

**LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK**  
[Extracts from the Journal.]

Saturday, 26th February.

Moved by Mr. Wheeler, That whereas by Act of Parliament certain Duties, commonly called Crown Duties, are levied upon all Molasses, Coffee, and Pimento, brought into this Province from any part of the British West Indies, and, in some instances, from other places,--viz. upon Molasses, one penny per gallon; Coffee, three farthings, and Pimento, one halfpenny per lb. all sterling; also a like duty upon all Wines imported into this Province from the place of their growth, or from any place where these Crown Duties have not been paid; which said Duties have no connexion with the Revenue of this Province, but are all transmitted to His Majesty's Exchequer in England; and which said Duties are also attended with the peculiar hardships of being liable to no Drawback whatever upon Exportation of the said Articles from this Province, and of being wholly payable in hand upon their entry at His Majesty's Custom-House, no Bonds being taken, or any Credit allowed therefor: And whereas since the establishment of the Free Port of St. John, large quantities of Molasses, Coffee, and Pimento, have been brought there for the purpose of being re-shipped to the United States of America, a great portion of which is never landed, but transhipped immediately into American vessels; and it is to be expected that Wines would also be brought for the same purpose, but for the aforesaid Duties, which, from their admitting of Drawback, operate with peculiar severity upon such Trade in Molasses, Coffee, Pimento, and Wines, and have, as is represented, hindered much beneficial Trade to this Province--

Be it therefore resolved, that an humble Address be presented to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT--praying that His Royal Highness will direct measures to be taken that may tend to relieve the importation into this Province, of Molasses, Coffee, Pimento, and Wines, from its present liability to pay the Crown duties immediately upon entry, and from the inconvenience which rests upon it in consequence of no Drawback being, in any case, allowed upon the said articles being exported-- And be it further resolved, that the Honorable His Majesty's Council be requested to join this House in an humble Address as aforesaid.

Thursday, 2d March.

A Bill, "to increase the Fees of Marshals in the City Court of the City of Saint John in certain cases"; a Bill, "to provide for cancelling the Treasury Notes that have been issued in this Province"; and a Bill, "to provide for and encourage the settlement of Emigrants in this Province," were read a second time and ordered to be committed on Saturday next.

Mr. Wetmore, by leave, presented a Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the Parish of Springfield, in the County of King's--praying aid to enable them to build a Church in that Parish: which he read in his place.

Read a first time a Bill "to incorporate sundry Persons by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the St. John Bank."

Mr. Millidge presented a Petition of William Abrams, praying to be relieved from the payment of a transient duty of 2½ per cent. upon certain goods imported by him into this Province, which he read in his place.

Friday, 3d March.

Mr. Fraser presented a Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the Parish of Burton, praying aid to enable them to finish the Church in that Parish.

Mr. Millidge brought in a Bill, "to amend an Act intituled 'an Act to impose a duty on certain articles imported into this Province.'"

Mr. Agnew brought in a Bill, "to authorize and empower the Justices of the Peace for the County of York, in their General Sessions assembled, to levy an assessment on the Inhabitants of the different Parishes in the said County, for erecting a County Poor-House in the Parish of Fredericton."

Resolved that no Petition be received by this House after Saturday the 11th day of March instant.

The House went into further hearing of the Parties upon the Petition of Amos Perley

and sundry Electors of the County of Sunbury, complaining of an undue Election, and false return.
