A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly
of this Province, stands prorogued
to the Third Tuesday in January next: I
have thought fit, by and with the advice of
His Majesty's Council, further to prorogue
the said General Assembly; and the same is
hereby prorogued to the FIRST TUESDAY
in FEBRUARY next ensuing—then to meet
at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

Fredericton, the fourteenth day of
December, in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and
nineteen, and in the sixtieth year
of His Majesty's Reign.

WHEREAS divers Persons have at different

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS.

The Bills proposed in Par-
liament, and still under dis-
cussion at our last dates, are
to the following effect:—

1. A stamp duty upon all
publications, except religi-
ous tracts, and such works
consisting of fewer than a
stated number of sheets.

2. Persons convicted a
second time of a political
libel, are subjected to a long
imprisonment, banishment,
or transportation, at the dis-
cretion of the court.

3. All printers and pub-
lishers of works contempla-
ted in the first law, are re-
quired to enter into securi-
ties, with two sureties, to be
answerable for penalties.

4. Public meetings not

convened by regular consti-
tuted authorities, are prohi-
bited, unless notice of the
intended meeting be given,
signed by seven household-
ers, to the magistrates, six
days previous to the meeting,
and it is made unlawful for
persons not resident in the
parish or township to attend
such meeting.

5. Magistrates, upon in-
formation or suspicion, are
empowered to enter any
man's house, in search of
arms and to seize them if
found, giving persons, suf-
fering such visits, a right of
appeal to the quarter ses-
sions.

FRENCH MINISTRY.

The change of Ministry,
so long talked of, has at
length taken place. The
Moniteur of Nov. 20, con-
tains the following Royal
Ordonnance:—

“LOUIS, &c.

“ART. 1. The Baron
Pasquier, Minister of State,
Member of the Chamber of
Deputies, is appointed Min-
ister for Foreign Affairs.

“The Marquis de Latour
Maubourg, Peer of France,
Ambassador to the King of
Great Britain, is appointed
Minister of War.

“The Sieur Roy, Minis-
ter of State, Member of the
Chamber of Deputies, is ap-
pointed Minister of Finance.

“2. The Count Decazes,
Minister of the Interior is
appointed President of our
Council of Ministers.

Another change has taken
place in the Spanish Minis-
try. Don Jose Imaz, the
Minister of Finance, has been
restored to his former situa-
tion of director general of
annuities, and the *porte feuille*
of the finances has been trans-
ferred to Don Antonio Gon-
salez Salmon, honorary
counsellor of the wardepart-
ment.

Accounts from Cadiz to
the 28th October, state that
the sickness in Andalusia had
very much decreased. The
number of deaths in Cadiz,
from the 22d to the 25th
October, was one fourth less
than in an equal number of
days immediately preceding.

Carlisle's Shop closed.—
Yesterday, immediately after

the sentence was pronoun-
ced on Mr. Carlisle, a writ of
levari facias was issued to
take possession of such of the
defendants property as could
be found upon his premises
in Fleet-street. In an hour
afterwards property to the
amount, as is supposed of
£600 was taken in part sa-
tisfaction of the fines impo-
sed on the defendant; and
this morning the temple of
Deism was completely clo-
sed.

Radical Every Thing.—

The removal of Sir Hud-
son Lowe, from the govern-

CIRCULAR LETTERS.

Whitehall Nov. 6.

My Lord,—Having been
informed that there “are
laying about throughout the
kingdom, especially in the
maritime parts of it, a great
number of cannon, which
are private property, a con-
siderable part of which were
formerly used in merchant's
ships,” I beg to call your
Lordship's attention to this
subject; and to request that
you will direct the Magis-
trates of the country under
your Lordship's charge, to
make the necessary enqui-
ries, within their respective
districts, and if any guns of
this description should be
found therein, that they will
cause immediate steps to be taken with
the consent of their owners, for rendering
