OLD WISE.

LONDON, AUGUST 16.

We find in one of the Paris Journals, under the head of "Venice," an article, in which that once illustrious State, now the unguarded vassal of Austria, asserts an ancient title to Parga, and charges this country with having abandoned it to the Turks, on condition, that the Turks should take off the hands of our manufacturers some 3000 or 4000 bales of Manchester goods. We look upon this transaction in a light as shameful as the writer of the article to which we allude, but we are quite certain the national interests of any kind were so far from being consulted in the cession of Parga, as the national opinion is from approving it.

By accounts from the Cape of Good Hope we learn, that the distress of the inhabitants is dreadful, in consequence of the warfare with the Caffres, who have destroyed nearly the whole of the granaries and corn fields belonging to the farmers. An embargo is laid on all vessels arriving there; one ship had sold her whole cargo of rice upon very advantageous terms, as no bread could be obtained except from the flour made from that article.

It has been recently rumoured in the political circles that the British Government has entered into a very close alliance with the Court of Persia, and has not only engaged to supply the munitions of war, but to permit many British Officers, peculiarly selected for abilities and experience, to engage in the Persian service. The chief objects of the reported Treaty is said to be, to form a check upon the ambition of Russia, and to interpose Persia as a barrier against any design which Russia may hereafter meditate upon India.

BOSTON, SEPT. 16.

The Kingston Chronicle of the 16th of July, says:—Farther accounts have reached us of Lord Cochrane's proceedings. He was still before Callao, and did not seem at all disposed to raise the siege.—He had been fortunate enough to capture a Spanish Galleon, having upwards of one million dollars on board, bound to Old Spain. The officers taken at Porto Bello were still at the town of Darien.

KINGSTON, (JAM.) AUGUST 18.

We learn from Annatto Bay, that the brig Irene, Norton, bound to Halifax, parted her chain cable, on Friday last, and having previously lost both her anchors, was obliged to put to sea. She continued off the port until the 16th instant, in the afternoon, when an anchor was weighed, and another chain sent out to her in a sailing boat. She then hove to, to receive the same, which were no sooner on board, than by some unaccountable circumstance, the brig luffed up on a sudden, and stove the shallop's bows by the pitch she made, and she went down, by which accident a valuable sailor negro was drowned. The brig then hove to twice, but could not stay to pick the people up; and she drifted so much, that to save herself, she was forced into Sheerness Bay, where she remained.
