[Postscript to the Gazette.]

By direction of His Excellency The LIEUT.-GOVERNOR.

PUBLIC Notice is hereby given, that upon the present most melancholy occasion of the Death of our Gracious Sovereign George The Third, and also of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, the Inhabitants of this Province are expected to put themselves into deep mourning.

The same to commence on Sunday the 9th instant:

By command of His Excellency,

H. H. CARMICHAEL, D. S. Fredericton, 4th April 1820.

Wednesday, 29th March.

His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR came this day to the Council Chamber, and having, by message, commanded the attendance of the House of Assembly, they attended accordingly—when His Excellency gave his assent to the following Bills:—

An ACT to alter, and in addition to an Act, intitled "An Act for establishing a tender in all payments to be made in this Province."

An ACT in addition to an Act, intitled "An Act for the further increase of the Revenue of this Province."

An ACT to prevent the taking of Fish in the different Harbours and Rivers of this Province, with Drift Nets.

An ACT to provide for, and encourage the settlement of Emigrants in this Province.

An ACT in addition to and amendment of an Act, intitled "An Act for regulating the inspection of Fish for home consumption."

An ACT further to alter and amend an Act, intitled "An Act for the establishment, regulation and improvement, of the Great Roads of communication throughout the Province"

His Excellency then closed the Session by the following SPEECH:

"Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the Assembly.

"Having assented to the several Bills brought up for that purpose, I feel it incumbent to express my satisfaction at the liberal grants that have been made for the public service; and in consideration of their importance towards promoting the prosperity of the Colony, I have not withheld my assent to the Appropriation Bill, although containing an item of expense which has been deemed by the Legislative Council, during the Session, "a lavish and improvident grant."

"At the same time, I cannot but entertain a hope that the period is not very distant when the Members of the House of Assembly of this Province, will consider it more consistent with the dignity of that honorable branch of the Legislature, and more agreeable to the practice of the Mother Country, to render their services without taxing their Constituents so largely for remuneration."

The President of the Council (Judge SAUNDERS) then, by His Excellency's command, declared the General Assembly to be prorogued to the first Tuesday in June next.

COLLEGE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

At a meeting of the Board held on the 16th of March last, the Hon. WILLIAM BLACK, the Hon. SAMUEL D. STREET, the Hon. ANTHONY LOCKWOOD, the Rev. RALPH MILNER, FREDERICK ROBINSON, Esq. and PETER FRASER, Esq. were elected members of the Corporation.

The Rev. JAMES SOMERVILLE, Master of Arts, in Holy Orders of the Church of England, having been elected and appointed President of the College, His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR has been pleased to approve of the same.

The English School attached to the College has been opened for the instruction of Children on the Madras System, to be admitted by a recommendation in writing from a member of the Board, who will settle the tuition money to be paid by each Scholar, according to the circumstances of his Parents, which in no case shall exceed at the rate of seven annuity including all School charges, or more than may, if the member recommending so fit, be gratis.

Boys completing their studies in the English School, and who shall have discharged the office of teacher therein for one year, may be admitted and educated gratis in the Grammar School.

It is admitted by the overseers of the poor, and others who have opportunities of knowing the state of pauperism, that by the acts of this Institution, the Inhabitants of Fredericton have been freed of Rates to a considerable amount.

The want of a House of industry, has been clearly proved.

The society has unavoidably encouraged idleness, from the little employ that could be found, and the absolute necessity of providing subsistence.

The English Mail for January, arrived at the Post-Office yesterday, the London dates are only to the 8th of that month: Accounts to the 30th have reached us via the United States, which give the melancholy intelligence of the demise of our Beloved and Venerable Sovereign KING GEORGE the THIRD, and his Son EDWARD, DUKE OF KENT.—The Duke expired on the 23d, and H. MAJESTY on the 29th, in the 82d year of His age, and in the 60th year of His Reign.

We have been favored with the loan of a Boston paper (the Palladium) of the 17th ultimo, by it we are put in possession of particulars relating to the assassination of His Royal Highness the DUKE DE BERRI, which we have given in this publication.

The committee of foreign relations in the House of Representatives of the U. States, made a report on the 9th ult. in relation to their differences with Spain, accompanied by "a Bill to authorize the President to take possession of East & West Florida, and establish a temporary government therein."

Accounts from Spain of late dates say, that the affairs of the Spanish Insurgents are declining.

Serious disturbances still continue in the county of Galway, Ireland.

Mr. Cobbert is endeavoring to get himself elected a Member of Parliament for Coventry.

DEATH OF THE KING.

