

His Royal Highness commands us to inform you, that the operations undertaken by the Governor-General in Council against the Pindarries, were dictated by the strictest principles of self-defence; and that in the extended hostilities which followed upon those operations, the Mahratta Princes were in every instance the aggressors. Under the provident and skilful superintendance of the Marquis of Hastings, the campaign was marked in every point by brilliant achievements and success; and His Majesty's forces, and those of the East-India company, (Native as well as European,) rivalled each other in sustaining the reputation of the British arms. The Prince Regent has the greatest pleasure in being able to inform you, that the trade, commerce, and manufactures of the country, are in a most flourishing condition. The favourable change which has so rapidly taken place in the internal circumstances of the United Kingdom, affords the strongest proof of the solidity of its resources.

To cultivate and improve the advantages of our present situation, will be the object of your deliberations: and His Royal Highness has commanded us to assure you of his disposition to concur and co-operate in whatever may be best calculated to secure to His Majesty's subjects the full benefits of that state of peace which, by the blessing of Providence, has been so happily re-established throughout Europe.

The Commons then retired, and the House adjourned till five o'clock.

His Honor the Chief Justice has been pleased to appoint Henry Bliss, Esquire, to be Clerk of the Supreme Court in this Province, in the room of William F. Odell, Esquire.

The January and February Mails arrived at the Post Office this morning. Later London dates have been received via the U. States than is furnished by them.

Windsor Castle, Feb. 6.  
"His Majesty has enjoyed an uninterrupted state of good bodily health, and has been very tranquil during the last month; but His Majesty's disorder remains unchanged."

An attempt has recently been made to rescue Bonaparte from his confinement at the Island of St. Helena, by an American vessel, put in there under pretence of being in distress. Their plans had nearly succeeded—Bonaparte left his room at midnight, and eluding the vigilance of seven sentinels, reached the shore; upon the signal being given, which was a lantern suspended at the end of his walking cane) it was observed by a sentinel that had been placed on the beach, which Bonaparte was not aware of, who, before the boat for his reception had reached the shore, seized and conducted him to the guard-house, from whence it is said he was conveyed back to Longwood, where he remained, at the latest dates, closely watched. The intelligence is from the London Morning Post, and said to be derived from an authentic source.

A report of the death of the King of France was current in London, but not believed.

**SAINT JOHN, APRIL 14.**  
No arrivals from Europe.

The brig *Triumph*, March 31, lat 33, 17 spoke to Harmony, Currie, from Jamaica bound to London.  
Captain Dewar, of sch'r *Fraser*, left at St. Vincent's, brig *Commerce*, M-Lean, of this port, and sch'r *Concord*, of St. Andrew's. April 21, spoke brig *Dasher*, out 7 days from Antigua, for Halifax, who reported the arrival of brig *Jane*, Green, hence 4 A.—On the 8 h, lat 42, 63, spoke ship *Margaret*, 42 days from Liverpool, for Boston, who informed, the ship *Waterloo*, Scott, hence, had arrived there about 20 days previous to the *M*'s sailing.  
The brig *Harmony*, Trueman, from hence, for Liverpool, was wrecked on the 17th January, at Rossleigh, Ireland—Eleven of the crew, including the Master, and two pilots, perished.

The brig *Triton*, Hogarth, from this port, for Liverpool, was fallen in with 14th January, in lat. 54, 39, long 26, 5, with loss of foremast, bowsprit, main-top-mast, boats, and every thing on deck, and a powder stove, by the Highlander, arrived in the Channel from Charleston, who took the Captain, 8 men, and 4 boys off the wreck, after having been ten days without either meat or drink; two men had died.  
The brig *Hape*, Steel, hence, for Liverpool, is also reported to be lost.  
Brig *William & Amelia*, Jones, from hence arrived at Plymouth, previous to the 6th February, in distress.  
The ship *Lovell*, Hume; and brig *Clyde*, — and *Experiment*, Todd, all from this port, have arrived at Greenock, the former with loss of main-mast.  
The ship *James*, Walton, hence, arrived at London 23rd January.  
The ship *Halifax* Packet, Clarke, hence, arrived at Liverpool, 25th February.  
Brig *Mary*, Ann, Squires, hence, arrived at Bristol in 39 days—remained there, sch'r *Chart*, Dougal, to sail in about ten days.  
The John Little, Norman, from Cork for New-Brunswick, has put into Liverpool, with considerable damage, after being three months at sea.  
Brig *Nelson*, of Yarmouth, N.S. has been towed

into Bermuda, Lottom up—4 of her crew have arrived at Eastport.  
The Br. packet ship *Queen Elizabeth*, from Falmouth, arrived at New-York 2d instant.  
The Swiftsure packet, for New-York, sailed from Falmouth 20th February.  
St. Andrew's, April 5—Arr. barque *Wilson*, Simpson, Bristol, 64 days, to C. Scott—The brig *Maria*, Cameron, was to sail from Liverpool for St. Andrew's, the same day the *Wilson* left Bristol.

RICHMOND, LENNOX and AUBIGNY.

The Governor in Chief acquaints the House of Assembly, that he has received the Instructions of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, as to the manner in which His Royal Highness's commands, respecting the proceedings of the Assembly against Mr. Justice Foucher, which were communicated to the Assembly by message upon the second day of March last, are to be carried into execution.  
His Royal Highness the Prince Regent considers it most advisable and has accordingly been pleased to direct that the Assembly, previous to any ulterior proceedings, do adduce without delay, and deliver to His Grace the Gov. in Chief, such documentary evidence as they may consider adequate to support the charges, which they have brought against Mr. Justice Foucher, and that copies of such charges, of such documentary evidence, and of the examinations already taken and annexed to the charges, be then transmitted by His Grace the Governor in Chief, to Mr. Justice Foucher, for his answer and defence.  
And His Royal Highness has been further pleased to direct that the answer and defence of Mr. Justice Foucher, be, by His Grace the Governor in Chief, communicated to the Assembly, for their reply, and that the whole of the documents, as soon as the reply of the Assembly shall be received, shall be by him transmitted to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, for such further course as the case may require.
