of this Province, stands prorogued  
on the Third Tuesday in January next: I  
have thought fit, by and with the advice of  
His Majesty's Council, further to prorogue  
the said General Assembly; and the same is  
thereby prorogued to the **FIRST TUESDAY**  
in **FEBRUARY** next ensuing—then to meet  
at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

Fredericton, the fourteenth day of  
December, in the year of our Lord  
one thousand eight hundred and  
nineteen, and in the sixtieth year  
of His Majesty's Reign.

be employed in conjunction,  
yet that to the specific influ-  
ence of turpentine we as-  
cribe the removal of the dis-  
ease of child-bed fever in  
every case.---That mankind  
is indebted for this great dis-  
covery to the zeal, ability,  
and industry of Dr. John  
Brenan. That we believe  
his humane disclosure of this  
very important secret has  
been the means of saving a  
multitude of lives, and that  
it will even prove to be one  
of the most valuable legacies  
that ever were bequeathed  
to posterity by the genius of  
an individual.

*Mazepa.*---The dreadful  
punishment inflicted upon  
the hero of Lord Byron's  
poem, has an example in a  
newspaper called, *Mercurius*  
*Politicus*, printed in the year  
1655. The narrative is da-  
ted from Hamburg;---  
“This last week several wag-  
goners coming from Bres-  
law, to Silesia, upon their  
way into the Duke of Saxo-  
nie's country, perceived a  
stag with a man upon his  
back running with all his  
might: coming near the  
waggon he suddenly fell  
down: the poor man sitting  
upon his back made a piti-  
ful complaint, how that the  
day before he was, by the  
Duke of Saxonie, for killing  
a deer, condemned to be

bound with chains upon that  
stag, his feet bound fast un-  
der the stag's belly with an  
iron chain soldered, and his  
hands so chained to the  
horns. The miserable man  
begged earnestly that they  
would shoot him, to put him  
out of pain; but they durst  
not, fearing the Duke.  
Whilst they were talking  
with him, the stag got up  
again, and ran away with all  
its might. The waggoners  
computed that he had run,  
in 16 hours, 26 Dutch miles,  
in the least, which makes  
near 100 of our English  
miles in a direct line. The  
miseries which this poor  
creature did and must un-  
dergo, especially if the stag  
killed him not in running,  
cannot be expressed---hardly  
imagined.

### MECHANISM.

A very curious piece of  
Mechanism of the nature of  
a pendulum clock, the com-  
pletion of which has cost the  
artist M. Rovez, twenty-five  
years labour, is now exhib-  
iting at Paris.

It offers to the eye thir-  
teen dial-plates, great or  
small, which indicate, 1st,  
the age of the moon, the  
phases of that luminary, her  
rising, setting, and passage  
to the meridian; the epacts,  
and the golden number, for  
which indices make their re-  
volution in nineteen years.  
2d, The diurnal horary cir-  
cle, subdivided into minutes  
and seconds of time; the  
rising and setting of the sun,  
in regard to the inequality  
of every day in the year;  
the differences between true  
& mean time; the dominical  
letters; the solar cycle; for  
which purposes the indices  
make their revolution in  
twenty-eight years. 3d, The  
annual motion of the earth  
round the sun; and that of  
the moon round  
the earth; and the revolu-  
tion of the celestial signs in  
their natural order. 4th,  
The difference of longitude  
for four hundred and thirty-  
two cities, expressed by the  
diurnal movement of a circle  
of copper gilt, in the centre  
of which is a dial-plate divi-  
ded into twenty four hours,  
with a pointing of the minutes from five to  
five, and carrying the sun in the middle, in  
such a manner that on reading the name of
