DISTURBANCES IN IRELAND.

Mr. Knox said, he understood that considerable disturbances prevailed in some of the Counties in Ireland. He wished to know whether the Irish Government intended taking any effectual measures to repress this evil?

Lord Castlereagh stated, that information was received that many persons, under the name of "Ribbon Men," had gone about disturbing the public peace in certain counties. This was of course a great annoyance, and much to be deplored; but he was confident that the exertions of the Government, the Magistracy, and the Police, were fully sufficient to check the evil.

A letter from Leeds, dated Sunday, says, "You are no doubt already informed of the tumultuous proceedings at Dewsbury and the neighbouring townships, and of the committal of ten of the ringleaders to York Castle. It was hoped that this latter, aided by the presence of the military, would have restored tranquillity, at least, for a time; but, I am sorry to say, the contrary has been the effect. Irritated at the capture of their leaders, the Union men show a bolder front than ever, and openly declare they will avenge themselves on all who oppose them. In spite of the presence of the military, and the utmost vigilance of the Municipal Authorities, the 'Union Societies' increase.

THE GALE.—A letter from Dover speaks of the dreadful effects caused by the hurricane of the 2d and 3d instant. It is stated that no less than 65 vessels were wrecked between Calais and Etaples.—The crews have mostly been saved, but in a wretched condition—a person saw no less than 500 of them huddled together in a barn.

Spanish Revolution.—General Mina left Paris some days ago, in company with several Spanish refugees, for the purpose of striving to stir up a revolt in Navarre. Mina's escape appears to be well authenticated. This Mina is not the famous Guevara Chief.

ROYAL ORDINANCE.

Louis, by the Grace of God, King of France and Navarre.

Wishing to confer on Count de Cases a testimony of our satisfaction with his services, with the zeal and fidelity of which he has given us proof on the most trying occasions, and likewise with his attachment to our person and family, we have ordained and do ordain as follows:

Art. I. Count de Cases, Peer of France, Minister of State, is nominated a Duke, to enjoy for himself and his descendants in a direct line, from male to male, according to order of primogeniture, the honors and prerogatives attached to that rank, with the obligation of conforming to the laws of the kingdom, and particularly to the dispositions of our ordinance of August 19, 1815.

The King has appointed the Duke de Cases his Ambassador to the Court of London.

The Duke de Richelieu is appointed Minister of State and President of the Council of Ministers.

PHILADELPHIA, MARCH 28.

Early this morning an attempt was made by a number of the convicts in the State Prison in this city, to effect their escape. They succeeded in making their way into the prison yard, which is surrounded by a wall. Fired upon by the citizens, several of them were wounded and one killed, and they were driven back into the prison. They threw stones and brickbats at those who were firing on them, and bruised, though but slightly, two or three gentlemen. A detachment of marines was marched into the prison, and the walls surrounded by armed guards, for the purpose of subduing the revolters into obedience, and preventing a renewal of their attempts to escape.

We learn that the revolt among the convicts was general; and every man confined in the cells was released by the ringleaders, to enable them to join in the insurrection. Almost every bar inside the prison was wrenched from its proper position; and one of the doors at the southeast corner of the yard, communicating with the department for untried prisoners, was forced open by a large jack used to raise stone, in order to let in about 200 men to their aid. It was at this spot that a prisoner, whose name is Runner, was killed by a shot.

The revolters gained access to the outer gate leading into Sixth-street; and they attempted to cut through a large bolt, which locked outside.

At this point a detachment of volunteers was prepared to fire on them, if they had succeeded in forcing the gate. A prisoner by the name of Charles Johnson, was wounded in the hip by two or three balls. One other was also wounded.

At twelve o'clock every thing was restored to quiet; the prisoners have been suffered to return to their work. A part of the military have been dismissed, enough remaining to form a strong guard.

The guard will be kept up until the damage can be repaired; and the principal actors in the affair are secured by strong bolts and chains.

It has been thought prudent to station a guard at the prison, until it is repaired: and this duty is to be performed in turn by the volunteers, their services having been promptly offered by Gen. Cadwalader, and accepted by the Mayor and the Sheriff.

We understand there was some disturbance in the prison last evening at sun down. About 150 of the prisoners refused to go to their rooms: they had collected heaps of stones, &c for another scrape; but the volunteers marched in, and we presume, obtained obedience.

At the Court at Carlton House, the 12th of February 1820,

Present,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased this day, in Council, to declare His Royal Will and Pleasure, that in the Prayer for the Royal Family in the Morning and Evening Service, the Words "Their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and" be omitted.

That the same omission take place in that part of the Liturgy or General Supplication, in which the same words recur.

That in the title to the Form of Prayer to be used on the day of His Majesty's Accession to the Crown, the words "upon the twenty-fifth day of October" be struck out, and the words "upon the twenty-ninth day of January" be inserted.

That in the Prayer found in the service for the King and Royal Family, the words "Their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and" be omitted.

To the end that the same Form and Order may be observed in His Majesty's several Provinces, Islands, and Settlements in America and the West Indies, and elsewhere within His Majesty's Foreign Dominions, it is hereby ordered in Council, That the Right Honorable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do cause the necessary communications to be made to the Governors of His Majesty's said several Provinces, Island, and Settlements respectively.

Great disturbances continue in Ireland, the ribbon men from the Counties of Roscommon and Galway, about 1300 strong, made a concentrated movement thro' the pass towards Mayo, between Dunmacreana and Belmont, they passed into Mayo, broke into several columns and proceeded towards the different villages, in the direction of Musickfield and Balingdangan, to swear the people of those villages, but were happily checked in their progress by a party of the 90th Regt.—Nightly meetings are also held, for the purpose of administering illegal oaths, by the ribbonmen of the County of Down.—A conspiracy has been detected, the object of which was to assassinate Lords Ross and Exmantown, in the night of the 1st March.

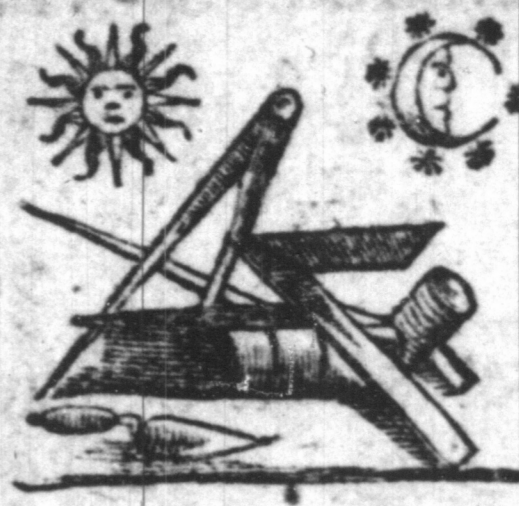
