WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province, stands prorogued to the Third Tuesday in January next: I have thought fit, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly; and the same is hereby prorogued to the FIRST TUESDAY in FEBRUARY next ensuing--then to meet at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

LONDON, OCTOBER 28.

It is the remark of almost every person who has lately visited the Continent, that the happy and contented state of France affords a strong contrast to the gloomy discontent and misery which prevails more or less in every other country of Europe. Spain is now in a condition to excite the pity of its worst enemies.

Again, what can well exceed the miserable condition of Italy? a great part of whose population, a prey to misgovernment and the tyranny of foreigners, is driven by desperation to the most abandoned courses, and where the governments have no other means of making head against banditti than razing large towns to the ground? In Germany the discontent has long been almost universal in many of the States; and the means lately resorted to, cannot fail to add to it. Distress and discontent become every day more prevalent in our own country, and when we look into futurity, the prospect is still more gloomy.

On the representation of the Captains commanding the large ships in ordinary on the Canadian Lakes, Warrant Officers have been appointed to all vessels; some of which are large first rates, as the following list, which we have been favored with, will shew. This is a wise measure, and ought to have been adopted sooner. We hear, also, that an extra number of Warrant Officers are to go out for the purpose of providing for casualties.

Nos. 1 and 2, in frame, 118 guns; St. Lawrence, 122; Prince Regent, 64; Psyche, 54; Princess Charlotte, 42; Niagara, 52; Montreal, 21; Star, brig, 14; Charwell, brig, 14; Nedley, schooner, 9; Gun boats Nos. 1, 2, and 3, one 24 pounder each; ditto, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11, two 24 pounders each.

On Lakes Erie and Huron.—Tecumseh, schooner, 8 guns; Newash, do. 8; Confidence, do. 2; Surprise, do. 2; Sank, do. 2; Huron, do. 2.

A number of towns have loyally offered to raise Volunteer Corps at their own expense, for the preservation of the public peace.

The disbanding of the 25th Light Dragoons, lately arrived from India, has been countermanded; and orders have been given to suspend all further reductions in the Regular Army.

The idea of calling another meeting at Manchester is abandoned.

Three Noble Lords have each been mentioned as the successors of Earl Fitzwilliam: the Duke of Portland, Earl Harewood, and Lord Grantham.

Earl Grosvenor has refused to contribute towards raising an additional Armed Force in the County of Chester.

A large meeting of Reformers has been held at Rutherglen, Scotland. The President wore the Cap of Liberty, and the Emblems of Revolution. A large meeting has also been held at Mauchline: They came to the meeting to the tune of—"The Campbells are coming," played on the Scots Bagpipes.

Every thing that can be learnt of the proceedings of those desperate and deluded men, the adherents of Thistlewood, Watson, and Preston, leads us to believe, that unless very closely watched, or powerfully restrained, they will, on Monday next, produce some serious disturbance. Since their quarrel with Hunt, they are determined, we hear, to discard his flag and cockade, which are red, and to assume a new one, which will be green and white.

Their arrangements for the Meeting at Finsbury-Market are said to be on a large scale. The following has been communicated to us as an outline. The assemblage

will not come together promiscuously, as has been usual with the Reform Meetings in the Metropolis; but they will proceed to the place of rendezvous in regular divisions, under their respective leaders. It is ascertained that 20 stand of colours are prepared for the occasion.

These madmen have openly and repeatedly avowed their intention of going armed to their meetings; and it is well ascertained that some of them have secretly furnished themselves with arms for that purpose.

The Counter Declaration of the County of York, has already been signed by nearly two thousand individuals, and among the signatures, which comprise considerable more Freeholders, both in point of property and numbers, than those who attended the meeting in the Castle-Yard, we observe with real pleasure, the names of many gentlemen of distinction.

MANCHESTER.—A Declaration of Loyalty and attachment to Church and State, signed by above a thousand of the Inhabitants of Manchester, was on Monday presented to the Prince Regent. A hope is expressed in this declaration, "that the wisdom of the Prince Regent's Councils and the authority of the British Legislature, will permanently secure from violation and abuse, privileges which are so dear (as the freedom of the Press and the right to Petition) to the heart of every Briton." Referring to the conduct of the Magistrates, it is remarked, that—"It will be obvious to every one who gives the subject a calm and dispassionate attention, that the Magistrates and others of our fellow-townsmen, who have been so wantonly assailed with insult and abuse, are solely withheld from vindicating themselves from these calumnious aspersions by a firm and magnanimous sense of public duty, by a determination not to suffer any personal feelings of injury and insult to betray them into those premature disclosures, which might defeat the salutary ends of public justice."

Some of the papers have intimated, that a part of the Grenville party were to be admitted into the Ministry, but the Courier asserts, that no change would take place in the Ministry.

OCTOBER 30.

We lay before our readers, this day, an ample account of the proceedings which took place yesterday at Norwich, where the Norfolk County Meeting was held. Pursuant to a requisition, signed by the Duke of Norfolk, and other Noblemen and Gentlemen. The space which we have been anxious to devote to the meeting itself, must necessarily circumscribe our comments upon it. To our great surprise, his Grace the Duke of Norfolk was not there himself. No cause was assigned for his absence. The meeting was not numerous; scarcely three thousand persons being present. Lord Albemarle opened the business in a speech, which vehemently insisted upon "a revolution being at hand."

The language of the Declaration is sound and constitutional. Whilst, on the one hand they recognize the undoubted right of the subject to meet and discuss grievances, they, on the other, deprecate the alarming abuse of this right which has lately taken place. They not only avow their rooted attachment to the King and Constitution, and their deep abhorrence of the impiety and sedition so widely disseminated of late in speeches, pamphlets, and newspapers; but they pledge themselves to resist, to the utmost of their power, all attempts to subvert the Constitution and overawe the Constituted Authorities.
