LONDON, SEPT. 25.

In the provinces of Lombardy and Venice, the greatest fermentation checked, and it was thought that the slightest check given

by Austria would cause Italy en masse to rise in arms.

Austrian garrisons are already established in Bologna and Comacchio, in the Pope's territories.

It is rumoured that the Earl of Lauderdale will shortly succeed to the Governor-Generalship of India.

Upwards of 100 Addresses have been presented to the Queen. The address from the females of Bristol had upwards of 14,000 signatures.

A Court of Common Council was held in London on the 22d, when a communication was received from the Queen, signed by Matthew Wood, enclosing a portrait of her Majesty. The Lord Mayor declined acting on the occasion, but the Common Council had a majority for a vote of thanks.

An account from Rome mentions an attempt that was made on the night of the 5th, at Civita Vecchi, by a desperate body of malefactors to seize upon the city, and establish a Republic. They amounted to 1600. Their project however was discovered and frustrated.

Marshal Kellerman, Duke of Valmy, and Marshal Lefebre, Duke of Dantzic, died in Paris last week.

PARIS, SEPT. 14. The reported explanations of the Emperor Alexander, on Spanish affairs, are not credited here. On the contrary, it is affirmed, that Russia, with the aid of Austria and Prussia, is resolved to put a stop to the systems of constitutions dictated by Armies, and ratified by bayonets and menaces. For this purpose, it is asserted, 280,000 men are ordered to be placed in requisition, and in addition Russia is to send a strong fleet into the Mediterranean to co-operate with the troops. France is ready to co-operate with the Great Allies.

VIENNA, SEPT. 6. It is now decided that the Great Allied Sovereigns will meet at Trappan, the 16th October ensuing.

The most active correspondence is kept up between our cabinet and those of all the great powers of the continent.

An official note has been sent to Naples, to explain the motives which have occasioned the formation of the Army of Observation on the Po—the preservation of internal tranquility, and external peace.

TURKEY.

The affairs of Turkey, appears to be in a hazardous situation. Several of the Pachas are in open rebellion against the Porte; others are suspected, and such is the insubordination of the imperial troops, that an important change if not a complete revolution, may be expected in this ancient and splendid empire.

The Pacha of Joania has succeeded in gaining over to his cause part of the troops, which were sent against him; and there has been a mutiny among those of the Pacha of Scutari. Large purchases of arms had been furnished Ali Pacha, by the English traders, for which a generous price was paid down.

FREDERICTON, (N.B.)

14TH NOVEMBER, 1820.

The Halifax papers by the mail this morning furnish London dates to the 4th ultimo, received there via the United States. The House of Lords resumed their meeting on the 3d, when they immediately proceeded to the business of the Queen: The papers are principally filled with the Speech of Mr. Brougham.—We have only time to make the following extract:—

BOSTON, Nov. 2.

The House of Lords met on the 3d inst. being the 22d day of proceedings in case of the Queen. Lord Liverpool read a correspondence with Col. Brown, denying certain imputations against the character of the Princess of Wales. The Queen's Counsel were then called in; and after the confusion occasioned by their entrance had subsided, Mr. Brougham commenced a speech of almost immeasurable length. He began it on the 3d, and resumed it on the day succeeding. It occupies eighteen close columns of the Times.

"The history of the Queen's long persecution, and the several epochs of it, were affectingly detailed by Mr. Brougham. Every less sustained by the Queen was the signal for a fresh attack on the part of her adversaries—No sooner was Mr. Pitt, her friend, deceased, than the first, the Douglas conspiracy, was got up against Her Majesty. The zealous, fearless, and pertinacious Perival, sprung forth in her defence, and dispersed that foul plot. He fell under the hands of a ferocious assassin, and his murder was the signal for a new insult upon his Royal Mistress, then was the Order of Council got to restrain the intercourse between Her Majesty and her most affectionate and only child—her daughter—That child expired by the severest visitation of Providence which had ever been inflicted on this island; and the people had not wiped their eyes after following her to her grave, or reading the affecting narrative of her obsequies, when the detestable Milan Commission was appointed: and to close this sad history, the very day on which the old King was consigned to the same vault with his grandchild and her infant offspring—that very day, was that on which the ever-memorable Non-Mi-Recordo man arrived and paid his first visit to a large house, with columns before it, and sentinels placed at the gates."

