21ST MARCH, 1820.

AT the Annual Meeting of the New-Brunswick Central Society for promoting the Rural Economy of the Province, held at Fredericton on Saturday the 18th day of March 1820:—His Excellency the Lieut. Governor having condescended to accept the office of President of the Society, and having taken the chair, was pleased to open the meeting with the following

ADDRESS.

GENTLEMEN, "It is with no small degree of satisfaction that I meet you upon this occasion, fully impressed with the importance of the object for which we are assembled.

"The cause of Agriculture has been so recently and ably advocated by those immediately surrounding us, that even could my feeble powers add any thing to its importance, I should consider it unnecessary to take up your time by a preliminary discourse.

"When I see so many persons around me equal to the task of giving wise counsel for carrying into effect the purposes intended by this meeting, I can have but little reason to lament my entire want of knowledge as to the practical branches of Husbandry. I shall therefore only assure you, that I feel much gratified by the honor that has been shewn to me, in placing me at the head of an Institution, which has my warmest wishes for its success, and will command my best services towards its support."

The meeting then proceeded to the dispatch of business, and the following Resolutions were unanimously agreed to:—

RESOLVED, That the sum of two hundred pounds be laid out in the purchase of SEED GRAIN.

Resolved, That one RAM, one BOAR, and one SOW, for each County, be imported into this Province during the ensuing season, provided the funds of the Society admit of the expense.

Resolved, That a DRILL PLOUGH be imported into this Province, during the ensuing season, provided the funds of the Society admit of the expense.

Resolved, That the Central Committee be, and they are hereby authorized to carry the above Resolutions into effect.

Resolved, That the thanks of the meeting be tendered to HIS EXCELLENCY the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR, for his condescension in attending to, and entering so warmly into the concerns of the Society as President thereof.

The following section of the Non-Inter-course Bill we were not in possession of last week, we copy it from the St. Andrew's Herald.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That nothing in this act contained shall be taken to prevent the entrance into any port or place, within the jurisdiction of the United States, of packets, and such vessels as shall bear despatches from the government to which they belong, having neither cargo nor merchandize on board; or be so construed as to violate any provisions of the convention to regulate commerce between the territories of the United States and of his Britannic Majesty, signed the third of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, and which is now in full force and operation, by virtue of the fourth article of the convention between the United States, and his Britannic Majesty, signed the twentieth of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen.
