The opposition papers in England having made a great hue and cry about certain plate which the Queen had demanded as her property, the London Courier has come out in defence i the conduct of ministers on this occasion. The Courier makes the Earl of Liverpool to say, in answer to the Queen's request, that " it was not intended to refuse the Queen euher a proper residence of furriture becoming her station, and that when a place of residence was fixed on, the question of plate and furniture would be considered at the same time." In the House of Commons Lord Castlereagh concluded his speech on the subject of the application for the place in the following terms;

" I am sure," said the noble Lord, " the feelings and good sense of the country will bear me out, when I say that if her Majesty had conducted herself with that feeling. which became her sex, and that dignity which belongs to her station, his Majesty's ministers would be most anxious to afford every consolation, which a Queen under such circumstances, can expect. But when her Majesty condescends to listen to the meanest advisers, when she suffers herself to become an instrument in the hands of the basest populace of the country, who have presumed to insult the palace of her sovereign and husband, as I had personally an opportunity of witnessing, I have not hesitated to declare, in defiance of every taunt that the honourable and learned gentleman may throw out in this house, that I should abandon the duty which I owe to the dignity and honour of the crown, were I to advise the sovereign to become the dupe of such artifices. If her Majesty's present residence in town is not suitable, I am persuaded that no difficulty will be thrown in the way of an arrangement by which her Majesty may find herself a suitable residence.'

# BOSTON, AUGUST 30.

Extract of a Letter to the Editor of the Charleston City Gazette, dated.

"Yesterday evening the Fiscal insulted the public greatly, by saying, before four months after this date, he would have the constitution abolished, and the citizens chained up, in consequence of a piece printed against him in one of the public papers. Had it not been for the interference of the police, the public would undoubtedly have killed him. The Captain General has ordered him to the Moro-Castle to be tried, as a traitor, and an enemy to the Constitution.

"The citizens are determined to maintain their constitutional rights even at their peril: they have now 6000 National Guards at their disposal, and likewise all regular, composing the garrison."

The French papers contain an account of Quitoga's triumphal entry into Madrid on the 24 h ult. An immense multitude was assembled on the occasion, and the procession was preceded by bands of music, Playing inspiring and patriot airs. The minimal bodies and deputations from the partiotic societies met him at the gate of the city. He was in an open carriage—the streets were strewed with flowers and tapes—

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tries---the national colours were hoisted on all the public crosses, and crowns of oak and laurel were thrown from the windows as Quiroga passed. The heroic citizen is said to have been quite overpowered with feelings of gratitude. He proceeded to the Hall, where the Municipal Bodies were assembled, and was received with tumulis of applause, after which, the first Syndic, Don; Cartejon, addressed him on the occasion .---He then waited upon the King, and met with the most gracious reception from his Majesty. In the evening the Society of the friends of the people give him a splendid entertainment, and the whole city was spontaneously illuminated.

The Journal of the Eastern-Pyrennees, contains some account of the state of the Plague at Majorca. It is said to be the same Plague of the Levant.—News from Palma, mentions that the French Consul has brought from Tangiers, four persons who have been innoculated with pestilential virus, and who, thus shielded from danger, are to attend the sick and inter the dead. A celebrated Physician, of the name of Pascual, is said to have died of the Plague.

Letters from Barcelona, of the 3d inst. say that the plague continues its ravages; the number of those who fall a sacrifice to it daily increasing.—The strictest precautions are taken to prevent its being communicated to the South of France.

This morning His Honor pronounced the sentence of the Law on the following persons:

Robert Bellamy and Edward Clancey, were also convicted of the same crime—Bellamy was sentenced to be whipped three times on the same days as above mentioned, with six months imprisonment; and Clancey to be whipped next Monday and imprisoned three months in the House of Correction.