The London Gazette Extraordinary, SUNDAY, JANUARY 30.

Whitchall, January 30, 1820.

A letter and enclosure, of which the following are copies, have been this morning received from His Royal Highness the Duke of York, by Lord Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Windsor Castle, January 29, 1820.

My Lord—It becomes my painful duty to acquaint your Lordship, that it has pleased Almighty God to take unto himself, the King, my beloved Father, and our Most Gracious and Excellent Sovereign. He expired at thirty-five minutes past eight o'clock, P. M.

I enclose the Certificate of all the Physicians in attendance at this melancholy period.

The Right Hon. Viscount Sidmouth, &c. &c.

At three o'clock on Monday morning, the following letter was received by the Lord Mayor:—

Windsor Castle, Jan. 29, 1820.

My Lord—It is my painful duty to inform your Lordship of the demise of His late Majesty King George III. This melancholy event took place, without the least apparent suffering, at Windsor Castle, at thirty-one minutes past eight yesterday morning, to the great grief of His present Majesty, and of the Royal Family.

I have to request that your Lordship will give directions for the tolling of the great bell at Saint Paul's Cathedral.

I have the honor to be your Lordship's most obedient humble servant,

To the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, &c.

Thus has terminated the reign of George the Third, after a duration of fifty-nine years, three months and nine days—a reign distinguished alike by the public and private virtues of the Monarch, and by the extraordinary vicissitudes in the affairs of the world, in which the British Cabinet has taken so prominent a part.

At two o'clock on Sunday a Council was held at Carlton-House, for the purpose of recognizing the new Sovereign: the members of the Privy Council in town, including the Speaker and the Lord Mayor, together with several Aldermen and other persons of rank, were present.

After the death of His late Majesty had been formally announced, the following Instrument was prepared and signed:—

"Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God to call to his mercy our late Sovereign Lord George the Third, of blessed memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, is solely and rightfully come to the high and mighty Prince, George Prince of Wales. We therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being here assisted with those of His late Majesty's Privy Council, with numbers of other principal gentlemen of quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of London, do now hereby, with one voice and consent, of tongue and heart, publish and proclaim that the high and mighty Prince, George, Prince of Wales, is now by the death of the late Sovereign, of happy memory, become our only lawful and rightful Heir Lord George the Fourth, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, and so forth, to whom we do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience, with all hearty and humble affection; beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal Prince, George the Fourth, with long and happy years to reign over us.

"Given at the Court at Carlton-House, this 30th day of January 1820.

"GOD SAVE THE KING."

Then follows the signatures of the Privy Counsellors, &c. present.

His Majesty, King George the IV. then made a declaration of his tenderest affection for his native country, and his determination to do all in his power to promote the glory and happiness of the Kingdom.

His Majesty seemed deeply affected throughout the whole of these most important ceremonies.

DEATH OF THE DUKE OF KENT.

London, January 24.

It is with the deepest regret we have to announce the demise of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, at his cottage, at Sidmouth, in Devonshire, at ten o'clock on Saturday morning. His Royal Highness died of the inflammation with which he had been attacked, and to stop which baffled all the skill of the eminent Medical Gentlemen who were called in to attend him. Prince Leopold, Capt. Conroy, Generals Weatherall and Moore, were present, to afford consolation and support to the Duchess, at the awful and trying moment. The Royal Duke bore his illness with the greatest composure and resignation.

Intelligence of the melancholy event was brought to Town this morning by General Moore, who arrived in London at half-past eight o'clock, and drove to Carlton-house in a Chaise and four. Carlton-house was soon after closed. General Moore proceeded to York-house and Clarence-house, to communicate the death of their beloved Brother to the Dukes of York and Clarence, and the Duchess of Clarence. The General soon after proceeded to Windsor, to communicate the dismal tidings to the Princesses.

On the demise of the Royal Duke, the Medical Gentlemen issued the following Bulletin respecting the Duchess of Kent:—

"Sidmouth, Jan. 23, 1820.

"We have great satisfaction in being able to announce, that, notwithstanding the Duchess of Kent has paid the most unremitting attention to His late Royal Highness the Duke of Kent during the whole course of his illness, Her Royal Highness is as well as we could possibly have expected, after so great a degree of anxiety and exertion.

Whitchall, Jan. 24, 1820.

"My Lord—It is with extreme concern that I acquaint your Lordship with the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, which melancholy event happened on the 23d instant, at Sidmouth, after a few days illness, to the great grief of all the Royal Family.

I have to request your Lordship will give directions, usual on such occasions, for the tolling of the great bell of St. Paul's Cathedral.
