LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK. [Extracts from the Journals.]

Monday, 7th of February, 1820.

Leave was given to C. Campbell, to bring in a Bill, "for granting further aid in support of the Grammar School in the Town of Saint Andrews." Received an ordered to be read.

Mr. Millidge, Mr. Johnston, and Mr. Wheeler, were appointed a Committee to enquire into the sums heretofore granted for the improvement of the Great Roads of communication in the Province, and what sums have been expended by the respective Supervisors, and make report thereof to the House.

Mr. C. Campbell, by leave, presented a Petition of John Frink and others, praying that the difference between the long and short duties on the cargo of the brig Charlotte-Ann, may be remitted to him, being £77: 2: 8:

Also a Petition of a Warren Hatheway, praying that £22: 16, drawback on six puncheons of Rum, may be granted to him. --referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Wheeler, by leave, presented a Petition of sundry Inhabitants of Carleton, praying for an alteration in the Law regulating the Herring Fisheries in the Parishes of West-Isles, Campo-Bello, Pennfield, and Saint George, in the County of Charlotte.

Which being read, a motion was made that the Petition be not received. --On which the House divided as follows:--

AYES, 3; -- NOES, 19.

The House, according to order, resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S Speech.

Mr. Fraser, took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Fraser, from the Committee reported two resolutions, which he read in his place, and delivered in at the table --which being again severally read, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:

"Resolved, that a Committee be appointed to request the Council to join this House in an humble Address to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, expressive of the sentiments they entertain of the loyalty of HIS MAJESTY'S Subjects of the Province of New-Brunswick, and of their firm and inviolate attachment to HIS MAJESTY'S Person and Government.

"Resolved, that it is the opinion of this Committee, that a Committee be appointed to enquire what sums of money shall be appropriated towards the improvement of the Roads and Bridges throughout the Province."

Tuesday, 8th February.

Read a second time, a Bill, "for granting further aid in support of the Grammar School in the Town of Saint Andrews." Ordered that the same be committed to-morrow.

The House according to order, resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S Speech.

Mr. Fraser, took the Chair of the committee.

Mr. Fraser, from the Committee, reported six resolutions, which he read in his place, and delivered in at the table --which being again severally read, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:

No. 1. -- That a Committee should be appointed to revise the Laws for the establishment, regulation, and improvement, of the Great Roads leading through the Province.

Mr. C. Campbell, Mr. Agnew, Mr. Smith, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

No. 2. -- That a Committee be appointed to enquire and report what Rivers in the Province require the attention of the Legislature, and by what means the navigation of the same may be improved.

Mr. Agnew, Mr. Humbert, Mr. Ward, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

No. 3. -- That every possible aid should be given for the encouragement of Emigrants and to relieve their distressed situation on their settling in this Province.

Mr. Humbert, Mr. Smith, Mr. Wetmore, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

No. 4. -- That a Committee should be appointed to revise the Act for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors, within the several Towns and Parishes in this Province, in order to render the provisions of the same more effectual and equitable in their operation.

Mr. Allen, Mr. Wheeler, Mr. Peters, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

No. 5. -- That further aid should be given for the encouragement of Agriculture throughout this Province, and that a Committee should be appointed to inquire into and report the most advisable means of carrying that desirable object into effect.

Mr. Wetmore, Mr. Saunders, Mr. Agnew, Mr. Taylor, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

No. 6. -- That it is expedient to appoint a Committee to revise and continue the Revenue Acts.

Mr. Millidge, Mr. Fraser, Mr. Yeamans, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. C. Campbell, resolved that a Committee be appointed, to consist of one Member from each County, to inquire and report what further sums are necessary for the improvement of the Roads and Bridges throughout the Province.

Mr. Fraser, Mr. Colin Campbell, Mr. Saunders, Mr. Miles, Mr. Millidge, Mr. Wetmore, Mr. Yeamans, Mr. Smith, were appointed a Committee for that purpose.

The House waited upon His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR, with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech; and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported, that His Excellency was pleased to make the following reply thereto, to wit,

"Gentlemen,
"I thank you for your loyal Address; and your exertions for the welfare and advantage of the Province, shall meet with a hearty co-operation on my part."

Mr. McKay, Mr. Allen, Mr. John Campbell, were appointed a Committee to bring in a Bill, "to revise the several Acts of the General Assembly that have expired, and to continue those that are near expiring."

Mr. Wetmore, by leave, presented a Petition of J. R. Leggett, Teacher of the National School at Sussex Vale, and others, praying a grant towards the support of the Teachers of the said School. --referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Humbert, resolved that the House do, on Thursday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on consideration of supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

On motion of Mr. Humbert, resolved that the Council be requested to join this House in an humble Address to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, expressive of the sentiments they entertain of the loyalty of HIS MAJESTY'S Subjects of the Province of New-Brunswick, and of their firm and inviolate attachment to HIS MAJESTY'S Person and Government.

Ordered that Mr. Humbert and Mr. Peters, communicate this resolution to the Council.

