" From official documents laid on the table of the British House of Commons, it appears that in the last seven years and a quarter, there had been imported in that time into Great-Britain, bread stuffs to the amount of one hundred and seventy-eight midions five hundred and seventy-two thousand two hundred and fifty-four dollars ninety nine cents!! The 'argest part of this importation was from the United States."

It is said that the King of Spain will not ratify the Treaty in Madrid, nor make any objections; but appoints an Envoy to the United States, to represent his objections, and receive the explanations of the Presi-

Military Defence.

A Sacket's-Harbour Paper of Nov. 16, says :- - By the military movements in Canada we should infer that the time is not far distant when they contemplate another war with this country .--- Their forces have been greatly augmented this season; their vessels at Kingston are kept in such order, that they can be rigged and ready for sea at a week's. notice. Their armies are busily engaged in erecting powerful and permanent fortifications. Kingston at this time is strongly fortified at every point; while at Sacket's-Harbour, an important military post, there are millions of public property going to decay, and not a single work of defence.

Commercial Treaty with France.

One of our London letters received to day says, " We understand that a Commercial Treaty with France is now forming, constructed on principles of the most liberal policy, and equally calculated to advance the real interests of both countries. French wines and silks, it is said, are to be admited into this country at a lower rate of duty--and France, in return, is to admit our cotton goods (which are now wholly prohibited) at a rate of duty which will render their general use extremely probable." --- Cork pap. Sept.

ST. JOHN, DEC 7.

Melancholy Catastrophe. It is our painful duty this week to record the premature death of three of our most useful and valuable fellow citizens; all housekeepers, and two of them have left a numerous progency. On Tuesday sennight, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, Capt. Beyea, who had lately taken out a Branch as Pilot for this Port, accompanied by Mr. R. Hardenbrook, Mr. T. Ellison, and Mr. 7. Spears, left Partridge Island at the entrance of this harbour, in pursuit of a vessel then in sight; but the wind blowing hard from the S. W. at the time with a heavy sea, they could neither gain their object or the place where they started from, determined to bear away for Red Head. When within hail of the shore the boat shipped a sea which swamped andupset her, in sight of several spectators. Capt. Beyea and Mr. Spears both clung to the boat for some time, when the former lost his hold, and with Hardenbrook and Ellison met a premature death! - Spears was, by the greatest exertions of one of the spectators of this dismal scene, rescued almost lifeless, from a similar fate. This truly melancholy carastrophe has involved in extreme distress, two old and respectable families of this City.

-Capt. Beyen has left a numerous offspring, as also an aged mother to lament his premature loss .- Mr. Hardenbrook has left a family of small children to bemoan the death of a tender father. - and Mr. Ellison, who had been married but about two months; has left a wife to bewail the loss of a tender husband.

The body of Capt. Beyea was picked up the same evening; -Mr. Ellison the day following and were conveyed to their respective dwellings in town; -on Friday their remains were interred in the burying ground, followed to their graves by a numerous train of sympathizing relatives and friends. The body of Mr. Hardenbrook was picked up on Sunday and brought to town.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Our venerable and afflicted sovereign entered on Monday upon the sixtieth year of his reign—a reign now longer in its duration, by nearly four years, than that of any former sovereign on the English Throne, that of Henry the Third being barely fifty-six years.
