At a Special Session of the Peace holden at Fredericton, in and for the County of York, on Friday the eleventh day of August 1820, duly called for the purpose of making such Rules and Regulations as may be deemed expedient for the better preventing the spreading of the Small-Pox, an infectious disorder now said to be in existence in the Town of Fredericton.

Thomas Emerson of Fredericton, in the County of York, Esquire, Surgeon, being examined, states that at the request of a Mr. Rosten who lives in Regent Street in Fredericton aforesaid, he visited in company with Doctor Woodforde, a son of Joseph Stevens (living next door to the said Rosten) who was said to be broken out with the Small-Pox, and found the Lad to be broken out with an Eruption which he has no doubt is the Small-Pox of the distinct kind—and that the said Doctor Woodforde fully agreed with the Informant in that opinion. And that the Informant further states, upon being interrogated, that the said Lad can be removed to another place without any danger or inconvenience to himself, and with much less danger of communicating the infection to others than if he should be suffered to remain where he is in a thick settled part of the Town—That the said Lad appears to be about nine or ten years of age, and the Informant's opinion is, that the case of the said Lad is of a mild kind.

Ordered that Mr. Emerson be requested to inquire whether a vacant House on the Governor's Farm, so called, which was lately occupied by Benning Foster, while under the same disease, can be procured for the reception of any Patients in the Small-Pox, and thereupon the Court adjourned to meet to-morrow at nine o'clock.

Surgeon Emerson reports that the said House on the Governor's Farm can be procured upon very moderate terms; and that upon its being white washed and some trifling repairs made, it will be convenient and comfortable for the reception of any Patients in the Small-Pox.

The Justices thereupon took into consideration the information of the said Surgeon Emerson as given yesterday, and it appearing to the Court now assembled, that a case of the Small-Pox now exists in the person of the said Child of the said Stevens; and it being highly probable that the said disease will spread itself very rapidly unless some precautions are used, have deemed it meet to make and establish the following Rules and Regulations, to be observed to prevent the spreading of the said contagious and infectious Distemper, viz.

First. That the present Patient and all others who may hereafter be visited with the said infectious Disease in the Town Plat of Fredericton and below it, as far down as Earl's Creek so called, be removed to such place or places within the Parish as shall be provided or pointed out by any two of the

Justices of the Peace under their hands, and notified to the diseased person, or if a minor or married woman, to one of the parents or guardians or husband of such person (as the case may be,) and every person neglecting or refusing to be removed to such place if of full age, or refusing or neglecting to remove a child or other minor under his or her charge as parent or guardian, or a husband his wife, for six hours after such notice, shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten pounds, to be recovered and applied in manner as provided in and by an Act of the General Assembly made and passed in the thirty-ninth year of his late Majesty's Reign, entitled "An Act to prevent the importation or spreading of Infectious Distempers within this Province." And that the persistence in such refusal or neglect for every twenty-four hours thereafter, shall in each and every case be deemed a new offence and proceeded against accordingly.

Secondly. That no person be permitted to visit the house or place to be provided and appointed and used for the reception of any patient or patients in the said disease, without licence from the Physician or Physicians, or one of them who shall be appointed or employed to have the care and charge of such diseased person or persons, under the penalty of five pounds for each and every offence, to be recovered and applied as aforesaid.

Thirdly. That every person admitted to the house or place so to be provided and appointed and used as aforesaid, to act as a nurse or to attend upon and have the care or charge of any such patient or patients, shall not depart from such house or place and come into the town or public highway without the licence of such Physician or Physicians, under the penalty of five pounds for each and every offence, to be recovered and applied as aforesaid.

Fourthly. That a man shall be employed to attend at such house or place so to be provided for the reception of such patient or patients, whose duty it shall be (among other things) and he is hereby authorized and empowered to warn off all persons who shall approach such house or place nearer than four rods, and especially minors; and if any such minor or minors shall persist in approaching after being so warned, it shall be lawful for the said man to use gentle ways and means to oblige them to depart, and any person refusing to depart or who shall approach nearer than four rods after being warned as aforesaid, shall be liable to pay the penalty of three pounds, to be recovered and applied as aforesaid.

Ordered that the said house mentioned in the report of Mr. Surgeon Emerson, be hired and forthwith fitted up as a place for the reception of patients in the Small-Pox.

Ordered that Mr. Emerson and Doctor Berton, together with any Physician retained by any patient in the said House, be, and they are hereby appointed the Physicians to grant the licences mentioned in the second and third articles of the preceding Rules and Regulations.

Ordered that the two first named Physicians have the nomination and employment of the man mentioned in the fourth article of the said Rules and Regulations.

Ordered that the minutes of the proceedings of this Session be published in the Royal Gazette, and also in hand bills for distribution.

Sporting Intelligence.

EPSOM RACES; THURSDAY 2D DAY.

Such a Derby race was never witnessed by the oldest frequenters of the turf. The rainy morning kept away more than half of those who usually enjoy this fine race; and instead of the first display in the world of equipage, beauty, and fashion, the Ladies were kept in their close carriages, expecting to be blown over by the stormy element; as to the booths many were unroofed on the preceding night, and those left shared the same fate on Thursday. Signal posts and canvas were flying in all directions when the horses started.

Stakes 50 guineas each for three years old; colts to carry 8st 7lb. and fillies 8st. 2lb.—54 subscribers, half forfeit. The owner of the second horse to receive 100 guineas out of the stake.

The race was won by more than two lengths. (Sam Chitney, formerly rider for the Prince of Wales, rider.) Antigillian and Arbutus bolted at Tottenham corner toward London, from the storm as some say. Arbutus being on the near-side of Antigillian, and close at him, drove that horse out, and Pindarie shifted there and got out of his place: the Kill-Devil filley and Pindarie were fourth and fifth. It was a fast run race—betting 3 to 1 against Pindarie; 3½ against Sailor; 4½ to 1 against the Kill-Devil filley; 12 to 1 against Abjiss; 16 to 1 against Arbutus; and 100 to 5 against any other. Fifteen horses started.
