

LONDON, JULY 19.

*Birmingham Meeting.*

The proceedings at the meeting of Reformers held at Birmingham are important, as they develop the scheme that is to be pursued generally through the whole Union. We have had a printed Report transmitted to us. The speeches contained so many and such violent personalities, that we forbear to detail them. We give our readers several of the Resolutions.

Resolved, That in the shameful facts which the quarrelling rogues at Barnstable, Penryn, and Grampond have brought to light, we have a lively picture of the bribery and abominations, which almost, if not altogether, universally prevail in those sinks of corruption called open Boroughs.

Resolved, That in an infamous transaction at Ilchester, in the depth of last winter, we at once see the detaching spirit, and the true means by which unprincipled Peers, as well as others who are candidates for the Peerage, have metamorphosed open Boroughs into close Boroughs, for the purpose of guilty ambition.

Resolved, That so long as such unprincipled Peers, and would-be Peers, shall have at their absolute command, a great majority of the seats in the Commons' House, which is nothing short of subversion of the Constitution, it is manifest they will continue to defeat a Reform of that House, until the injured people, determined on recovering their liberty, shall become so numerous, and shall raise a voice too awful to be treated with contempt.

Resolved, That a number of Gentlemen in whom this Meeting confide, having stated, that there has now for a year and a half past, been before the public (published by Effingham Wilson, of London, bookseller,) "A Bill of Rights and Liberties," for effecting a Radical Reform in the House of Commons, on the simple principles of voting for Representatives (which is a common right) being exercised by all men of mature age and sound mind, who have not forfeited the right by any crime; the votes being given by ballot, and the representative body being received once a year; it is the opinion of this meeting, that the said Bill ought to be adopted and passed into a law.

Resolved, That Sir Charles Wolsey, of Wolsey, in the County of Stafford, is elected Legislative Attorney and Representative of the inhabitants of Birmingham, instructed and to claim, on their behalf, by letter to the Right Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons, admission into that House as a Member thereof; as well as to communicate on the occasion the present and the immediately foregoing Resolve of this meeting, to be by the said Speaker laid before the House.

Resolved, That our said respective Representatives, in the event of his being admitted as such, to a seat in the Commons' House, is hereby instructed to move for the adoption of the aforesaid Bill of Rights and Liberties; but in a contrary event, to provide a proper manuscript draught of the same, and use his utmost endeavours for having it proposed in Parliament by some other Member.

Resolved, That a Deputation consisting of the Chairman and such other persons as he may think proper, do wait upon Sir Charles Wolsey, with the Resolutions appointing him to represent the inhabitants of Birmingham in Parliament; and that Major Cartwright and Mr. Wooler be requested to accompany the Deputation, to join their personal entreaty to induce his compliance with the wishes of this meeting.

Sir Charles Wolsey was arrested on Wednesday, on a charge of having uttered a seditious speech. He was taken to Knutsford where the Quarter Sessions were then holden; and the indictment being read over to him, and being called upon for his plea, he replied "Not Guilty." The Court then informed him that he was entitled to bail, and that they should require for his appearance, two sureties in £25 each, and himself in £500. Bail not being at hand, he was ordered to be committed till he could obtain such sureties, who must be resident householders in the county. Sir Charles was arrested on the morning of his mother's funeral, at his own seat, Wolsey Park, and was accompanied to Knutsford by Major Cartwright, who was on a visit to him. It is thought the Baronet will remove the inquiry into a superior court, in which case the trial will come on at the ensuing Assizes. The Rev. Mr. Harrison, it is said, cannot be found.

SIR,—Instructed by the Committee of 200, (formed out of the great Body of the NON-REPRESENTED PEOPLE of the British Metropolis) and acting for and in their behalf, I have, in accordance with the Instructions so received, the honour to announce to you that a PUBLIC MEETING will be holden in SMITHFIELD MARKET-PLACE, on Wednesday the 21st inst. for the purpose of discussing and adopting the best Means, and the prompt and decisive Measures for obtaining a RADICAL REFORM in the COMMONS' HOUSE OF PARLIAMENT; and am also further commissioned with all due respect, to request your attendance, in conjunction with those Gentlemen whose Names are here undermentioned, as public integrity and talent are the great objects of solicitude at this important crisis.

Lord Palmerston stated in Parliament on Monday last, that an alteration would be made in the Oath of Half-Pay Officers, by which they might accept of military or civil situations, upon swearing that the amount did not exceed three times that of their Half-Pay. Next Session he should bring in a Bill on the subject.

A Gentleman has, it is said, arrived in London, with a commission from Lord Cochrane, to raise an aid of 400 seamen.

SPANISH AMERICA.

Our correspondent at Norfolk writes under date of August 16, that Capt. Webb, had just arrived there, in 20 days from Maracaibo, bringing the following intelligence:—About the time of his sailing; (26. ult.) news reached there of the defeat of General Morillo, at Columbus, a small place a short distance up the Lake, and that his loss was very great indeed. He has since made a requisition for more troops, ammunition, and clothing, but it was not probable it would be filled. The Patriots were highly elated at their success, as the odds were greatly against them. Capt. W. did not understand the name of the General commanding the Patriot forces.

AUGUST 23.

St. Thomas, Aug. 4.—We learn that Barcelona has fallen; and Cumana, and the whole Royal squadron, is now in possession of the Patriots, and probably before this reaches you, Lagaira, Porto Cavello and Caraccas, will also be subject to the rebels.

London, June 25.

No fewer than sixty-one different Bills, Petitions, and other topics, were actually discussed on Wednesday last, in the House of Commons, of which forty-five were taken up and entered upon after midnight.

JUNE 26.

Porto Bello, late in the possession of Sir G. McGregor, before the abolition of the trade by the galleons, in 1748, and the introduction of register ships, was the great mart for the rich commerce of Peru and Chili, which was conveyed thither from Panama, partly on mules, and partly down the river Chagre. The town stands close to the sea, on the side of a mountain that surrounds the harbour, which is safe and commodious. It was taken in 1742 by Admiral Vernon, who demolished the fortifications; but it has since been strongly fortified. It is 50 miles N. by E. of Panama, and 300 W. by S. of Carthagena. Long. 70. 50. W. Lat. 2. 33. N.

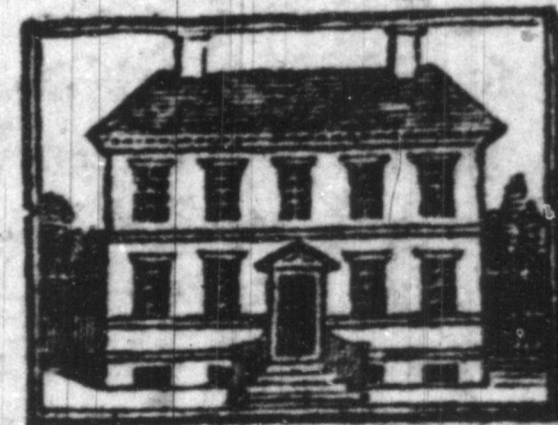
