BOSTON, APRIL 11.

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It appears from the best reports, that in the first movements against Naples, Austria means to advance single handed, notwithstanding she has the approbation of the other Great Powers. In case of disaster to her troops she will probably call on Prussia for aid and perhaps Russia. Her resources are ample, and her finances very eligible. She received a large part of the millions of smart money exacted from France in 1815, and she has since been husbanding her resources; and although she borrowed of England forty four millions of dollars, she has not been called upon to reimburse either principal or interest.

According to the most creditable accounts from Naples, it was certain the war preparations were great and general. All the veterans who served under Mutar; &c. have been called into active service for a campaign of six months, the Cortes promising that in their absence each member of their families should receive a carlino a day, in addition to their pay. The General in-Chief was on the frontier, animating the troops, militia, and peasantry, to the most desperate resistance of the invaders, arming the strong holds, and organizing and economizing all the war resources of the country. If these appearances are not deceptive, the Austrians will not find the task of conquest so easy as some of the European statesmen anticipate. The accounts that hostilities had taken place cannot be true. The Austrian army after leaving the Po, had to traverse a large tract of neutral country before they could reach the Neapolitan frontier, and in the march must necessarily divide into two columns, and in some instances take circuitous routes. Hosfilities did not probably commence before the middle of March.

A Liverpool paper of February 23, speaking of Naples, says:

Paris papers arrived in London on Wednesday afternoon. The fact of the Austrians having crossed the Po, is confirmed. The advanced guard was expected in Rome the 15th and 20th instant. A private letter from Laybach states that the British Minister delivered a note of so important a character, that it produced an extraordinary assembling of the Congress, and dispatches were instantly forwarded by Prince Metternich to Treviso, Milan, and Rome.

Yesterday a person was found dead, lying on the shore about seven miles down the river, and was conveyed to this place: An Inquest was held on the body, this morning, before William Taylor, Esq. Corroner for the County of York, which proved it to be that of Justus Todd who was drowned near Sugar Island on the first day of January last.

New Castle, Miramichi, 10th April. Dreadful Accident .--- Last night witnessed one of the most awful and heart-rending scenes we ever had in this country occasion to relate. On Monday, 9th inst. Mrs. WM. NESMITH went on a visit to her friend's (Mrs. Alexander Davidson's) on the opposite side of the river, and after spending the day, was called on by her husband to return home; they had not proceeded above eighty yards from the shore. together in the sleigh, when dreadful to relate, the ice gave way and plunged the sleigh and its consents into the bosom of the deep; while in the water Mrs. NESMITH seemed to possess that cool and modest fortitude which we have always observed to be the leading chracteristic of her nature---the effeet of a mind resigned to the will of Providence. She held on a piece of ice for some seconds, but judging, (as we supposed) that the horse would keep above the water, she let go her hold and seized the ill fated animal by the head, which immediately went down. Just as Mr. NESMITH with much difficulty had got his breast on the solid icec, he being buttoned up in a great coat, and being encumbered with long heavy boots, turning round he beheld with horror his beloved Spouse launched into the occean of eternity!!! The horse and sleigh on the following day, appeared on the surface of the water in the very same spot in which they immerged and were taken ashore. Every endeavor has been used to find the body of the deceased, but without effect. She has left three children, the youngest only nine months old.

Mourn virtue's fair daughters her destiny weep,
Who rests on the cold oozy bed of the deep.
That heart which was warm, kind, feeling and just
Now cold as the waters that roll o'er the dust,
Once beat in a bosom, with powers rarely given,
Faith, Virtue & Hope, the sure pasportss to Heaven;
Misfortune's wild torrent she stem'd without groan
And wept for each sorrow but that of her own;
The slanderous story ne'er fell from her tongue;
Revered by the old, and ador'd by the young,
That eye that once beam'd in the fervour of faith,
Is now dim in the dark silent mansions of death.

From the Free Press of the 17th inst. Captain Turly, of Philadelphia, while lying to, March i, in a very heavy gale from the W. at 4 p.m. discovered a ship standing before the wind, colours union down -she came within a few feet of his jib-boom and hailed him to send his boat on board, as they were sinking; both pumps were going, and only seven men to be seen altogether-she had neither boats, cambouse, bulwarks, nor any thing to be seen on deck-the word " Congress" could be read on her stern, but the name of the place to which she belonged was washed off. It being impossible for a boat to live, she was requested to round to, which she did, and carried away mainyard. It soon became dark, and both vessels hoisted a light. The distressed ship being to windward, kept sight of her until 1 a.m. when it disappeared, and at daylight the ship was not to be seen, and had probably sunk.
