

of money expended on the road from Bates's to Gidney's, amounting to £101 : 5 : 5. Receipts are furnished for £68 : 12 : 11. The other work, it is stated, was done by Foreigners, from whom no receipt was obtained. It appears that £100 was received from the Treasury—balance due £1 : 5 : 5. The statement is not signed—No affidavit accompanies it.

No. 5, is John Gosse's statement of the manner he has expended the sum of £75, laid out by him as Commissioner for the Road between Oliver's farm and J. Campbell's, in the Parish of Saint George, Charlotte County.

He states, that the delay he met with in getting the money from the Treasury, occasioned his being so long in making his report—And represents the road as requiring further improvement.

An affidavit and vouchers accompany the report.

No. 6, is Joseph Saunderson's account, with vouchers and affidavit, of monies expended on the Road from Barnaby's river to Malcom's farm, in Northumberland, amounting to £93 : 10.

He credits £100 received from the Treasury—leaving a balance due from him of £6 : 10.

No. 7, is Cyprian Keillor's receipt for £12 : 10, money in the hands of Messrs. Keillor & Chapman, paid him for work on the road between M'Eachran's bridge and Shediac.

No. 8, is report, with account and vouchers, from Thomas Bean, of the expenditure of £150, in building a bridge across Little River, in the Parish of Portland, and of £100 for cutting a road &c. from Little River towards Black River.

He states, that he has made no charge for exploring, drawing plans, and directing the different works, nor for some timber taken for the bridge.

At the last Term of the Supreme Court *Thomas H. Peters, Harris Hatch, Geo. L. Wetmore, and S. J. Saunders*, Esquires, were called and admitted Barristers at Law.

The King of France has presented the Duke of Wellington with the magnificent insignia of the Order of the Holy Ghost, estimated at the value of 400,000 francs.

London, Dec. 2. We learn, from one of the first Yorkshire houses, that very extensive orders for wollen cloths have been received within these few days, both from America and the countries bordering on the Baltic.—one house alone has received an order to the amount of £60,000 from Russia.

Paris, Dec. 3. The Duke of Wellington is now field-marshal of Austria, Russia and Prussia, his Prussian majesty having recently conferred this rank upon him, and sent the brevet to him by his aid-de-camp Count de Massow.

Yesterday, his Grace was received by the King, in a private audience, with the Russian general Woronzoff. His majesty made the duke of Wellington a present of a superb diamond cross, valued at 300,000 francs. The king also presented count Woronzoff with a very handsome snuff-box, enriched with diamonds.

Halifax, Feb. 22.

A great deal of Property has lately been found along the south shore of the Bay of Fundy—several Boxes, containing Wool Cards, and House Paper, have been picked up—supposed to be from a square rigged vessel, the *Ja-Ana*, of Mount Desert.

Kingston, Jan. Dec. 25.—A Frigate and 2 corvettes, with 1500 men from Old Spain, arrived a few days since at Porto Rico.

Sir G. M'Gregor, in a fine brig of 18 guns, touched lately at Nassau, N. P. and sailed again immediately, to join Lord Cochrane's squadron—said to consist of two frigates, two armed brigs, and several transports, having between 3 and 4000 land forces on board.

Mr. LUGRIE,

In looking over your Paper of the 6th of last month, I was happy to find that the importance of Agriculture had attracted the attention of the neighbouring Province, and have no doubt but the exertions which have lately been made there to advance this important object, will act as a stimulus to the Farming Interest in this country.

As I have noticed, in a former number, the great importance of Agriculture, as the surest source of wealth and independence; and as my limits will not permit me to enter fully into the subject, at present, I shall just notice two things, that appear particularly calculated to advance this object.

The first, to give all possible encouragement to such Emigrants, as wish to become Settlers, by giving them Lands and such other assistance on such terms as shall make it possible for them to live among us; as it is probable, that many who had emigrated to the Province, with the intention of becoming Settlers, have left it, for the want of suitable encouragement.

The second, to assist the new Settlements in distant parts of the country, particularly those Military Settlements which have lately been formed in remote parts of the Province, which, being yet in their infancy, must, if not assisted, not only languish, but be partially abandoned; for, not being near flourishing Settlements, that can furnish labour, they cannot find employment near their homes to enable them to procure food for their families, or seed to put in the ground; and must, if not assisted the ensuing spring, leave their settlements and go to distant parts of the Province for employment, to procure subsistence; which will prevent them from getting in a crop for themselves, to the great detriment of the settlement.

As it is probable the above remarks will apply to most of the new settlements, I shall, at present, only particularize the one lately formed above the Presqu' Isle, which, with a little assistance, bid fair to be of the greatest importance to the upper part of the Province; for, being composed of disbanded soldiers, whose attachment to the government has been well proved; they will, at all times, be ready to support the dignity of that Crown, in the service of which many of them have not only spent the prime of their days, but also shed their blood. These men have already made great progress in clearing land, erecting dwelling-places, &c.; but their allowance from government having ceased, they find themselves much straightened for subsistence, seeds, and the more expensive implements of husbandry. The propriety of assisting such persons must be evident, for the opportunity may never again occur, when, by well-timed liberality, a settlement may be preserved, and a number of valuable families secured to the Province. The government of Canada, at the reduction and settlement of the troops in that country, did not forget their services; and surely those that have been disbanded among us, have an equal claim on the Province.

I communicate to Congress copies of applications received from the Minister of Great Britain in behalf of certain British subjects, who have suffered in their property by proceedings to which the United States, by their military and judicial officers, have been parties. These injuries have been sustained under circumstances which appear to recommend strongly to the attention of Congress the claim to indemnity for the losses occasioned by them, which the legislative authority is alone competent to provide.
