KING CHARLES.—The following is a
description of the dress worn by King
Charles, when he escaped his pursuers by
hiding in the oak; it is extracted from a
note to his own narrative:—"He wore a
very greasy old grey sloop-crowned hat,
with the brims turned up, without lining or
hatband; a green cloth coat, threadbare, even
to the threads being worn white, and bree-
ches of the same, with long knees down to
the garter; with a leathern doublet, a pair
of white flannel stockings, which the King
said were his boot stockings, their tops being
cut off to prevent their being discovered,
and upon them a pair of old green yarn
stockings, all worn and darned at the knees,
with their feet cut off; his shoes were old,
all slashed for the ease of his feet, and full
of gravel: he had an old coarse shirt, patch-
ed both at the neck and hands; he had no
gloves, but a long thorn stick, not very
strong but crooked three or four several
ways, in his hand; his hair cut short up to
his ears, and hands coloured; his majesty
refusing to have any gloves, when Father
Holddstone offered him some, as also to
change his stick."

ROOM TO PASS.

The following law case is copied from the
Poughkeepsie Observer.—The Editors, in
introducing it to their readers, observe that,
"not a week passes, but we hear of some
outrage or aggression on the public highway
in this country." This practice of vexa-
tions hindrance is felt by travellers gener-
ally throughout our state. A few such ex-
amples, as the one stated below, will make
these men know their duty. Mr Plummer
presented the fine to the County Treasurer
for the use of the poor.

LAW INTELLIGENCE.

William Plummer vs. Abner Darling.

This was a special action on the case. The
Plaintiff declared for a malicious and vexa-
tious hindrance on the public highway, to
his damage of fifty dollars. Plea, the gener-
al issue. The cause came on to be tried
before Daniel Hebard, Esq. one of the
justices of the peace in and for the county
of Dutchess, on the 18th day of December,
1819.

The Plaintiff proved that he, in company
with three others, was returning from serv-
ing on the Court Martial of the 20th
Brigade—that they overtook the Defen-
dant and his father in a two horse waggon,
going very slow—that as it was towards
evening, and they had about 14 miles to
ride, they requested the defendant to drive
faster, or permit them to pass—that the de-
fendant would do neither—that frequently
when asked permission, he would tell them
or wave his hand for them to pass—that when
they came up with him, and in the act of
passing, he would rein his horses in before
them, and again let his horses walk or go on a
slow trot—this was often repeated—and the
Plaintiff was thus hindered in the most ma-
licious and vexatious manner for riding three
miles.

The defendant endeavoured to palliate,
by attempting to show the viciousness of his
horses.

The jury retired, and in a short time re-
turned, a verdict for the plaintiff of thirty
dollars and costs of suit.
