DARING OUTRAGE.

Yesterday morning the inhabitants of this place were thrown into a state of alarm, by a manifest disposition on the part of a number of low characters, (mostly Irishmen) to commence a riot, which we are given to understand, has been plotting for some little past. About noon they began to assemble in considerable force at the lower end of the town, and immediately commenced a barbarous attack on several unoffending passengers and mechanics at work, whom they beat in a shocking manner; but our townsmen being early apprised of this most daring outrage, immediately hastened to the scene of disturbance, when a rencounter took place between the rioters and some spirited individuals, which ultimately ended in the dispersion of the mob, and the commitment of the ringleaders to gaol. As evening approached, it was considered necessary for the safety of the lives and property of the community, or to baffle any attempt at rescue which might be meditated by the disaffected, to call out the different companies of Militia, an order which was promptly obeyed by Officers and Men—parties of which patrolled the streets all the last night, and will continue to do such duty, till order is considered sufficiently restored.

We are entirely unacquainted with the origin of this disturbance, or of the motives of these deluded men—but it is evident that a spirit of disaffection has crept in among us, which it is to be hoped will be probed to the bottom, and altogether expunged from this society by a well timed example of the principals in this outrageous affair.

Tuesday, 2 o'clock, p.m.—We are happy to state, that by the timely exertions of the Civil Authorities, the town has been again restored to its former tranquillity.

On Wednesday forenoon last, as — Welsh, servant to Capt. Joseph Kenah of this place, was watering a valuable mare belonging to that Gentleman, in the river, at the Garrison landing, and while in the act of swimming her, was thrown from his seat into the water. The impulse of the moment made him seize fast hold of the animal, and, after struggling together a few seconds, were unfortunately drowned. Every exertion was made by several of the military to save them, but it was not till after 15 minutes, that they succeeded in getting the body of Welsh: the means prescribed to restore animation were immediately had recourse to, and perseveringly applied for some time, but without effect.

Newfoundland, June 27, 1820.

A private letter of the 21st May, mentions that Sir Francis Burdett had been sentenced to three years imprisonment, to pay a fine of £5000, and further imprisoned until the fine was paid.

Her Majesty the Queen had not arrived in England at the latest date.

Yesterday arrived H. M. B. Drake, Captain Vernon, from Halifax. Passengers, Major Moore, 74th Regiment.

London, May 4.

M. Volney died a few days since, at Paris, of an inflammation of his bowels. He was conscious of the danger of his situation, and met his fate, says the Morning Chronicle, "with a truly Philosophical courage." This eulogy is easily understood. Philosophical death-beds are the triumph of Atheism; and the character of Volney's writings does not justify us in assuming an exception in his case.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH.

Monday, May 15th.

SENTENCE ON HUNT AND OTHERS.

That Mr. Hunt should be imprisoned in Hchester gaol for the term of two years and six months. At the expiration of that time to find sureties for his good behaviour during a further term of five years, himself in £1000, and two other persons in £500 each.—Johnson, Healy, and Hamford, to be imprisoned in Lincoln gaol for the period of one year, and, at the expiration of that time, each to enter into sureties for his good behaviour during five years, himself in £200 and two other persons in £100 each.

Mr. Hunt wished to know whether his confinement was to be solitary confinement. Mr. Justice Bayley replied, that the Court made no such order. He had no doubt that every proper attention would be paid to the convenience of the defendants; and, if cause for complaint should arise, that complaint would be attended to.

THE KING V. WOLSELEY AND HARRISON.

Judgment was also pronounced upon these defendants. Sir Charles Wolseley was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment in Abingdon gaol; at the expiration of that time to enter into sureties for his good behaviour, himself in £1000, and two persons in £500 each. Mr. Harrison to be imprisoned for a term of eighteen months (to be computed from the expiration of his present imprisonment) in the castle of Chester; and, at the expiration of his imprisonment, to enter into securities for his good behaviour during five years, himself in £200, and two other persons in £100 each.

FIRES.

The most destructive fire that has occurred in New-York for many years broke out in that city on Thursday morning, the 22d ult. in a distillery between White and Water streets, and destroyed upwards of TWENTY BUILDINGS. Nearly all the houses in Broadway were burnt. The loss is estimated at about 70,000, 42,000 of which were insured. Most of the buildings were of wood.

On the afternoon of Tuesday the 20th ult. a most desolating fire broke out in Troy, N.Y. which has laid in ruins one third of the fairest portion of that flourishing city—having destroyed about one hundred and twenty buildings. The loss is estimated from 800,000 to 1,000,000 Dollars.
