

LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

[Extracts from the Journal.]

Thursday, 18th February.

COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.

The sum of 25*l.* for the road from the Scotch Emigrant settlement on the Chiput-necticook ridge to the County road in St. Stephen's. 25*l.* for the road from the Scotch Emigrant settlement on the Bass-wood ridge to the said County road. 80*l.* for the road from Mr. Porter's Mill, in St. Stephen's, to Alexander M'Alister's in St. David's, on the main road toward Fredericton from St. Stephen. 30*l.* for the road from Tower-Hill to the head of Oak Bay. 30*l.* for the road from Mrs. Quinton's to Mr. Pagan's Mill-stream. 30*l.* for the road from the settlement on Cham-cook lake to the main road leading from St. John to St. Andrews. 50*l.* for the road on the Western side of the Digdeguash river, commencing at the Wellington bridge on the great road to St. John. 50*l.* for the road on the Eastern side of Digdeguash river, commencing at the bridge near Alexander M'Donald's. 50*l.* to aid in Building a bridge over Frost's stream near the Wellington bridge. 120*l.* for the road from the second Falls on the Magaguadavic to the Fredericton road. 25*l.* for the road from Gray's lot, in Letite, to the main communication near John Dick's farm. 30*l.* for the road from Orange Seeley's upper farm to Wedderhold's brook. 20*l.* toward opening the road from the Pennfield settlement, near Hands' farm, to the road leading to St. John. 30*l.* for the road from the Ferry, at Spiny's, to the County road in Pennfield. 20*l.* for the road from the new settlement at Oak-Hill, to Wm. Maxwell's, in St. Stephen's. 20*l.* for opening the road from Wm. Moore's to the main road leading to Tower-Hill. 30*l.* for the road leading from Daniel Lees' to Hoburn's lot, on the West side of Maga-guadavic river. 25*l.* for the road between Linnikin's and Samuel Connick's. 25*l.* for the road from Mill-Town, in St. Stephen's, to the settlement on the Moannes stream, in St. Stephen's.

Saturday, 19th February.

Mr. Fraser, by leave, presented a Petition of Hugh Monro and sundry Electors of the County of Northumberland, complaining of an undue election and false return for that County; and upon the question being put, that the Petition be received, the House divided, as follows:—YEAS, 16,—NAYS, 6.

On motion of Mr. Allen, resolved that the Petition of Hugh Monro, Esq. complaining of an undue election in the County of Northumberland, be taken into consideration at the next Session of the General Assembly of this Province, and that the petitioning Candidate, Hugh Monro, Esq. be then heard by his Counsel, at the Bar of this House; and also that the sitting Member and High Sheriff of the said County of Northumberland, be furnished with copies of the Petition.

On the motion for postponement, the House divided, as follows:—YEAS, 19,—NAYS 3.

Monday, 21st February.

Mr. Agnew, from the Committee, of supply reported as follows:—

Resolved, that the sum of £200 be granted for the further improving that part of the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to St. John, on the west side of the river.

The sum of £583 for the further improving that part of the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to St. Andrews.

The sum of £586 for the further improving that part of the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to the Great Falls.

The sum of £766 for the further improving that part of the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to Nepisiguit.

The sum of £650 for the further improving that part of the Great Road of communication leading from Fredericton to the Province-Line, in Westmorland—that £300, part of this sum, be expended in repairing and completing the Road and Bridges on the Portage, between James Blakney's and Pitfield's—and the further sum of £200, other part thereof, be expended on that part of the road leading from the Washademoac to the head of the Belisle.

The sum of £583 for the further improving that part of the Great Road leading from St. John to St. Andrews.

The sum of £700 for the further improving that part of the Great Road leading from St. John to Westmorland, which lies between St. John and the Finger-Board—one half part of this sum to be expended in repairing the road over the Great Marsh near St. John.

The sum of £266 for the further improving the Great Road leading from the bend of the Petticodiac river to Shediac.

The sum of £266 for the further improving the Great Road leading from Amasa Wheldon's to Shediac.

The sum of £400 for the further improving that part of the Great Road leading from Fredericton to the Canada Line, which lies near the Tamiscouta Lake.
