and affidavit, as one of the Supervisors for the road from Fredericton to the Missisquoi.

He states, that he has continued to make improvements on the road, by turnpiking and repairing---That he has contracted for timber for a bridge over the Tantarar river, in Sackville, which will cost about £100---That he finds it will be necessary to build a new bridge over Fox Creek, which will cost about £40---That he is to pay £45 to the Commissioners of Sewers for Sackville---and that he has paid several sums for labour, for which he has not yet had opportunity to get receipts.

He represents, that £800, in addition to the balance in hand, will enable him to put all the bridges and roads in a comfort-
