

In an early number of the *Mercury* we gave a list of the whimsical titles assumed by certain great potentates of the earth, particularly of the eastern nations; among the rest was the King of Ava, who was thus described:—

"The Majesty of Ava is called 'God King of Kings, Brother to the Sun, and King of the twenty-four Umbrellas, which are always carried before him.'"

Of this sublime personage with his four-and-twenty Umbrellas, we never heard any further tidings of until a few days since, when we met with the following most extraordinary article, copied from the Calcutta papers. It almost staggers belief.

Calcutta, Sept. 1, 1819.—His Burmah Majesty, the King of Ava, died on the 5th of June, 1819, after a reign of 38 successive years. The Prince Regent his grandson, succeeded him and ascended the throne on the 6th—on the 9th, the remains of the deceased King, attended by his successor, were placed on the funeral pile, composed of sandal wood, and various other odoriferous combustibles. The torch was applied by the Princess, and the mourners poured out costly oils on the fire until the corps was totally consumed. The ashes were afterwards deposited in an urn, as a relic for future veneration.

The day after the above ceremonies, the Prince Regent took measures for the security of his dominions, to prevent commotion and to protect the welfare of his subjects. Having reason to fear his own brother, he ordered him to be arrested with all of his children, grandchildren, and the rest of his family, and on the 10th they were put in red bags or sacks, and thrown into the sea, which is considered an honourable mode of death, reserved only for the royal descendants. The above was Prince Tanonoo. The Prince Prince, the uncle of his present Majesty, charged with being leagued in the treasonable conspiracy, was also apprehended, and the King after torturing him and crushing his bones, committed him to close confinement, and, on the 12th, strangled him. Other Princes and Prime Ministers also suffered death, and it was estimated, that from ten to fifteen thousand of the lower class shared the same fate.

The property of Prince Tanonoo, which was confiscated, amounted in gold, silver, diamonds, jewels, and other valuables to about one million and four hundred thousand ricles of flowered silver, equal nearly to two millions of Sicca Rupees. The property of the Prince of Prone, also confiscated, was more valuable, which the King has promised to distribute among his army.

This sanguinary Sovereign, who is now on the throne of Burmah, is represented to be 35 years of age, of a mild disposition, of a most liberal mind, just to all, and worshipped with adoration by his subjects.
