

**FREDERICTON, (N. B.)**

18TH DECEMBER, 1821.

The Halifax Journal by the last Mail, contains London dates to the 20th and Liverpool to the 23d Oct. received there via the United States. The following are extracts:

All probability of an immediate war between any powers of Europe seemed to be at an end. Accounts from all quarters confirm this belief. The accounts of the progress of the war in Greece, are extremely vague and uncertain.

The British sovereign entered his German capital Oct. 8, and was received with the warmest expressions of attachment. The public entry took place on the 10th, which was conducted with great ceremony and parade. There was a splendid procession, firing of cannon, ringing of bells, illuminations and all the customary expressions of rejoicing.

The subscriptions for Sir Robert Wilson, amount to £4000. Among the subscribers are the Duke of Bedford, Earl Fitzwilliam, Earl Gray, Sir Francis Burdett, the Earl of Thanet, Lord Holland, Lord King and others.

Spain continues in an unsettled state. Several cities had suffered from the yellow fever. In Barcelona and Barceloneta 389 persons died in four days from the 22d to the 26th of September—three fourths of them of yellow fever. A few cases of yellow fever had also appeared in Marseilles.

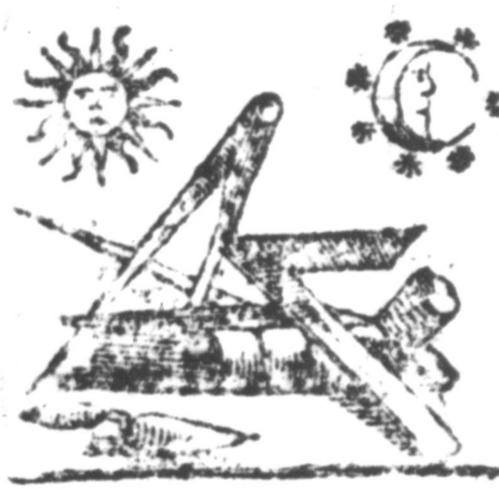
Accounts from Odessa of Sept. 18, state that the Turkish fleet had gained an advantage over the Greek naval forces. They state also that the question of war or peace was decided, and that the camps of both armies which had been in sight of each other on the 12th, were broken up, and the troops were marching to stations nearer home.

The number of vessels that sailed from Liverpool, Oct. 9, was estimated to be nearly 300.
