MACHINE FOR MAKING BRICKS.

We have had an opportunity a few days since of witnessing the operations of a machine for saving labor and perfecting the execution of bricks for building, the production of the genius of Mr. Adam Stewart, who is the brother of Mr. Stewart, whose uncommon talents in the construction of musical instruments have excited so much interest.

The process we saw in performing was exactly as follows: the power we shall describe afterwards. Into a chest resembling the hopper of common grist mill, two men poured constantly a quantity of loose clay as it was dug from the earth, without any mixture, or moistening, kneading, or any other of the tedious process of the common art of brick making. The machine was in motion, and had a double power, that is the bricks were made and moulded, and delivered from two apertures, without any other aid of human hands than the two throwing of the clay into the hopper, when in a few seconds, from the aperture below the hopper a brick was delivered upon an endless web, which revolved on wheels intended for the purpose, and which in the rotation of the machinery carried the bricks gently several yards from the place of delivery, ready formed and of a solid texture, almost sufficiently dry for burning; and each of the apertures delivered the bricks with sufficient rapidity to occupy two men in taking them off and piling them.

THE KENTUCKY VELOCIFEDE.

In Kentucky a great improvement has been made in the velocipede—a machine which, by the mere impulse of the body, enables a person to travel the rate of nine miles an hour. The improvement consists in having changed the body of the machine into the form of a fish with the head of a horse, and made completely water proof; so that it not only floats, but enables the traveller to cross the rivers and lakes with which this continent abounds; at the same time it has the advantage of carrying along with him in the body of the animal, his provisions and baggage. This wonderful creature has been named the *Alligator Horse*.

CASE OF SLANDER.

A trial on a charge of slander terminated last night, before Judge Barnes, and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff, a respectable inhabitant of Frankford, 5600 dollars and costs:—a very serious admonition to those whose tongues slipperily tangle in the *Bangor Register*.

The Secretary of the Treasury has communicated to Congress the annual Report from his department. It appears there will be a deficiency in the revenue for the present year of about five millions of dollars; to supply which, the Secretary suggests the propriety of loans, and additional duty upon various articles of import, a tax on auction sales, or an issue of Treasury Notes. *[Bos. The Bible Society in Russia printed last year 72,000 copies of Holy Scriptures.—This year 101,500 copies will be printed in various languages, namely, in the Chewokirn, Ostiakian, and Vogulian.
