LIVERPOOL, APRIL 29.

(From the London Papers of Thursday Evening.)

This day His Majesty proceeded in state to the House of Lords, for the purpose of opening the new parliament. So great was the anxiety to gain admission into the House of Lords, that many of the peer's carriages arrived before 10 o'clock; but positive orders had been given not to open any of the doors till twelve o'clock, not even to the peers themselves. This order was strictly enforced, and when the doors were opened, none but peers orders were admitted. Beside Palace yard being filled with carriages, a line of them reached to the end of Parliament-street by eleven o'clock.

His Majesty entered the house about two o'clock. Being seated on the throne, the Commons were summoned to attend at the bar, as usual, when the King delivered a most gracious speech, of which the following is an outline:—

His Majesty begins by saying that he had taken the earliest opportunity of convening parliament, after having had recourse to the sense of his people.

His Majesty is anxious to assure them, that in meeting them in person for the first time since the death of his lamented father, he shall ever continue to imitate his great example, by his unceasing attention to the public interests, and by his paternal solicitude for the welfare and prosperity of every class of his subjects.

His Majesty has received from foreign powers renewed assurances of their friendly dispositions towards this country, and of their anxious desire to cultivate the relations of amity and peace.

His Majesty then addressing himself to the House of Commons, states that the usual estimates for the year will be laid before them, which have been arranged upon principles of strict economy; but his Majesty

feels great regret in saying that the state of the country will not permit him to dispense with the additions to the military force which were made in the last session of parliament.

His Majesty next proceeds to declare, that their attention will be, among the first objects submitted to them, directed towards the provision to be made for the support of the civil government, and the dignity and honor of the crown.

His Majesty places at their entire disposal the hereditary revenues of the crown; and he expresses his gratification that, so far from desiring any settlement likely to impose new burdens upon his people, or even to diminish, on his account, the amount of the reductions incident upon his accession to the throne, he can have no wish, under the present circumstances, that any addition should be made to the arrangement sanctioned by Parliament in 1816.

His Majesty then addresses both houses of parliament, and regrets that the machinations of the disaffected should have led, in different parts of the country, to acts of violence and insurrection, but proceeds to express his satisfaction at the vigilance and zeal manifested by the magistrates, and at the active co-operation of the well-disposed part of his subjects, in suppressing these disturbances, and in supporting the authority of the laws.

His Majesty attributes to the wisdom and firmness of the late parliament, and the due execution of the laws, the restoration, in a great measure, of confidence to the country, and the discountenancing of those principles of irreligion and sedition, which had been disseminated with such malignant perseverance, and which had poisoned the minds of the ignorant and the incautious.

His Majesty relies upon the support of parliament to assist him in his determination to preserve by all the powers entrusted to him, the tranquillity and safety of the realm.

Regretting, as all must, the distress which still prevails among many of the labouring classes, and anxiously looking forward to its removal or mitigation, his Majesty adds that it is the common duty of all persons effectually to protect the loyal and industrious against those practices of turbulence, by which the period of life can only be deferred, and by which the pressure of that distress has been aggravated.

His Majesty trusts that an awakened sense of the danger which they have incurred, and of the acts which have been employed to seduce them, will bring back those who have been led astray, and will revive in them that spirit of loyalty, and that submission to the laws which subsists unabated in the hearts of the great body of the nation, and which, under the blessings of divine providence, have secured to the nation, the enjoyment of a larger share of practical freedom, as well as of prosperity and happiness, than have fallen to the lot of any nation in the world.

His Majesty delivered his speech with the greatest clearness, dignity, and grace.

*The Queen's Attorney and Solicitor General*.—Mr. Brougham and Mr. Denman having been appointed by the Queen her Attorney and Solicitor General, they were severally recognized in their respective offices, on Thursday, in the courts of Chancery and King's Bench. They appeared in full dress wigs; and when they were directed to take their seats within the bar, the other barristers rose, and bowed to them, as is usual on such occasions.

*The Queen*.—There are letters from her Majesty the Queen, dated the 29th March, from Rome, and there are subsequent letters of the 5th inst. in this town, up to which time she had not made preparations to set out on her journey towards England. Her Majesty states, that she was waiting the arrival of Sir William Gell, who was detained at Naples by a fit of the gout.—*Morning Chronicle*.

LONDON, APRIL 15.

