

**LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.**

[Extracts from the Journal.]

Friday, 17th March.

**A Message from the Council.**

"Mr. Speaker.—The Council have passed a Bill, 'to confirm and to carry into force and effect an agreement made between the Governor and Trustees of the College of New-Brunswick and certain Tenants of the said Governor and Trustees.' To which they desire the concurrence of this Honorable House."

On motion of Mr. Miles, resolved that £75 of the £200 granted to be laid out on the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to St. John on the west side of the River, be laid out in building a bridge near George Hayward's, in Lincoln.

Also, resolved that a further sum of £83 of the £583 granted to be laid out on the Great Road leading from Fredericton to St. Andrews, be laid out in building the aforesaid bridge.

**A Message from the Council.**

"Mr. Speaker.—The Council have agreed to resolutions of appropriation dated 16th instant.

Mr. Millidge, from the select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the papers which accompanied His Excellency's message of 14th February last, relating to the Brunswicker, reported, that they had perused with much attention, all the documents accompanying His Excellency's Message of the 14th February last; and find the resolution of the House of Assembly of 1817, was communicated by His Majesty's Attorney-General in a letter to the Province Agent, Thomas Bonnor, Esq. on the 24th Oct. in the same year, which letter was promptly answered by him, on the 12th Dec. 1817, and the demand made on Capt. Brenton, and never lost sight of until the affair was finally settled by Capt. Brenton's paying the sum of £657, as stated in Mr. Bonnor's letter of the 2d March 1819, from which, Law charges to the amount of £24: 1: 4, are deducted, leaving a balance at that time in his hands of £632: 18: 8. Since that period, your Committee find that bills to the amount of £600, have been drawn on Mr. Bonnor by His Majesty's Attorney General and approved by His Excellency, and are passed by the Treasurer to the credit of the Province in his general account No. 10.

Your Committee beg leave to recommend that Thomas Bonnor, Esq. be paid the sum of £32: 18: 8 sterling, as a compensation for his assiduity and attention, in prosecuting the demand of the Province against Capt. Brenton:

And that a further sum of £25 be paid H. M. Atty. General as a compensation for his diligence and care in this affair, in addition to the £60: 3: 4 granted in 1816, for expenses then incurred.
