But I marvel indeed much, that then, after the agony of an ex-parte trial, and the triumph of a complete though lingering exculpation, the natural spirit of English justice did not stand embodied between her and the shore, and bear her indignant to your capital. The people, the peerage, the clergy, should have sprung into unanimous procession; all that was noble, or powerful, or consecrated in the land, should have borne her to the palace gate, and demanded why their Queen presented to their eye this gross anomaly! why her anointed brow should bow down in the dust, when a British verdict had pronounced her innocence! Why she was refused that conjugal restitution, which her humblest subject had a right to claim! Why the annals of their time should be disgraced, and the moral of their nation endure the taint of this terrific precedent: and why it was that after their countless sacrifices for your Royal House, they should be cursed with this pagantry of Royal humiliation! Had they so acted, the dire affliction of this day might have been spared us. We should not have seen the filthy sewers of Italy disgorge a living leprosy upon our throne; and slaves and spies, imported from a creedless brothel, land to attain the sacred Majesty of England! But who, alas! will succour the unfortunate? The cloud of your displeasure was upon her, and the gay, glittering, countless insect swarm of summer friends, abide but in the sun-beam! She passed away--- with sympathy I doubt not, but in silence.

LONDON, SEPT. 26.

The Aurora, Blackburn, is arrived off Dover from Oporto, with letters from thence of 13th inst. On the 14th, the Provisional Junta of the north, was to be removed to Coimbra. The Conde de Amarante and all the troops in Tras-los-Montes, had declared for the Oporto party. The last letters received at Oporto from Lisbon were on the 7th inst. by which it appeared the Lisbon party had a strong objection to the Government remaining in the hands of the people of Oporto. No fears were entertained for the British property or persons being molested, unless the British interfered. All the troops at Coimbra, Leira, and the adjacent towns, had joined the Oporto party, and all were marching on Lisbon.

A private letter from Lisbon, of the 12th states, that the Lisbon Government have ordained the Cortes to assemble in the ancient manner on the 15th November, but they have not promised to grant the nation a Constitution. The Oporto Provisional Government, of course, are not satisfied with this, and apparently require the abolition of their Government.

OCTOBER 1.

Birth of a Male Prince, heir to the French Throne.

This morning intelligence was received from Calais, which may be of some importance to the future politics of France, namely, the birth of a Bourbon Prince, heir to the French throne. Information of this event had been welcomed by discharges of artillery in the capital and throughout the kingdom, and would be followed up by other demonstrations of national joy. The infant is son of the late Duke de Berry, who was so cruelly assassinated by Louvel, and is consequently a posthumous child.

CALAIS, Sept. 29, 1820.

The news has just arrived, per telegraph, of the accouchment of her Royal Highness the Duchess de Berry, of a fine boy—her Royal Highness being as well as can be expected. This happy event took place at 5 o'clock yesterday morning. They name him Prince of Bourdeaux.

Mr. Brougham reached town yesterday and is actively engaged in preparing for the arduous task on which he will enter on Tuesday (this day.) We are glad to state that his health is considerably improved. The public look with intense curiosity as well as interest for the delivery of his speech—which will be applied not only to a free examination of the case as proved on the part of the crown, but to the most ample and satisfactory statements in support of the innocence of his illustrious client. Other topics will be embraced not less important to the honour and character of the British nation.

When the House meets on Tuesday, it is anticipated that very little time will be

devoted to preliminary matter, and that Mr. Brougham will proceed at once to his speech.

Dr. Lushington had an interview with her Majesty on Friday. Her Majesty has not yet intimated any desire to attend the House of Lords during the progress of her defence.

The Baron Bergami has arrived in Italy. There is no pretence for the falsehood is circulated in Paris, that he had there made himself an object of notoriety. On the contrary, he has been extremely reserved in his conduct ever since he quitted the service of her Majesty at St. Omer's. It is not impossible that he may yet be seen in this country.—(Observer.)

Chevalier Vassali, of the Queen's suite, is gone to Dover to superintend the landing of her Majesty's witnesses, twenty of whom, including the Countess of Oldi, were expected to disembark there yesterday. A house has been prepared for their reception opposite the hotel at Hammersmith.

On Friday, at 10, P. M. the Royal squadron anchored at Spithead. The batteries and ships saluted as on former occasions. Deputations with the Addresses to his Majesty from Gosport and Portsea went on board the Royal yacht, and were most graciously received. As soon as the ceremony was concluded, the crews of the several boats immediately sang "God save the King" in excellent style, in which they were accompanied by several bands. The King was much affected—but highly gratified. He landed under a salute from the batteries and the Royal squadron at one o'clock, and proceeded to Bognor, where he dined with the Earl of Arran. In the evening he arrived at Brighton. His Majesty directed that the Address from Portsmouth, which he had not time to receive, should be transmitted to Lord Sidmouth. His Majesty will be in town to-morrow, (yesterday) to attend a Council.

The Welsh Settlement lately inspected, proved to be in a tolerable state of comfort: beyond the necessity of further aid, with the exception of two families, who were ordered to be supplied with provisions and tools.

In the first stage of its existence, by the vigilant care of the Directors, an infectious malady was arrested, and the dwellings of the poor made comparatively comfortable.

The support given to it by the Legislature, enables the Society to keep from the doors of the inhabitants, the needy stranger, and in the course of a year or two, its views will doubtless be directed to the employment of the poor by some simple machinery, conducive to the good of the Province, in manufacturing some staple commodity, such as flax or Hemp, to both of which the soil, in every part of the country is congenial. E-

ven without this reasonable participation, its immediate effects are salutary.

As the utility of the Institution is evident, individuals will no doubt feel charitably disposed to continue their subscriptions.
