New Islands discovered .-- Extract of a -letter from Arend S. De Peyster, on a voyage from Valparaiso to Calcutta .-- "On the evening of the 17th May, 1819, one of the people discovered a large island. We hove too until daylight, when another small low Island, appeared about five miles under our lee; we passed it close; it appeared clothed with cocoa nut trees, and doubtless inhabited. It is singular that Commodore Byron continued in the same parallel of Launde until a short distance of the easternmost group (for so at daylight they both proved to be) and then steered to the northward—and Captain Wallis passed about the same distance from the westernmost. To the former I gave the name of Ellice's Group, in honor of my friend Ellice, and to the latter my officers and passengers gave the name of De Peyster's Islands. Ellice's Group lies in long. 180, 54, W. lat. 8. 29, S. De Peyster's Islands, long. 181, 43, W. lat. 8, 5, S.; discovered on the 17th and 18th May, 1819. The longitude is deduced from lunar observations, taken at the time, and two chronometers exactly agreeing. I am thus particular for the information of any who may follow this track from Chili to India."

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

7TH MARCH, 1820. ---

AT a meeting held in Fredericton, on the 4th day of March, 1820; WILLIAM BOTSFORD, Esquire, in the Chair: The promoting the Agricultural interests of the Province being taken into consideration, it was proposed as highly expedient, in order so promote so desirable an object, to establish a Society at that place: which being unanimously agreed to, the same was immediately organized. formed, and established; under the name of the New-Brunswick Central Society for promoting the Rural Economy of the Province, to consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, five Assistants, a Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and a Treasurer. At the same time were adopted the following

RULES AND REGULATIONS. 1. Each annual Subscriber shall pay Ten Shillings in advance to the Treasurer, on becoming a Member --- Donations shall be unlimitted --- and Seven Pounds shall constitute a Member for life.

. The Annual Meeting shall take place on Tuesday, next following the opening of the General Assembly; when all the Officers for the ensuing year, shall be appointed; all the Accounts examined and audited; all the expenses controlled. and the distribution of the funds, as also of the seeds and implements of husbandry, made.

3. The Vice Presidents, or one of them, with the Secretary and Treasurer, and at least three Assistants, shall meet quarterly; at such time and place as may be fixed on by the Vice Presidents, for the purpose of receiving communications from, and returning answers to, the different County Committees; and to transact all such other business of the Society as may be found ne-

4. All monies which may be given by the Legislature, to aid the views of the Society, shall be so distributed, that each County shall be benefited in due proportion.

All monies which may be raised in the different Counties, by Subscription or therwise, shall be applied to the exclusive benefit of the County in which it may be raised, except where it shall be expressly given to the Central Society.

6. The implements of husbandry and seeds, which may be furnished to the members of the Central Society, or to those of the County Committees, shall be supplied at prime cost and charges.

7 A Geographic and Statistical account of the Province, shall be published at the expense of the 50ciety, as soon as the necessary materials can be coilected.

8. All communications which may be approved by the Central Society, shall be published at its expense, and circulated thro' the several Counties. 9. No alteration or new Regulation can be made,

but at the annual meeting of the Society. 10. Committees shall be appointed in the several Counties of the Province, to be composed of the members of the Legislature, and other inhabitents in the County; being members of the Centrai Society. Such Committee in the City and County of St. John, not to exceed nine persons, and in the other Counties not to exceed five per-

11. Copies of the Proceedings of this meeting shall be sent to the members of the Legislature, in the different Counties; with a request to form a Committee in each, conformably to the preceding recommendation, and such Committee, when duly organized, shall consider itself as auxiliary to, and correspond with, and communicate to. the Central Society, all such information as it may deem useful and conducing to forward the views and interests of the Institution.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of Office s and Assistants, when it was unanimously agreed that a copy of these proceedings should be presented to His Excellency the Lr. Governos. with a request that he would henor the Society by condescending to accept the office of its President : and that Judge Saunders, the Speaker, and Mr. Chipman should wait on him for that purpose.
