

arrival at Lima, in this they succeeded, and on meeting the expedition, the Spanish troops on board, instead of fighting, rose upon their officers, put a number of them to death and, having communicated with the Chili squadron, the whole fleet was immediately put in their possession. The signals and instructions being thus in the power of the Patriots, and finding the Spanish troops disposed to act in concert with them, both squadrons set sail for Callao, (the port of Lima); the government of that place not aware of what had happened, permitted the troops to march immediately from Callao to Lima, and these having been joined by a party of Chilian land forces, the city was taken by surprise without any loss.

MR. PRINTER.—In an address lately printed at Fredericton and circulated in this city, entitled "A Friendly Address to the Congregation of Christ Church, Fredericton—By the Rev. J. Milne, A. I demand an explicit answer to these queries, and if that is not given within a competent time, I shall consider the author as convicted of a base, unfounded, and unjustifiable attack on the Scottish nation, which I hope will meet with the castigation which it deserves.

Surely a perverse ingenuity alone, can torture the passage quoted from Mr. MILNE, into a "base, unfounded attack."—We have all heard the adage, "Let him whom the Cap fits were it"—but I fear "Scoto" has been aided by a touched conscience in framing a Cap of dishonor out of his own materials, and in fitting it to his own head. If he can, as a pre-requisite, arrive at candor (otherwise the attempt will be vain), I would recommend his acquiring the various (not partial) reading and knowledge connected with the subject, after which I think his own mind will acknowledge the entire truth of Mr. MILNE's remark. That Gentleman cannot of course reply to anonymous attacks, but should any thing respectable appear, with the name of its Author, there is no reason to doubt he will afford it a proper notice.

FREDERICTON, (N.B.)

8TH JUNE, 1819.

On Friday last our Most Gracious and venerable Sovereign entered the eighty-second year of His age: The morning was ushered in by a display of colours from the different signal staffs in this place, and at 12 o'clock a Royal Salute was fired in honor of the day, and the remainder spent with the conviviality usual on such an occasion.

WILLIAM F. ODELL, Esq. arrived here on Friday last from the U. States, via St. John.

London, April 13. It was reported yesterday, that the health of our aged Monarch had undergone a change for the worse, within these few days.

A Supplement to the ASIATIC MIRROR of December 23, says—"The time has at length happily arrived, when we may congratulate the public on the complete TERMINATION of the KANDYAN REBELLION—all the Rebel Leaders of the first consequence, being now in our possession—not by treaty, or voluntary surrender; but Prisoners, fairly taken, by the indefatigable exertions of our brave troops; who have undergone a succession of hardships, labour and privations, with such cheerfulness and alacrity as must ever be remembered to their honor."

Halifax, May 28.

Our N.-York and Boston Papers are to the 20th inst. inclusive; but their European accounts are only to the 9th ult.

The departure of the Spanish Minister Don O'NEILL, who (as mentioned in our last) sailed from New-York in the Ship James Munroe has excited strong surmises in America, that their knowing ones have been taken in by the Don. Pensacola and Barancas were taken possession of by the Spanish Forces from the Havana on the 8th of February; and a detachment of 270 had been sent to occupy the post of St. Michael's, which was to be given up by the Americans stationed there. A clause in the late Treaty for the sale of the Floridas to the United States, guarantees all sales made by the Spanish Government previous to the 1st January, 1818; and it is now asserted, that no less than Eight Millions of Acres had been sold previous to that date—of which the purchasers will be put in full possession before the Treaty will be ratified by Ferdinand, or the Territory given up to the American Gov't.

CALL OF CONGRESS.

A Petition to the President is in circulation in Philadelphia, praying him to call and extra session of Congress. The following are the reasons assigned for this step:—

In consequence of the fall of our produce in foreign markets; of the great importation of foreign commodities; the prostration of our commerce, and the fall of real Estate; the Petitioners believe that an alteration in our tariff, or some other legislative provision, is indispensably necessary.

Extract from a letter dated N. York, April 28.

"By an Order received by the Collector of the Customs yesterday, from the Secretary of the Treasury, we learn that the Collector's conduct hitherto, in allowing *advalorem* goods to be entered by any Certificate, other than a Consuls, has been disapproved; and that, in future, no goods paying duty *advalorem*, will be allowed an entry without a Consul's Certificate attached, unless as follows:—

"The goods must be sent to the Public store, and there appraised, and then 50 per cent to be added to such appraisement, and duty charged on the whole; thus considering the entry as a fundamental one. The expense of sending articles to the Public stores is 10 dollars; and this added to the extra duty will operate against any thing paying *advalorem* duties from the British Colonies where no Consul resides.

"The articles from your quarter paying those duties, are Grindstones, smoked Herrings, Salmon, &c. &c."

BOSTON, MAY 19.

The premium on Spanish Dollars, we are pleased to find, is falling rapidly, in consequence probably of the demand for specie for the East-India trade having experienced some intermission. The premium on Dollars at New-York, which a few weeks ago was seven per cent is now from three to three and a half per cent. We have little doubt it will be yet less: and, should our hopes be realized, the pecuniary pressure of which we hear from every quarter, and which is felt to a certain degree in this District, may be expected to relax accordingly.

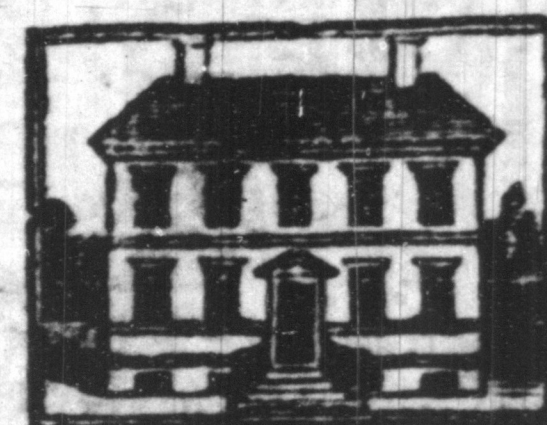