Mr. Brougham concluded his speech with great animation in the following words:

"My Lords, I pray your lordships to pause! You, my Lords, are standing on the brink of a dreadful precipice; your judgment will go forth to the world; if that judgment is against the Queen, it may be the last and only judgment you will ever pronounce!—That judgment, my Lords, will fail in its object, and it will return with redoubled violence on those who gave it!! Save the country, my Lords, from the heaviest calamity of a civil war!! Save yourselves, my Lords, from the situation in which you are now standing! Rescue the country of which you are the ornament, but in which you can flourish no longer when severed from the people, and when the blossom is cut off from the root and stem of the tree!! Save that country, my Lords, that you may continue to be the ornament of it! Save the Crown from demons, and the aristocracy, which is shaken, as is also the altar itself, which never more can stand secure! If your judgment be against the Queen it will shake the foundation of the kindred Throne! You, my Lords, have willed, the Church and Crown have willed that the Queen shall be laid out of the solemn service, but she has had the prayers of the people; and, my Lords, I do pour forth my supplications at the Throne of Mercy, that mercy may be poured down on those people in a larger measure than the merits of the rulers deserve; and I pray, my Lords, that your hearts may turn towards justice and not go therefrom."

At the conclusion of the speech a strong sensation appeared manifest in the House.

For the N. B. Royal Gazette To the PRINTER'S DEVIL:

Mr. DEVIL, I am a Militiaman who have always endeavoured to do my duty by attending the trainings, and doing such other duties as the law directs; but have observed for some years past that many who are enrolled make a mere nullity of the militia laws, by not attending or doing their duty in any shape whatever, and what is worse yet, they are frequently strolling on the green (with a cholic in their shins, the pleurisy in their fingers, or some other grievous periodical complaint which always seizes them at training times,) while we are under arms, as if upbraiding us for obeying laws which they despise. Now, Mr. Devil, as you know that our militia duties are very few, and easy to be performed; and as you also know that a well regulated militia is not only an ornament, but a defence to a country, and that it is the duty of every good citizen to honour the laws, I have stated these facts, being well convinced you will agree with me when I observe, that if some steps are not promptly taken to enforce obedience, by exacting the fines or inflicting the penalties, our militia laws will sink into contempt. Those who have always done their duty will be disgusted, (not at the duty, which every orderly person knows is light enough, but at what

they consider a glaring injustice and contempt of authority, as they consider the laws should be equally binding on all,) and subordination will be at an end. We do indeed still keep up the practice at the musters of marking delinquents, but there the matter ends: No fines of consequence have been exacted, or any penalties enforced of late, which has reduced the calling the roll to a mere mockery, and all threats to enforce attendance ridiculous. So lax has been the discipline in this respect, that at the late musters but few comparatively have attended. Now, Mr Devil, it is full time that those who always attend, should be convinced that the delinquents have some solid excuse, or if they are joining the privileged orders, it is but just that we who have no such subterfuge, should know it: at any rate some explanation is necessary on this head, or our militia will dwindle to nothing.

To prevent these consequences, I do not doubt but I shall have your approbation when I suggest the necessity of immediately enforcing the laws, by exacting fines from all delinquents, and that no frivolous excuses be admitted—No better time than the present, when we have just witnessed such a great contempt of the militia laws—money is not too plenty—the fines will be severely felt by most scoundrels; and it will at once invigorate and satisfy those who are punctual in attending. It will also create a fund for militia purposes, &c.

I shall not intrude any longer on such a judge of discipline as your Devilship, by pointing out the evils that necessarily attend a relaxation of discipline in military affairs, or remind one so well acquainted with the affairs of nations in general, of the fate of those countries that have in ancient or modern times suffered their institutions and laws to be treated with contempt: but conclude, by hoping that the time is not far distant when more attention will be paid to discipline, and when none among us shall be above performing the duties of
