LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

[Extracts from the Journals.]

Wednesday, 16th February.

Mr. Smith, brought in a Bill, "to continue and make perpetual an Act for the preservation of River and Sea Banks, or Dykes." Which was read a first time.

Mr. Colin Campbell, brought in a Bill, "to provide for the support of a Light-House on the Western Seal Island, in the Bay of Fundy." Which was read a first time.

Mr. Humbert, from the Committee appointed to report by Bill or otherwise, what encouragement should be given to Emigrants, and to relieve their distressed situation on their settling in this Province, reported that the Committee had attended to that duty, and that it was the opinion of the Committee, that encouragement should be given, and that a Bill be brought in for that purpose.

Mr. Humbert, Mr. Smith, and Mr. Wetmore, were appointed a Committee to prepare the Bill.

Mr. Saunders, presented a Petition of Peter Stewart, praying to be relieved from the payment of £42 : 16 : 8, transit duty, for goods imported by him at Miramichi.---Referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Wetmore, from the Committee appointed to inquire what further aid should be given for the encouragement of Agriculture throughout this Province, and to report by Bill or otherwise, reported that the Committee had attended to that duty, and that it was the opinion of the Committee that the Act intituled "an Act to encourage the raising of Bread-Corn on new Land," passed in the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty's Reign, should be further continued, with amendments, and that they had prepared a Bill for that purpose.

Ordered that the report be accepted.
Read a first time, a Bill, "to continue and amend an Act, intituled "an Act to encourage the raising of Bread-Corn on new Land."

The order of the day being read, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on consideration of a Bill, "to continue several Acts of the General Assembly that are near expiring."

Mr. C. Campbell took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. C. Campbell, from the Committee, reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill to them referred, and had agreed to the same with amendments; and that on a motion being made in the Committee, to fill up the blank with the word "three," the Committee divided,---YEAS, 11---NAYS, 9.

Ordered that the report be received, and the Bill, be engrossed.

The order of the day being read, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the Bill, "to further to continue three several Acts that are near expiring, for the increase of the Revenue of this Province."

Mr. Allen took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Allen, from the Committee, reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill to them referred, and that it was the opinion of the Committee that the further consideration of the Bill be postponed for three months. Ordered that the report be accepted.

Read a second time, a Bill "in addition to an Act, for enabling the Justices in Session, for St. John, to raise a further sum for the completion of a Poor-House."

Ordered that the said Bill be committed on Friday next.

Mr. Wetmore, by leave, presented a Petition from sundry Inhabitants of the Parish of Westfield, in King's County, praying they may be relieved from the restriction for drifting for Fish in Drift Nets. Ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Wetmore, by leave, presented a Petition of Walter Bates, Esq. High Sheriff of King's County---praying for remuneration for extraordinary services incurred in apprehending H. M. Smith.

Which being read, and on the question being put that the Petition be received, the House divided,---YEAS, 2,---NAYS, 18.

Mr. Agnew, from the joint Committee of the Council and this House, appointed to prepare an Address to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, deprecating the riotous and seditious practices of the disaffected in Great Britain, reported the same---which was read and agreed to by the House.

Ordered that Mr. Agnew and Mr. Humbert acquaint the Council, that the House have agreed to the joint Address prepared by the Committee of the Council and Assembly; and also that His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR be requested to transmit the same, to be laid before His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.
