WILL OF H. R. H. THE DUKE OF KENT.

The following is a Copy of the Will of the lamented Prince EDWARD Duke of KENT. It was proven yesterday in Doctors' Commons. The property is sworn under £80,000, and £1050 have been paid for the probate duty. The Will was made on the evening immediately prior to his Royal Highness's death. Lieutenant-General WETHERALL and Captain CONROY, his Royal Highness's Executors, were, the former Comptrollers of the Duke's Household, the latter one of his Equerries, and his private Secretary.

I, Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, being of sound mind, do make my Will, in manner following: And, first, I do nominate, constitute, and appoint my beloved wife, Victoire, Duchess of Kent, to be the sole Guardian to our dear child, the Princess Alexandrina Victoria, to all intents, and for all purposes whatever; and under a confident hope that my just claim on Government will be yet considered, for the purpose of liquidating my debts, I give, advise, and bequeath unto Frederick Augustus Wetherall, Esq. Lieutenant-General in the Army, all and every my real and personal estate of every sort and nature whatever, and whatsoever situate, upon trust, and for the entire use and benefit of my said beloved wife and dear child, in such a manner, on such occasions, and at such times, as my said dear wife shall direct. And I do vest the said Frederick Augustus Wetherall, and John Conroy, with all and every necessary power and authority, with the consent and approval of my said wife, to dispose of all and every, or any part of my said estate and effects, real and personal, for the purpose before-mentioned. And I do hereby constitute and appoint the said Frederick Augustus Wetherall, and John Conroy, Executors in trust of this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have subscribed my name, and set my seal, the 22d day of January, 1820.

Signed, sealed and delivered by the said Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, in the presence of us, as his Will.

THE QUEEN.—Letters have been received in town from Her Majesty, the Queen of England, dated Rome the 10th ultimo. Her Majesty complains of not having received any messenger from Government, announcing the demise of our late lamented Sovereign. Her Majesty states, that the Hanoverian Minister and British Consul, and all persons connected with the Government, treat her with great indignity; they continue to call her Princess Caroline of Brunswick. Her Majesty also expresses dissatisfaction at the conduct of the Roman Government, she had always a guard allowed her as Princess of Wales, but that has been refused her since she became Queen, because the British Government has not acknowledged her, under that title. Her Majesty expresses a great wish to have Buckingham House for her palace: she desires that the servants of the late Duke of Kent, or those in the service of His Royal Highness Prince Leopold, may be employed for her in preference to any others; and Her Majesty also desires, in the event of the refusal of Government to find her a palace, that a house may be taken for her near Dover. Her Majesty was to leave Rome on Monday next, to proceed from thence

Sixty thousand men are reported to be out of employ at Paisley and Glasgow: and mischief, the result of idleness, has consequently followed.

Men inimical to the order of society taking advantage of this unhappy state of our manufactures, have diffused the poison of republicanism, of faction, of discord.

With that promptness, so desperate a case required, His Majesty's Ministers have dispersed these tumultuous assemblages by the regulars. Lives were lost, but private letters say, not to the extent stated in the public prints.

These events although to be regretted, have materially strengthened the hands of our parent Government. All good subjects, and many of the most violent Oppositionists, have avowed and shown their intention to support entire, the frame of our Constitution.

IN IRELAND

some partial ruptures have taken place, but to no serious extent.

Private letters from London, speak confidently of the restoration of general tranquillity.

Refutation!

A Notice having appeared on the 20th March last in a New-Brunswick Paper, published at Fredericton, signed by John S. Cox, I conceive it as a duty I owe to my own character and family, to state the whole transaction as it occurred, and to shew the Public, that the representation made against me, is as gross as it is unfounded.

In July 1817, being possessed of a certain Bill of Exchange for £100 Sterling, which had been drawn by Thomas King, Esq. late Paymaster of the late 98th Regiment, in my favor, upon Greenwood & Cox, as Army Agents; JOHN S. COX applied to me to lend him some money, when to befriend him, I immediately gave to him the Bill just mentioned. As I was then on my way to England, upon my own private concerns, JOHN S. COX wished me to take a Power of Attorney from him to collect sundry sums which were due him in England, from several Officers who lately belonged to the late 98th Regiment, but on my making a presentation of these demands, their legality was refused, and I immediately returned to Fredericton in October last, and informed Mr. COX of the result, at the same time giving to him all the vouchers and his Power of Attorney; and as he stood indebted to me in the sum of £119, on the Bill of Exchange and on other accounts, I immediately applied to him for a settlement, with the interest, when he told me it was not in his power to pay the amount, and requested the indulgence of a further time; to this I readily agreed, not feeling a wish to embarrass him in any way, or to do him an injury, and he gave me 4 doubloons, together with a Note of Hand for the balance, being one hundred and five Pounds, which is the same note to which he refers in his advertisement, and becomes due in the present Month of May. This I have never received, nor is there a likelihood of my ever getting any part of it; and I leave it to the public dispassionately to judge, whether Mr. COX can be possessed of those principles which should guide him, when he makes the unjustifiable attack he has made on his benefactor who relieved him in distress—never pressed him for his lawful demands—nay, even went to great personal inconvenience to set up demands against persons who denied owing him one sixpence. These facts speak for themselves, and is the best refutation an old and honest Soldier can offer to the notice he has made against him.
