

From the St. Andrews Herald Sept. 7.

Mr. Editor,
I beg to trouble you with the following copy of a hand bill or advertisement which has accidentally come into my possession, the counter part of a hundred others: it will shew the community what means some part of mankind will resort to for the sake of gain! it is high time that the British Legislature should interfere and adopt some plan of putting a stop to or controlling this species of traffic. You will notice that the advertiser commences with informing the public that the "Commercial Packet is bound for St. Andrews, in the River St. John," he goes on to say "Persons wishing to go to the United States or any part of the Western Country thereof, have a cheap and easy opportunity by inland water conveyance on arrival," further "that Emigrants will find immediate employment on landing, Labourers 5 to 8 Shillings per day, and Tradesmen from 12 to 20 Shillings per day, and provisions remarkably cheap"—The whole of this representation is false. What does that man deserve, who will so wilfully and so designedly attempt to mislead the ignorant and unfortunate? When I look around and see so many indigent and miserable emigrants at the corner of every street, with melancholy and gloomy countenances, inwardly cursing their seducers, I cannot contain my feelings or refrain my indignation. It is not necessary to tell you Mr. Editor, though it is to tell those in Ireland who shall see this, that by reason of the ignorance of the nature of the work and the customs of this Country, an emigrant on his arrival can get very small wages indeed, forty five out of fifty cannot find employment on any terms, such as are so fortunate as to procure it, get in this town generally three shillings and six pence to four shillings and six pence sterling per day, I speak of common laborers, the best mechanics in the country, brought up in it, with the interest of connections and a correct knowledge of what is wanted in their departments, earn nine shillings per day, inferior ones pro rata, and these wages to Laborers and Mechanics are only to be obtained about eight months in a year; during the winter months and that a New Brunswick winter, they go unemployed nine days out of ten; the customary wages of laborers employed in country work is about twenty five shillings per month for a single month or twelve guineas per year, their situation is preferable to that of the town laborer, but in a country like this, so large a proportion of it a wilderness, but few are wanted and the market for them has been long much overstocked. The expense of travelling from this to any of the Western States is great, the distance immense: it is true that to the Sea Ports of the United States, emigrants may be conveyed at a moderate expense, but as to our inland water conveyance, it extends twenty miles, enters the wilderness and penetrates into the residence of Bears, Wolves and Foxes, where the foot of man never yet made its impression. Hitherto the Legislature of this Province has done nothing (would to God they soon may) to assist emigrants to settle on the new lands, (through Providence has blessed it with hundreds of thousands of acres in this and the neighbouring Counties, of most excellent quality) and immense numbers are to be seen tramping from place to place, poor, miserable, wretched, houseless, dragging on a precarious existence, often, very often, depending on the charity of individuals. It is but just however to state that a good Mechanic, industrious and sober, has a certainty of obtaining in this Country a respectable livelihood, as he would in most others, but not at that extravagant rate which the Gaiway advertiser holds forth, for though wages are higher here than in Ireland, so are rents, provisions and clothing and our Winters much colder and longer. As to the mere laborer, without money, without friends and unknown, his situation is miserable indeed, this Country as well as all the Sea board of the United States being inundated with such characters.
