### A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly  
of this Province, stands prorogued  
to the Third Tuesday in January next: I  
have thought fit, by and with the advice of  
His Majesty's Council, further to prorogue  
the said General Assembly; and the same is  
herby prorogued to the FIRST TUESDAY  
in FEBRUARY next ensuing—then to meet  
at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

Fredericton, the fourteenth day of  
December, in the year of our Lord  
one thousand eight hundred and  
nineteen, and in the sixtieth year  
of His Majesty's Reign.

#### BY AUTHORITY.

WHEREAS divers Persons have at different  
Periods, had allotments of Land, and have  
neglected to take out their GRANTS for the same,

Yesterday being St. John's day, the  
Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia assembled,  
for the purpose of performing such business  
as is usual on that day.

The following Address signed by the  
Grand Officers, Past Grand Officers, and  
Officers and Members of the different  
Lodges in town was presented to JOHN  
GEORGE PYKE, Esqr.

To the Right Worshipful JOHN  
GEORGE PYKE, Esquire, Grand  
Master of the Provincial Grand  
Lodge, of the most ancient and hon-  
orable Fraternity of Free and ac-  
cepted Masons, in the Province of  
Nova-Scotia, and Masonic juris-  
diction therunto belonging.

WE the Grand Officers and Masters,  
Wardens and Brethren of the  
different Lodges in the town of Halifax,  
unanimously beg leave with hearts full of  
all the sentiments which the warmth of gra-  
titude and affection can inspire, to express  
to you, our thanks for the zeal, ability and  
attention which you have shewn during the  
long period you have presided over us in the  
exalted station of Grand Master.

WHILST with one general voice all free  
and accepted Masons throughout the Pro-  
vince proclaim, Right Worshipful Sir,  
your never ceasing care for the welfare,  
honor and advancement of their respective  
Lodges; still we who have been more close-  
ly connected with you, in the various rela-  
tions of private life, and who have experi-  
enced numberless advantages from the  
continuance and protection you have given  
to all Masonic Institutions, cannot permit a

It has ever been my study to endeavour  
to promote the interests of the institution of  
which we are members, and it is peculiarly  
gratifying to my feelings to be assured by  
you, that any advantages have resulted to  
the Craft, during the period I have had  
the honor to preside as Grand Master; and  
it is not less pleasing to me, to have preser-  
ved the regard and esteem of those so well  
acquainted with my private life.

THE perusal of your address in my re-  
tirement, cannot fail to excite sensations  
which will be extremely consolatory; and  
I beg to assure you, that my earnest prayers  
will be offered for your individual comfort,

and for the welfare, honor and advancement  
of the Lodges in this town, and of Masonry  
in general.

Halifax, 27th December.

In the afternoon a large number of Ma-  
sons sat down to dinner at Mason Hall, and  
the evening was spent with that harmony  
and decorum peculiar to the Craft. The  
following toasts were drank during the  
evening:

1. The Day and all who honor it.—  
*Mason's March.*

2. The King—Venerable monarch of  
an affectionate people—whose individual  
sufferings and sorrows have been alone ex-  
ceeded in magnitude, by the glory and splen-  
dour of his reign.—*God save the King.*

3. England—May her energies enable  
her to rise superior to the weight which now  
presses her down; and may the genius of  
her people triumph over temporary depres-  
sion.—*Britons strike Home.*

4. The Duke of York and the army—  
Should the nations of continental Europe  
again require the assistance of Great Bri-  
tain, to rescue them from despotism; may  
she experience no difficulty in sending to  
their aid such legions as triumphed on the  
Field of Waterloo.—*Duke of York's  
march.*

5. The Duke of Clarence and the  
Navy. May the wooden walls of Old  
England continue to be the protectors of the  
oppressed; and may her gallant sons who  
gave a death blow to the Gallic marine at  
the battle of Trafalgar, ever contend in as  
glorious a cause and with as much success,  
as when they shook the walls of Algiers  
to their foundation.—*Rule Britannia.*

6. The Royal Family. May the mem-  
bers of that illustrious family be as remark-  
able for their personal virtues, as they are  
rendered conspicuous by their elevated sta-  
tion.—*Hail Star of Brunswick.*

7. The memory of the Queen. May  
the example which she has left for the gui-  
dance of the Females of Great Britain, as  
a princess and mother, be closely imitated  
by the British Fair.—*A Dirge.*

8. The memory of the Princess Char-  
lotte of Wales; whose opening life prom-  
ised a copious source of human felicity; but  
whose premature death furnished another  
melancholy instance of the uncertainty of  
human enjoyment.—*Dead march in Saul.*

9. The Commandant and Officers of the  
Garrison; may the harmony which exists  
between them and the inhabitants of this  
town continue to bestow mutual happiness.  
—*British Grenadiers.*

10. Rear Admiral Griffiths and the  
Officers of the Squadron on this Station.  
May a friendly understanding ever prevail  
between them and the inhabitants of Halifax.  
—*Hearts of Oak.*

The Lodge was then opened, and the  
following Toasts were drank with Masonic  
honors.

11. His Royal Highness the Prince  
Regent Patron of our Order. May His  
Royal Highness continue to display that  
firmness amid domestic suffering, which  
marked his conduct during the convulsions  
that agitated a distracted world.

12. His Royal Highness the Duke of  
Sussex, Grand Master of England.—May  
his public and private virtues shed that  
lustre upon Masonry, which his exalted rank  
is calculated to afford.

13. His Royal Highness the Duke of  
Kent, the friend of Masons and of man.—  
May he continue to possess the esteem of  
his country; and may his domestic happi-  
ness be as permanent as his private worth  
and benevolence are conspicuous.

14. The different sovereigns of Europe,  
who have patronised Masonry in their res-  
pective dominions—May they exert their  
influence for the purpose of rescuing the  
Fraternity, from the illiberal decrees of bi-  
goted and intollerant states; whose chief
