

In the night of the 24th inst. a person was apprehended in the act of taking away fish from the flakes of Messrs. Humphrey & Foster on the Island of Campo-Bello, near the S.W. side of the harbour of Snug Cove. A warrant being issued to the proper officer to take the offender into custody, and to bring him before the Magistrate for examination, he was thereupon interrogated respecting the fact, which he confessed under the name of Francis Appleby, declaring that he was born at L'Orient, in France, had a sch'r in possession about ten tons burthen, which he then used alone and generally without another person to assist him: that he had no settled abode, but stayed in Cumberland last winter, and at the east end of Deer-Island during the summer. In excuse he pleaded that he was drunk, and did not know what he did. The quantity of dried fish taken was laid under the value of Twenty Shillings, and he was committed to St. Andrews gaol for speedy punishment, under a special act of the Province of New-Brunswick. From his apparent sorrow for what he had done, he was allowed to go in his vessel with the Deputy Sheriff and one young man: but near the beach of the eastern entry into St. Andrews, he watched his opportunity, pushed the officer overboard, drew a dirk against the other man, who jumped overboard, and the villain escaped through Le Tite in his vessel. The Deputy Sheriff, Joseph Russell, got to his own boat, (which was ashore) with great difficulty, and with the loss of a surcoat and hat. The other man left part of his clothes behind, which the villain carried away. It is very necessary for the inhabitants of Passamaquoddy to be very vigilant in taking such pilferers, and in securing them to be punished. Scarce a week passes without complaints of the loss of boats, sails, boat ropes, oars, fish and other articles. The offender is about sixty years of age, near five feet seven inches high, broad chest, greyish hair, speaks the French language similar to the inhabitants of Brittany in France—and ought to be secured. It is supposed that he went across the Bay of Fundy to the South Shore.

"Stale news, by George!" cries one; "insipid, miserable stuff!" reiterates another. What now, Mr. Printer?—To make war between nations and elements—announce Comets, Earthquakes, Torridons, Visions, and the discovery of inhabitants in the centre of the earth, by Symmes; to say the Sea-Serpent travelled by land from Boston harbor to Pittsburgh; to assert that Bonaparte had escaped from St. Helena, and betrayed Louis XVIII.—all won't do. "Zounds! what liars the printers are," every body exclaims, and the poor printer would stand at his press, scratching his head like a boy when he broke his master's beer mug. Nothing is now left but to throw ourselves on the generosity of our readers, to

promise endeavors, and beg them to reflect that "where there are many men, there are many minds."
