Edinburgh, February 17.

The great match for one hundred guineas a-side, undertaken by Mr. Hollingsworth, an Oxfordshire farmer, to do 150 miles in forty-eight hours, was commenced near Ilford, on Tuesday morning at five o'clock. The pedestrian took a circuit from Colchester into Newmarket road, and across to the Woburn road, and to finish between St. Alban's and Dunstable. He accomplished 30 miles, without fatigue, at 12 o'clock, after having eaten some leg-of-mutton chops, refreshed with sherry, he did the other thirty miles at eight o'clock, when he retired to rest until twelve o'clock. At five o'clock in the morning, he had performed nineteen miles, when he breakfasted, and made another start at six o'clock, having done four miles more than half his ground. He did twenty-eight miles in six hours, and, at six o'clock in the evening, he had forty-seven miles to do in the next twelve hours. He did twenty-three in the next six hours, when he resigned near Market Street, at three o'clock, through fatigue and lameness, sixteen miles from home.

INGENUOUS INVENTION.—On Monday week, Mr. Bayne exhibited on the basin of the Caledonian Canal, the model of a frigate, to be impelled by the power of the screw against wind and tide. Several gentlemen attended to witness the success of the experiment, and were highly gratified by the manner in which this "Fairy Frigate" performed her various evolutions. The simplicity of this ingenious contrivance has been much admired.

SUICIDE COMMITTED BY A BRUTE ANIMAL.—A Correspondent writes as follows to the Editor of the Dumfries Courier:—A few days ago, when taking a ride, before dinner, round the lawn, in front of the house at Friar's Carse, in company with another gentleman, we perceived a sheep on the opposite side of the river Nith, belonging to the flock of a respectable farmer on the estate of Dalswinton, separate from the rest of its companions, and, in seeming perfect health, boldly advance towards the banks of the river. It then dashed into the water, and having proceeded nearly to its depth, without swimming, it immediately put its head under the water, leaving its back only visible while in the act of drowning. While writhing in the agonies of death (which were visible to each of us from the convulsive motions in its back, which remained during the whole period above water) we expected every moment to see it raise its head; but no! Bent on self-destruction, it kept its head firmly under water, until the convulsive throbs became less apparent, and until life was totally extinguished.

CATTLE CONSUMED IN LONDON.—The consumption of sheep and Lambs in London, in twelve months, has been estimated at the number of 1,062,700; the num-

ber of horned cattle slaughtered, at 164,000; and by the same return, it appears the number of swine produced at London, was 1,900,000.

A gentleman of Liverpool has brought writs of right for the recovery of an estate in Ireland, which has long been in abeyance, of £8000 a year; and also an accumulated personal property of more than half a million. His prospects of success have been pronounced to be very favourable by several lawyers of the first eminence.

CAUTION TO SERVANTS.—A case was decided on Wednesday at the Court of Requests in Bath, a servant man suing his master for a month's wages in consequence of his being dismissed from his situation without a regular notice. The defendant having proved negligence of duty and disobedience of orders by the complainant, the Commissioners decided that a master or mistress is not bound to retain a negligent or disobedient servant in their employ, after repeated but fruitless admonition; and that a servant thus offending is not entitled to recover an extra month's wages, in case of sudden dismissal from his situation.

In the night of the 23d ult. a number of men, with fire-arms, went into the village of Longwood, on the borders, of Meath and Kildare, Ireland, where they surrounded the house of a farmer named Gooding, and, after having taken him out of the house, set it on fire, fired a number of shots and remained until the whole of the concerns, with some fine cows, were consumed. The damages amount to above £300. The only reason that can be assigned for this outrage is, that Gooding had lately taken a farm at a rent exceeding what is prescribed by the ribbon system.

We regret to learn, that Lord Erskine, who is residing at his seat in this country, has lately experienced a third attack from indisposition, and that his Lordship is in a precarious state.—Brighton paper.

FATAL BOXING.—A very severe battle was fought on Wednesday morning at Benwell, near Stanmore, between Robert Desborough, a workman on the canals, and Thomas Humberstone, a millwright, in consequence of a quarrel at a public-house, when Humberstone struck Desborough. They contended against each other for three quarters of an hour after Desborough had his jaw broken; and after the combat had lasted nearly four hours, Humberstone dropped down senseless, and he died in the field, as it was supposed, from an internal rupture. It is said, that the combatants had more than 100 falls each.

AWFUL EFFECTS OF A THUNDER STORM.—The village of Trawsfynydd, in the county of Merioneth was visited, on Saturday evening, the 6th instant, by a tremendously heavy thunder storm. The peals were terribly loud and frequent, and the lightning extremely vivid. Shortly after the commencement of the storm, the electric fluid, entering the chimney of a cottage in the village, where the whole of the family, consisting of five, sat by the fire-side, struck the father and one of his sons, both of whom instantly expired; another child received so severe a shock that he lost an eye, and the rest of the family suffered very materially though not dangerously. Happily there is no account of any other destructive effects of the storm. The father's name was Hugh Thomas, for many years surveyor of the County Bridges.

A shocking event which took place at Maestricht lately, proves both that human wickedness is without bounds, and that the vengeance of Heaven is inevitable. A newly-married couple were obliged by the badness of the weather to cross a little wood on foot. They were attacked by a band of villains, ill-treated, stripped, and finally hanged upon the trees. No trace by which the ruffians could be pursued remained. A carrier, on passing, discovered the unfortunate victims: on shaking them he perceived that the husband was dead, but that the young woman had slipped one of her hands between the cord and her neck. He covered the unhappy creature with a frock, placed her upon his car, and conducted her to the nearest inn to have her taken care of. Coming among the persons who were supping, greatly affected, he related the shocking adven-

ture, and showed them the young woman. One of the spectators, agitated, cried out loudly, "Heavens! it is the woman that we hanged!" This cry was a clap of thunder to his accomplices, who fled in every direction; they were pursued, several were arrested, and there is no doubt that a severe act of justice will soon avenge the victims, their families, and society.
