BOSTON, JUNE 30.

FROM SPAIN.—The brig *Eunice*, has arrived at New-York, in a passage of 35 days from Gibraltar. The political affairs of Spain reminded in a tranquil state, and it was thought would continue so till the meeting of the Cortes in the beginning of July. That period was looked to with much interest and anxiety, as the commencement of a new system of things, to the entire destruction of the old.

FROM THE SPANISH MAIN.—Capt. Vincent arrived at Charleston in 30 days from Porto Bello, states that the Patriots under Bolivar had been very successful—every post between him and Caraccas was in his possession, which has cut off all communication with the interior, and made business very dull. Little or no money in circulation: They were about establishing a paper currency—not having wherewith to pay the troops.

BALTIMORE, JUNE 28.

On Monday, 19th June, a duel was fought between Messrs. **Richard Stewart** and **Townsend S. Dade**, both of King George County, Virginia, on the Maryland shore, immediately opposite their residence, at a short distance, with muskets loaded with buck shot. Mr. Dade, was killed dead;

Mr. Stewart severely wounded that he expired in a few hours. They were neighbors, near relations, and heretofore friends. The unfortunate difference which resulted in so tragic an end, occurred about a mere trifle, and thus adds two more to the list of wretched victims, who have fallen a sacrifice to false notions of honor and the horrid and gothic practice of duelling.
