His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-Go-VERNOR having received the following communication from His MAJESTY'S Ministers, the same is made public for the information and guidance of all concerned.

By Command of His Excellency, H. H. CARMICHAEL. D. S.

" Downing Street, 6th Dec. 1819.

Royal Proclamation dated the 20th ultimo, to call in the old Mediteranern Passes granted by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for the protection of Vessels against the Barbary Cruizers, and that new Passes should be granted for that purpose, I herewith transmit, for your information and guidance, an order which His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been picasure to issue upon this occasion.

THEREAS the Commissioners for executing the Office of High Amural of Great Britain, &c. have repretented to His Majesty at this Board, that it may have happened, either by Accident or undue Means, that several Passes granted for the Security of the Ships and Vesseis thonging to His Majesty's Subjects trating in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the States of Barbary, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who by Colour of such Passes may carry on their Trade; His Reyal Highness the Prince Regent, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majes. ty, han taken the same into His Royal Consideration, and judging it necessary to Priarpredy Stop to such indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of ills triding Subjects, but may occasion a Ausunders, and tag between His Majesty and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary; data therefore thought proper, by and with the Advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order. That the present Form of Passes Fi de ute of by His Majesty's Subjects traon gig the Mediterratean, or to other Paris of the World, in the Way of the Rovers of barbary, as also the peculiar Form of Farses used by His Majesty's Subjects in-Fabricag the Town and Garrison of Gibral-

tar, be altered, and others of a new Form made out and issued in their Stead, under the same Rules and Regulations as were established by Order in Council of the 14th Day of June 1722, so far as the same remain unaltered by the Regulations made by His Majesty's Orders in Council bearing Date respectively on the 28th of August 1776, on the 31st of December 1783, on the 3d of Nov. 1802, and by the Order of this Day's Date, and according to the further Regulations contained in the said Orders; but that the Passes in the present Form be allowed to continue in force for all Vessels sailing from the Ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland during the present Year, in order to give sufficient Time to our Trade to be furnished with Passes of the new Form: and that after the Expiration of that Time, no Passes but those of the new Form he considered as valid, except in the case of Vessels returning from Foreign Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new Passes; and that in such Cases the Passes of the present Form do continue in force during the Terms herein-aster ment ned; that is to

For Vessels returning from the Ports to the Northward of the Streights of Gibraltar, and those within the Mediterranean, to the 21st of March 1820:

For Vessels returning from the West-Indies, or North America, and the Western Coasts of Africa, to the 30th of June 1820:

For Vessels returning from the East Indies, and all other distant Parts, to the 30th of June 1821:

And to the End that His Majesty's Pleasure hereby signified, may be made known in the most Public manner and without Loss of Time, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, hath this Day issued His Royal Proclamation, to notify the same to all His Subjects whatsoever, and to require all such of them as have old Passes in their Possession, that they do on or before the Expiration of the Periods above mentioned respectively, return the same (excepting such as are before excepted) into the Admiralty Office, or to the Collectors of the Customs at the Out-Ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to His Majesty's Governors abroad, and take out Passes of the new Form in lieu thereof, according to the Regulations established by Order in Council on the said 14th of June 1722, so far as the same remain unaltered by the Regulations made by His Majesty's said Orders in Council, bearing Date respectively on the 28th of August 1776, on the gist of December 1783, on the 3d November 1802, and by the Order of this Day's Date, and according to the further Regulations contained in the said Orders.

And whereas many Merchant Ships belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, continue several Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot conveniently get their Passes exchanged; His Royal Highness hath been therefore pleased to order, that upon the Application of any Owner of such Ships, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, &c. and his making Oath of the Property of the Ship, and that Threefourths of her Company are His Majesty's Subjects according to the Act of Navigation, or such other Proportion as may be authorized by Act of Parliament, and entering mio Bond for the Return of the Pass at the End of the Term therein mentioned, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do grant a new Pass, and send the same to such of His Majesty's Consuls in the Mediterranean as the said Owner or Merchant shall desire, with Directions to the Consul, upon Application to him from the Master

of the Ship for which the Pass is made out, and surrendering up the old Pass, and entering into Bond (of the Form hereunto annexed) for the Return of such new Pass, to deliver the said new Pass to him, transmitting the old one, with the Bond, to the Admiralty Office.

