AT a Special Meeting of the Fredericton District Committee of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, at the Church, Fredericton, on Tuesday the 30th November, 1819, in pursuance of public Notice given in the said Church on Sunday the 21st of the same Month—

The President in the Chair—

Prayers—

Was read the Report of the Secretary, as follows, to wit,

"Pursuant to the Resolutions of this Committee at the General Meeting on the first Monday in January, 1819, the Secretary addressed letters to the Reverend the Rectors of Woodstock and Gage-Town, inviting them in the name of the Committee to join us together with such of their Parishioners as were disposed to become subscribing Members of the venerable Society. From neither of the Gentlemen to whom these letters were addressed, did he receive any answer in writing. He is, however, happy to be able to say, that they have since joined this Committee, and makes no doubt, that they will use their influence with their Parishioners to follow their pious and laudable example.

"Pursuant to the same Resolutions, the Secretary also addressed a letter to the Rev. Mr. PARKER, Assistant Secretary of the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge; informing the Venerable Society of the formation of a District Committee at Fredericton, requesting from them, for our infant establishment, all the fostering indulgence consistent with their standing Rules and Orders, and specifying the Books to be sent to us by the first vessel from London for St. John.

To this letter he received an answer, dated Bartlett's Buildings, London, April 21st, 1819. In this answer, Mr. PARKER, after saying that all the Books and Tracts specified in the application, would be forwarded to us by the first vessel from London for Saint John, goes on in these words:

"I beg leave to assure you, that the Society received the Official Intelligence of the formation of a District Committee at Fredericton, with great satisfaction; and that every aid will be afforded by the Society,

as far as may be consistent with the standing Rules and Orders, towards enabling the District Committee to carry their benevolent designs into effect.

"I request to be favoured with a copy of the Resolutions adopted at the primary Meeting of the District Committee."

The Resolutions here requested, were enclosed in a duplicate of the Secretary's letter to the Society. On the reception of them at Bartlett's Buildings, the following gratifying letter was written:

"Bartlett's Buildings, London,
May 31st, 1819.

"Reverend Sir,
"I have just had the honour of submitting the primary Resolutions of the District Committee at Fredericton, in the Province of New-Brunswick and in the Diocese of Nova-Scotia, (a copy of which was enclosed in the duplicate of your letter dated February 22d) to the consideration of the Committee for Correspondence with the Diocesan and District Committees.

"It affords me very great pleasure to acquaint you, that the Committee for Correspondence expressed their cordial and unqualified approbation of these Resolutions, which have been drawn up in strict conformity to the rules and orders of the Society. Having now had long experience of the beneficial effects resulting from the establishment of Diocesan and District Committees, they were sincerely rejoiced to hear of the formation of a Committee at Fredericton; and were led to anticipate many important advantages, both to the Society and to the cause of Religion, from the united exertions of the Clergy and Laity resident in that part of the Diocese of Nova-Scotia.

"I received particular directions to convey, through you, the best thanks of the Committee for Correspondence to the District Committee at Fredericton, for having favoured the Society with a copy of the primary Resolutions.

Since the receipt of this letter, which does so much justice to our intentions, and affords so much encouragement to our exertions, the Books ordered have arrived; and they are now in the Store of the Treasurer, Mr. SLASON.

We understand that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor with the advice of His Majesty's Council, has been pleased to give names to the Streets in this Town as follows, viz:—

- I. The Streets running lengthways.
 1. QUEEN-STREET—from the Corner near Judge Bliss' upwards to the turn of the Road.
 2. KING-STREET—from the Church Square to Fitzherbert's Corner
 3. BRUNSWICK-STREET—from Judge Saunders' corner, to the upper end of the Town
 4. GEORGE-STREET—the next to Brunswick Street.
 5. CHARLOTTE-STREET—the rear of the Town Plat
 6. PROVINCE-Road—from the lower end of Queen-Street downwards.
 7. FRONT-ROW—from the head of Queen-Street, upwards.
 8. WELLINGTON-STREET—from the upper end of King Street towards Government-House.
 9. WATERLOO-ROW—from McLeod's corner downwards.
- II. The Cross Streets.
 1. SENBURY-STREET—at the lower end of the Town-Plat
 2. CHURCH-STREET—passing the Chief Justices.
 3. ST JOHN-STREET—passing the Province-Hall
 4. REGENT-STREET—leading towards the New-Maryland Settlement.
 5. CARLETON-STREET—the center Street.
 6. YORK-STREET—the next to Carleton-Street
 7. WESTMORLAND-STREET—next to York-Street
 8. NORTHUMBERLAND-STREET—next to Westmorland-Street. And
 9. SMYTH-STREET—at the upper end of the Town-Plat, between it and the Government-Farm.

It is observable that the several Counties have been notified in this Nomination.

We have been favored with the loan of London Papers to the 13th October, inclusive:—They are principally filled with the proceedings of the Riots in that quarter.—A few extracts from them will be found in our columns of this day.

The Duchess of Berry was, on the morning of the 23d Sept. delivered of a daughter. The throne of France is thus still left without a successor in the reigning branch, from the only union which is likely to produce one.

The King of Spain has appointed the Duke de SAN FERNANDO, to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, vacant since the disgrace of the Marquis de CASA.

At Hantslet, the grand rendezvous of the seditions in this vicinity, meetings are held every night in a room hired for the purpose, which the Radicals call "The House of Commons."—Leeds Indepen.

In the Magnet which arrived at Liverpool from New-York, there were not less than 160 passengers who had emigrated during the last and present years, and who have returned to their native country.

Windsor-Castle, October 2.—His Majesty continues in a tranquil state of mind, and in good bodily health; but His Majesty's disorder is unabated.

London, Sept. 25.—A few individuals in Glasgow who, owing to the depressed state of trade and lowness of wages, had turned their attention to the British settlements in North America, formed themselves into a society denominated the Bridge-town Transatlantic Social Union Society. In July last they wrote to Earl BATHURST, wishing to know what assistance they might expect from Government in the prosecution of their design. In the course of fourteen days they received the following answer, accompanied with a duplicate of the conditions of emigrating to the Cape of Good Hope:

"Downing-Street,
"Colonial Department, 23d July, 1819.

"Sir—In reply to your letter dated the 8th instant, I am directed by Lord Bathurst to acquaint you that His Majesty's Government no longer give encouragement to persons proceeding as settlers to H. M. possessions in North America.

Foreign GOLD Coins have ceased to be a tender for the payment of debts in the United States, the legal currency consists of

- American Eagles—
- Half and quarter Eagles—
- French Crowns, weighing 18 dwts, 17 grs. at 110 cents each.
- Five franc pieces of France, at 93 cts. 3 mills each.
- American and Spanish milled dollars and part of dollars at the rate of 100 cents.
- French half crowns, and all other foreign coins, which have passed by common consent, form no part of the legal currency, and half crowns are refused by the Banks as coin.

Downing Street, Oct. 20.—His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint Lieut-General the EARL OF DALHOUSIE, G. C. B. to be Captain-General and Governor in Chief of the Provinces of Lower and Upper Canada, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, and the Islands of Prince Edward and Cape Breton.—His Royal Highness has also been pleased to appoint Major-General Sir JAMES KEMP, G. C. B. to be Lieutenant-Governor of Nova-Scotia and its dependencies.
