

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF LORDS, THURSDAY, FEB. 17.

This day their Lordships met, pursuant to the last adjournment, and at half-past two o'clock the Lord Chancellor entered the House, in the interior of which no alteration was perceptible but the removal of the chairs placed for the Princes on either side of the Royal Chair.

The Dukes of Clarence, Sussex and Gloucester, were present in full-mourning attire.

MESSAGE FROM HIS MAJESTY.

The Earl of Liverpool, soon after five, rose, and informed their Lordships, that he was entrusted with a Message from His Majesty, which being presented, was immediately read by the Lord Chancellor.

"GEORGE R.

"The King is persuaded that the House of Lords deeply participates in the grief and affliction of his Majesty for a loss which his Majesty and the Nation have sustained by the lamented death of the late King, his father.

"This melancholy event imposing upon his Majesty the necessity of summoning, within a limited period, a new Parliament, the King has taken into consideration the present state of public business, and is of opinion that it will be, in all respects, most conducive to the public interests and convenience, to call the new Parliament without delay.

"The King, therefore, recommends to the House of Lords to adopt such measures as may be found indispensably necessary to provide for the exigencies of the public service, during the interval which must elapse between the termination of the present Session and the opening of a new Parliament.

An Address of Condolence to his Majesty, upon the death of the late King his Father; and of congratulation upon His Majesty's Accession to the Throne, was moved by Lord Liverpool—supported by Lords Lansdowne, Buckingham, and Darnley—Agreed to.

The Earl of Liverpool then gave notice for to-morrow of an Address of Condolence to his Majesty, and likewise to her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, on the death of his Royal Highness the Duke of Kent.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The SPEAKER took the Chair at half-past three o'clock, when about seventy Members took the oaths and their seats. Among these we noticed Mr. Tierney, Lord Morpeth, Lord Selkirk, Lord Granville Somerset, Mr. S. Perceval, Lord Clive, Lord J. Russel, Lord Mountcharles and Sir J. York.

At a quarter to five o'clock, Lord Castlereagh appeared at the bar with a Message from his Majesty. It was brought up and read—(See Lords.) After it was read, Lord Castlereagh moved,

That an humble Address be presented to his Majesty, to convey to his Majesty the expression of the deep affliction in which we have been involved by the death of the late King; a Monarch, whose virtues had so long afforded the brightest example, and who had so long reigned in the hearts of his faithful people.

To assure his Majesty we shall never cease to cherish in our memories the recollection of the many blessings which we have enjoyed under the mild and paternal Government of his Royal Father, during whose long and eventful reign the country has made so great advances in arts and industry, in commercial opulence, and national power; and has derived so large an accession of glory from the splendid achievements of his Majesty's fleets and armies.

To add to these expressions of regret and condolence, on this common calamity, our most sincere congratulations upon his Majesty's accession to the Throne of his ancestors.

To convey to his Majesty the dutiful assurance of our loyal and affectionate attachment to his sacred person; and to entreat him to believe that we derive from the experience of the past, as well as from our confidence in his Majesty's character and virtues, the firm conviction, that his reign will be marked by a constant endeavour to promote the general prosperity and happiness of his people.

Mr. Bathurst seconded the motion.

The Address was then put, and carried unanimously; and it was, on the motion of Lord Castlereagh, ordered, that in consideration of his Majesty's illness, the Address be presented by such Members of the House as were of his Majesty's most honourable Privy Council.