*Whitehall*, April 10, 1820.—The King has been pleased to command, that the 24th day of this instant April shall be in all respects, observed and kept as His Majesty's birth-day, instead of the 12th of August.—*Gazette*.

It is understood that very shortly after the meeting of the New Parliament a trial of strength will take place in the House of Commons. The subject will be a motion, substantially, for the state of the country, but differing in form from the proposition of last Session.

Lord Combermere having written home

from the West-Indies, to decline the government of Ceylon, which had been offered to him, Sir L. Cole is appointed to the administration of that important island.

DISTRESSING AFFAIR AT GREENOCK. [From the Glasgow Herald of Monday.]

Perhaps there is not a more loyal town in Britain than Greenock; and so well established is this character, that very seldom are any military quartered there. It was with the utmost astonishment, therefore, that yesterday morning we received the accounts that a mob in Greenock had made a wanton attack upon the Port-Glasgow volunteers, and afterwards broke the gaol, and liberated some Radical prisoners. The fatal consequences of this attack have been the death of 9 men by the fire of the volunteers, and 15 wounded.

AN ACT supplementary to an act, entitled "An act concerning navigation."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, from and after the thirtieth day of September next, the ports of the United States shall be and remain closed against every vessel owned wholly or in part by a subject or subjects of his Britannic Majesty, coming, or arriving by sea, from any port or place in the province of Lower Canada, or coming or arriving from any port or place in the Province of New-Brunswick, the Province of Nova-Scotia, the Islands of Newfoundland, St. Johns, or Cape Breton, or the dependencies of any of them, the Islands of Bermuda, and Bahama Islands called Caicos, or the dependencies of any of them, or from any other port or place in any Island, colony, territory, or possession, under the dominion of Great Britain in the West Indies, or on the continent of America, south of the southern boundary of the United States, and not included within the act to which this act is supplementary. And every such vessel, so excluded from the ports of the United States, that shall enter the same, in violation of this act, shall, with her tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with the cargo on board such vessel, be forfeited to the United States.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted.

That, from and after the thirtieth day of September next, the owner, consignee, or agent, of every vessel owned wholly or in part by a subject or subjects of his Britannic Majesty, which shall have been duly entered in any port of the United States, and on board of which shall have been there laden for exportation, any article or articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture, of the United States, other than provisions and sea-stores necessary for the voyage, shall, before such vessel shall have been cleared outward at the custom-house, give bond, in a sum double the value of such article or articles, with one or more sureties, to the satisfaction of the collector, that the article or articles so laden on board such vessel, for exportation, shall be landed in some port or place other than a port or place in any province, island, colony, territory, or possession, belonging to his Britannic Majesty, that is mentioned or described in this act, or in the act to which this act is supplementary. And every such vessel that shall sail, or attempt to sail, from any port of the United States, without having complied with the provisions aforesaid, by giving bond as aforesaid, shall, with her tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with the article or articles aforesaid, laden on board the same as aforesaid, be forfeited to the United States: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed so as to violate any provision of the Convention to regulate Commerce between the territories of the United States and of his Britannic Majesty, signed the third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That, from and after the thirtieth day of September next, no goods, wares or merchandise, shall be imported into the United States of America from the province of Nova Scotia, the province of New-Brunswick, the islands of Cape Breton, St. Johns, Newfoundland, or their respective dependencies, from the Bermuda Islands, the Bahama Islands, the islands called Caicos, or either or any of the aforesaid possessions, islands, or places, or from any other province, possession, plantation, islands, or place, under the dominion of Great Britain in the West Indies, or on the continent of America, south of the southern

boundaries of the United States, except only such goods, wares, and merchandise, as are truly and wholly of the growth, produce, or manufacture, of the province, colony, plantation, island, possession, or place aforesaid, where the same shall be laden, and from whence such goods, wares, or merchandise, shall be directly imported into the United States; and all goods, wares, and merchandise, imported, or attempted to be imported, into the United States of America, contrary to the provisions of this act, together with the vessel on board of which the same shall be laden, her tackle, apparel, and furniture, shall be forfeited to the United States.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the form of the bond aforesaid shall be prescribed, and the same shall be discharged, and all penalties and forfeitures, incurred under this act, shall be sued for, recovered, distributed, and accounted for, and the same may be mitigated, or remitted, in the manner, and according to the provisions, of the act to which this act is supplementary.
