

yet soldiers were wanted in the country, and it was a most mischievous thing to paralyze their duty by such a publication as this. A British Army was never employed for any other purpose, except that of our preservation.

He would put it to the Jury to say whether the letter was a calm appeal to the Gentlemen of England, or whether it was not intended to be addressed to the passions of the people. It was evident it was not written in a hurry, or in an incautious moment; because the letter which Sir Francis Burdett afterwards addressed to Lord Sidmouth, and in which he maintained every sentiment he uttered in his first letter, clearly showed that it was not a hurried thing which he had done. --But having deliberately avowed it, he must have written it in a moment of deliberation. The Learned Judge added, that he must declare it to be a paper to be the most calculated to do mischief of any he could conceive, and he never saw more poisonous ingredients condensed in any one paper than were to be found in that letter.

The Jury, without appearing to deliberate with each other, immediately pronounced a Verdict of GUILTY.

The trial was not concluded till Half-past Five yesterday evening.

Two men were on board—one of them, a mulatto, and part owner, perished in the cabin—the other rushed through the flames and reached the fore-castle, dreadfully burnt—the fire did not come forward of the main mast. The unfortunate survivor can give no account how the fire caught:—He says she came out of an anchor—they both lay down fatigued, and did not awake until the whole quarter deck was in flames—the last he saw of the mulatto man, was in a fruitless attempt to gain the deck.

Died, in this place, on Wednesday last, Mrs. Dixon, wife of one of the West India Rangers lately settled in this Province:—this poor Woman had excited the compassion of all who were in the habit of visiting her. Exposed to the inclemency of the weather, in a delicate situation, by the brutality of her husband, and at last driven from her home, in the midst of winter, she wandered from the military settlement in the

month of January, and arrived in Fredericton, in a state of extreme weakness and derangement, having travelled nearly 120 miles. Here she was provided for by the Parish, and received many marks of kindness from several benevolent ladies to whom her case became known. From her own and other accounts, it appears she was a Woman of good education and connexions, who had been seduced from her parents by the artifices of a vagabond, whose cruel usage had first bereaved her of reason, and finally brought her to an untimely grave. Here, then, is an instance of a helpless Woman being destroyed by an unprincipled wretch, and while it excites the sympathy of the compassionate, should serve as a beacon to warn all those who may be inclined to aid or abet vagabonds in inveighing unguarded, credulous women into their power. It should also convince women who may be unfortunately entangled with such unprincipled villains, how little dependence is to be placed on the oaths or protestations of those miscreants, who, having renounced every thing but the appearance of men, care not for the miseries which they entail on their fellow creatures, to whom oaths and falsehood cost nothing, so long as they serve but their purposes to deceive.

#### SAINT JOHN, MAY 27.

The Preventive Officer with the schooner Shannon, of Shubenacadie, brought in for a breach of the Plaster Law, arrived here on Wednesday. We are ashamed to say that Mr. HUMBERT had not anchored his Vessel half an hour at Sung Cove on his first arrival, before a shot from a musket was fired from the above schooner, which fell close alongside, and that PETER M'ARTHUR, Master of the Shannon, made his boast of the firing, at the office of the Deputy Collector before him and several other persons. An attempt was made to rescue the Shannon, by a number of armed Persons from Moose Island, which, from precautionary measures taken by the Preventive Officer, proved unsuccessful.—Another attempt to surprise the Shannon was made by arming a number of men and waylaying the schooner at the Head Harbor, which was avoided by taking the Petite Passage.

There appears the most desperate determination among the Plaster Traders to risk their Vessels and evade the Plaster Duty, and that they are encouraged in so doing by Persons in Office under the British Government, who ought to know and practise better.—Communicated.

From the St. John Star.

Mr. JOHN HUMBERT, who had been missing since Monday week, returned on Sunday last via Digby. The following statement will account for his sudden disappearance and detention:—

On Saturday evening, the schooner Mary Capt. Joseph Dill, was seized at the entrance of this harbour by Mr. J. HUMBERT, Deputy Preventive Officer, for a violation of the Plaster laws. On Sunday afternoon Mr. H. went on board, accompanied by one man as ship-keeper; and about one o'clock on Monday morning Mr. H. hearing a bustle upon deck, immediately called to his man then on deck, to learn what was the matter, who said he could not give an answer to any of his questions, as they (the master and crew) threatened him with violence. They then secured Mr. H. in the cabin, moved up one anchor, slipped the other cable, and proceeded to sea; keeping Mr. H. confined until about 2 o'clock p. m. on Monday, and on Tuesday morning at 7 set him ashore, in a thick fog, about 12 miles below Annapolis Gut.

Halifax, May 23.

The ship William & Martha, Captain Evans, from London, bound to St. John, N. B. was wrecked near Cape Negro Head on the 12th instant. The William & Martha was consigned to Mr. Edward Winslow, who was on board, and unfortunately perished with one of the crew. The vessel was totally lost.
