

Action, and pleading therein, or any Costs thereon, in relation to any Acts, Matters, or Things done, or that may be done by any Officer of Customs or Excise, or by any Officer of His Majesty's Navy, under any Act of Parliament in force on or immediately before the passing of this Act, for the Protection of the Revenues of Customs and Excise, or Prevention of Smuggling, shall apply and be in full Force in any such Action or Suit as shall be brought for any Thing done in pursuance of this Act, in as full and ample a Manner to all Intents and Purposes as if the same Privileges and Protections were repeated and re-enacted in this Act.

XII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to subject to any Penalty any Person who shall enter into the Military Service of any Prince, State, or Potentate in Asia with Leave or Licence, signified in the usual Manner, from the Governor General in Council, or Vice President in Council, of Fort William in Bengal, or in conformity with any Orders or Regulations issued or sanctioned by such Governor General or Vice President in Council.

HALIFAX, SEPT. 24.

The latest accounts from Bermuda (Sept. 20) state, that the Yellow Fever had been dreadfully destructive in those Islands: It had, happily, begun to abate at St. George's; but still continued its ravages in the Garrison, &c.

On Sunday morning Rear Admiral GRIFFITH hoisted his Flag on board the Newcastle, of 60 guns, Rear Admiral of the Red; which was saluted by Fort Charlotte, and H. M. ships in the harbour.

In the Circuit Court, at Annapolis, on the 14th inst. came on the trial of TIMOTHY A. RUGGLES, for the murder of Alexander Cummins, by giving him a blow with a stick, of which blow he died.—Verdict *Manlaughter*.

JOHN DURNAY, schoolmaster, found guilty of a brutal attempt on the person of a girl scarcely ten years of age, was sentenced to stand in the pillory, and suffer one month's imprisonment.

An indictment was found, on the last day of the Term, against several persons suspected of the murder of an Indian.—As the Court could not extend the Term, and it was impossible to have proceeded to the Trial on that day, the Judges, upon application of the Crown Officer, deferred the Trial, and the prisoners were accordingly remanded.

Hamilton, Bermuda, August 21.

It is with real regret that we see our obituary register so much enlarged this week, from the melancholy effects of a bilious remittent fever which has broke out in the town of St. George. One or two cases of the same type of fever have also occurred in our own immediate vicinity: and we have this morning heard that there are two cases likewise at Somerset.

St. George's, August 25.
We had restrained (from prudential motives) to mention the present sickly state of our town; but as it has now become notorious through the medium of another paper, we need no longer remain silent. What more particularly induces us to mention it on the present occasion is, that our medical practitioners are almost either sick themselves or have become exhausted by their arduous duties.—Drs. Gilbert and Cooke have kindly tendered their services, for which they deserve the highest commendations.

September 3.
We are happy to announce, that the fever has ceased to rage so violently in our town. We have heard of no new cases to day; and we believe there were but one or two yesterday.

From the Halifax Free Press, Sept. 28.

The sloop Helen on her passage from Grenada, fell in with the Venezuela Republican brig of war General Urdaneta, Joseph John King, Commander, carrying 18 guns, with a complement of 116 men, chiefly British and Americans 9 days from Margareta, on a cruise, who informed them that their naval force was 50 sail under Brian.

Capt. King also informed Capt. W. that, on the 15th of July the Moro of Barcelona, containing 6 bastions, mounting 25

guns, was captured by the fleet, and the Town of Barcelona taken by the British and German Legion, consisting of 2000 men, and on the 28th they blew up the forts and abandoned it.—On the 3d of August they commenced the attack up Cumana.

A transport had arrived at Margareta with 250 men, being a part of 5000 on their way out, under the command of Gen. Deveraux; and a strong reinforcement was shortly expected to join the Venezuelan squadron.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—The Caffre war still continues to rage. Mr. Albricht, writes, that "it is impossible to describe the condition we are in.—I can only state a few particulars. Nearly 800 head of cattle are taken from Theopolis, which we were obliged to see driven away, without being able to prevent it; we are surrounded with Caffres, who are only waiting an opportunity to rush in upon us; the whole country between this and Uitenage is deserted by its inhabitants; the dwellings of the farmers are burnt, the military stations forsaken, and some officers and others murdered; our remaining cattle are kept in the village, the women and children sleep in the place of worship, and the church and village are defended by 100 of our people in possession of fire arms—we have hardly any rest day or night—all is confusion and distress—our friends at Graham's Town have invited us to come to them, but I cannot prevail upon myself to quit my station; were we to leave this place, the houses would all be burnt, our corn would all be destroyed, and the Hottentots would be discouraged. On the 9th of February last, the Moravian New Settlement at the White River, was attacked by the Caffres, who drove away 235 head of their cattle—the people were in the most imminent danger; and by another letter, dated the 9th of March, they went on plundering and murdering those who opposed their thefis."
