LATEST FROM GIBRALTAR .- OUT Norfolk Correspondent has furnished us with a proof sheet containing the following letter from his Correspondent at Gibral-

" GIBRALTAR, Jan. 5, 1819. "The only news I have to give you is, the deat! of the Queen of Spain, last week. A pretty general rumour is in circulation that she was poisoned: but why she should have been the victim of secret resentment is not stated; and as the King has certainly removed to the Escurial since the demise of his Consort, it has been whispered in no very low tone, that the germs of revolt have hecome so apparent as to render some prepasation for his safety a matter of necessary precaution. There are some however, who say, that the King has absented himself from his Court, only from a pious inclination to brood over his grief in tranquility. But nothing authentic can be known abroad, and rupture outright will perhaps take place before it is known beyond the vicinity of the Capital. Certain it is that the sufferings of the Spanish people have reached that climax when "forbearance ceases to be a virtue!" and they are fully sensible of it. An uncommonly intelligent Spaniard with whom I have conversed, states, that the nation is now ready for the worst, and must ere long give a loose to their indigna-

London, Detember 21. We are still unable to lay before our readers any certain information tespecting the state of Spain. It would appear from a private letter from Madrid, of the 31 inst. published in The Courier of Saturday, and from a letter from the same place, and of the same date in the Paris papers, that bands of armed men are roaming up and down the country, and that " these bands are principully composed of soldiers whom the fear of embarking for America, has induced to desert their corps." How far this breaking up of the Spanish army may be connected with the disturbances which are reported to have taken place at Madrid, remains to be arcertained. That the Spanish army is generally disaffected, was already pretty well known; and how indeed should it be otherwhen it is neither paid, clothed, nor £ 1? An army in such a state can give no pretection to Ferdinand, and the only wonder is that an attempt should not before have been made by some of the many who must

All we can say is, that if the Spaniards suffer a man like this to reign over them long, they deserve no better Government.

DECEMBER 26. Letters from Amsterdam state, that a Commercial establishment which has attracted much notice from the extent of its speculations in the Government securities of France, is at length declared in a state of insolvency. The ruin of this house, which, though not perhaps of the first order, maintained a very high rank at Amsterdam, is chiefly to be ascribed to those speculations, of the magnitude of which some idea may be formed, by stating that at one period it held 4,000.000 of rentes, forming a capital of 80,000,000 of francs; and that every fall of one per cent. that took place in the funds, constituted a difference of more than £40,000, sterling.

KINGSTON, JAM. JANUARY 30.

A letter has been received from Lima, via. Porlo Bello, which states that there was a considerable sum of money ready at that place, for shipment, but in consequence of the activity of the Insurgents, it would be necessary to have a British man of war to protect it to Panama. It is likewise mentioned that the Spanish frigate Isabella, with transports having on board 2000 men, from Cadiz destined to Lima, had been captured by some Insurgent cruisers, and that the Royalists were in consequence intimidated in their movements.