And His Royal Highness doth hereby order and direct the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations respectively, that upon Application made to them for the De livery of any Pass for the Use of any Ship or Vessel belonging to His Maje.ty's Subjects, (such Ship or Vessel having Three-fourths of her Company His Majesty's Subjects, according to the Act of Navigation, or such other Proportion as may be authorized by Parliament), they do take care strictly to adhere to the several Declarations established by the said Order in Council of the 14th of June 1722, so far as the same remain unalitered by the Regulations made by His Majesty's Orders in Council, bearing Date respectively on the 28th of Au gust 1776, on the 31st of December 1783, on the 31 of November 1802, and by the

HAT it be a standing regulation of this House, that no Monies hereafter be appropriated for Roads or Bridges in any Parish of this Province, in any Year, unless it shall appear by the Certificate of the Clerk of the Sessions of the Peace for the County in which such Parish is situated, that a return of the account of the Statute Labor has been made in the same Year, by the Commissioners of Roads of such Parish, agreeable to the Provisions of an Act, intituled " An Act " for regulating, laying out, and repairing " Highways and Roads, and for appointing "Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Pa-" rishes in this Province;" and unless also it shall appear by such Certificate, that the Statute Labor has been faithfully performed by the Inhabitants of the Parish for which any Money is intended to be granted, or that the delinquents have been prosecuted.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

[Extracts from the Journal.]

Mr. Smith, from the standing Committee to examine and inquidate public and privale accounts, reported:

L, is Benjamin Wilson's report for 1819 as Supervisor of the Great Road from Fredericton to Westmorland. He states that in his report of last year, there was a balance due the Frovince £145: 2:7, occasioned by his nor being able to chain

paid, and some of the jobs he had then let, were not completed.

He further states, that it was necessary to build two bridges within his district, one over Fox Creek near the bend of Peticodiac River, and the other over Tantamar river in Sackville: the former has not been attended to, but the latter is completed, except the small butments at the ends, which can be mished in two days by eight men : the difficulty in procuring timber and brush in the summer, is the cause of this delay. In the event of the failure of the old bridge, the new one can be made passable for traveliers in a few hours, with plank. The bridge over the Memramcook river will want repairs early in the spring, as one of the piles on which the bridge stands, is worn off by the running ice : if not repaired as early as the ice begins to run, the bridge will be in danger -- piles are preparing for that purpose. The roads from the bend to Shediac. and from Wheldon's to Shediac, are of great importance to the public, and are almost impassable in the wet season of the year. With respect to the great line of communication between Frederictor and Nova Scotia, the report of last year contains the neces ary supplies that come within his knowledge -- the accounts at this time are much larger than he expected, owing to the expense of the bridge -- he had made so e contracts in 1818, which were not completed that season---he expended the money he had in hand, to make the necessary payments, having no doubt but the Legislature, at their last meeting, would have continued their supply for the use of the Great Roads, and that it would have been in his power to have made the payments out of the public funds by the time the work was completed; but he found his mistake, and had to apply private property to the use. He flatters himself that you will not hesitate to reimburse him at the present meeting of the Legislature ..

M, is Benjamin Wilson's account, with assidavit, for the expenditure of £331: 7:5 as Supervisor on the Great Road from Fredericton to Nova Scotia - £234: 13 of the above expended on the road, on which his time and expenses are charged at £10-the remaining £96: 14: 5, was expended in building a bridge, on which his ime and expenses are charged at £5. There are vouchers for £321: 7: 5. He gives tredit for balance of account in 1819, £145: 2: 7—which leaves a balance due han of £186: 4: 10.

N, is John Campbell and Gabriel De Veber's report, as Supervisors of the road from Frederiction to St. Andrews up to 3d March 1820. They state that in constquence of no appropriation having been made the last Session, they have been prevented from making the improvements so much wanted on said road. From Witcher's to Garden's ridge, (three miles) a large som is wanted to render it passable in the summer season, owing to the immense number of large rocks without any soil over them. From the summit of the Pleasant Ridge to the Magagadavick (four miles) will also require a great deal of labour to put in repair. The whole road continues nearly in the same condition as stated in their last report. The bridges are now in a tolerable state of repair, but in consequence of the accidents which happened to the Digdeguash and Piske agen bridges, they were constrained to enter into contracts which exceeded the total amount granted to them the sum of £82: 1: 5, and there remains now due them £302 : 12 : 7 on cop trac's for labor performed principally in the year 1818.