On motion of Mr. Fraser, ordered that Thomas Nason, Ammon Hubble, Thomas Hatheway, Cushi Hatheway, Thomas Turney, John Mills, James Mills, Israel Tracey, Bennin Foster, Orlo Smith, William Hoyt, Hicks Seamons, Hugh Cowperthwaite, Henry Niles, Peter Hume, George Ferguson, Henry Kitchen, Charles Batey, James Crawford, Solomon Perley, Samuel Nevers, junr. Ebenezer Estabrooks, John Tapley, David Tapley, and Samuel True, attend at the Bar of this House, on Monday the twenty-first instant, to give evidence at the hearing of the Petition of Amos Perley and others, complaining of an undue Election and false return for the County of Sunbury.

Wednesday, 9th February.

Leave was given to Mr. Wetmore, to bring in a Bill, "for the preservation of Deer in this Province."

Leave was granted to Mr. Scovil, to bring in a Bill, "to regulate Hawkers, Pedlars, and Pity Chapman."

The House, according to the order of the day, resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the Bill "for granting further aid in support of the Grammar School in the Town of Saint Andrews."

Mr. Peters, took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Peters, from the Committee, reported that they had gone through the Bill, and had made an amendment thereto, which he read in his place, and delivered in at the Clerk's table, with the Bill --where being again read, was agreed to by the House. And ordered to be engrossed.

A Message from the Council.

"Mr. Speaker, -- The Council have resolved that an humble Address be presented to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, deprecating the riotous and seditious practices of the disaffected in Great-Britain:

"And that the House of Assembly be requested to join the Council in the same."

On motion of Mr. Humbert, resolved that the Committee appointed to carry up the request of this House to the Council, to join the House in an Address, expressive of the loyalty of the Inhabitants of this Province, be discharged from that duty.

A Message from His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR, by the Deputy-Secretary, as follows:

Thursday, 10th February.

Mr. Wetmore, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill, "for the preservation of Deer in this Province." Which was read a first time.

On motion of Mr. Agnew, resolved, that an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR, praying that he will be pleased to order to be laid before the House, a copy of the Commission of the Judges of the Supreme Court of this Province, with such instructions as accompany the same.

The order of the day being read, the House according thereto, resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on consideration of supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Agnew resumed the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Agnew, from the Committee, reported fifteen resolutions, which he read in his place, and delivered in at the Clerk's table, where being again severally read, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:

Resolved, that there be granted to His Majesty, for defraying the expences of the Public Service of this Province, the following sums, to wit,

To the Chaplain of the Council, in General Assembly, the sum of twenty five pounds.

To the Chaplain of the House of Assembly, the sum of twenty five pounds.

To the Clerk of the Council, in General Assembly, the sum of fifty pounds, and twenty shillings per diem during the present Session.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly, the sum of fifty pounds, and twenty shillings per diem during the present Session.

To the Clerk-Assistant of the House of Assembly, the sum of twenty shillings per diem during the present Session.

To the Sergeant at Arms attending the Council in General Assembly, twenty shillings per diem during the present Session.

To the Sergeant at Arms attending the House of Assembly, twenty shillings per diem during the present Session.

To the Door Keepers and Messengers attending the Council and Assembly, ten shillings per diem each during the present Session.

To the Tide Surveyor of the City of Saint John, the sum of one hundred pounds, for his services and expences, from the 1st day of March, 1819, to the 1st day of March, 1820.

To Thomas Bonner, Esquire, for his services as Agent for the Province, for the year 1819, the sum of one hundred pounds sterling.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief, for defraying the contingent expences of the Province, a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds, for the year 1820.

To the Adjutants of the Militia of the different Counties in this Province, a sum not exceeding one hundred and ninety pounds, for the year 1820, agreeable to a Law of the Province.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, the sum of fifty pounds sterling, for the purpose of paying a Missionary to the Indians, for the year 1820.

To John Robinson, Esquire, Treasurer of the Province, for his services from the 1st day of March, 1819, to the 1st day of Mar. 1820, the sum of six hundred pounds.

To Nathaniel Atcheson, Esquire, Secretary to the Society of British North American Merchants, and Agent to some His Majesty's North American Co., for his services from February, 1819, to February, 1820, the sum of one hundred pounds sterling, to be remitted by the Committee of Correspondence.

On motion of Mr. Humbert, resolved that the House do concur with the Council, in presenting an humble Address to His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, deprecating the riotous and seditious practices of the disaffected in Great Britain.

An engrossed Bill, "for granting further aid in support of the Grammar School in the Town of St. Andrews, was read a third time, and sent to the Council for their concurrence.

Mr. Agnew, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill, "to provide payment for certain Public Services." --read the first time.

Mr. C. Campbell, by leave, presented a Petition of the Surveyor-General, praying for an allowance for a Clerk:

Also a Petition of Alfred A. Armstrong, praying for an allowance for past services, as Deputy-Treasurer at Indian Island.

Which were received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Peters, by leave, presented a Petition of William McDonald, praying to be relieved from payment of the transient duty of 2 1/2 per cent. on merchandize imported by him.

Which was received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Millidge, from the Committee appointed to inquire into the sums heretofore granted for the improvement of the Great Roads of communication in the Province, and what sums have been expended by the respective Supervisors, reported as follows:
